REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen held meetings every Tuesday evening throughout the year to conduct the business of the Town. We also attended many other meetings around the County in an effort to stay informed.

Two major projects that the Board has been involved in this year were the removal of the Searles house and landscaping the property and the installation of a compactor at the Rowe Refuse Gardens. It is our opinion that both of these projects are assets to the Town. We hope the people of Rowe share these feelings.

As usual your Highway Department has been very busy throughout the year maintaining and upgrading the roads of Rowe. The Fall of last year just about saw the completion of construction on Ford Hill Road. The Highway Department also placed 720' of drainage on Middletown Hill Road and another 1,100' of drainage on Ford Hill Road. The Department replaced 900' of guard rail at various locations throughout the Town and layed approximately 3,000 tons of Type "I" Pavement.

We think it worthwhile to mention the fact that the newly purchased Copier in the Town office has lightened the paperwork load for all Town departments.

It is with much sadness that the Board has to report the passing of seven of its beloved citizens in the past year. They were: Mrs. Emma Clement, Rowe's oldest citizen at 103 years of age, Mr. Elmer Clement, Jr. Joseph Rossi, Miss , Helen McCarthy, Mr. Willard Woodhall, Mr. Arthur Volland, and Mr. Lawrence Dow. They will all be deeply missed.

Your Board of Selectmen would like to thank the various departments of the Town for their help and cooperation during the year.

REPORT OF THE PARK COMMISSION

To the residents of Rowe:

The Pelham Lake Park Commission has continued in its efforts to expand the potential usage of the park. During the past year we built the first of two projected Adirondack shelters along the hiking trails to permit limited camping, provided docking facilities for small boats in the cove beyond the beach, supported the construction of two tennis courts within the park, built horseshoe pits at the far end of the east parking lot, built an outdoor movie screen and provided a summer film series and updated our rescue equipment for the beach area.

In addition, the fish stocking program was continued along the guidelines provided by a report completed in 1976, the park trail system was mapped and updated so that copies could be provided for the residents' use, woodduck houses were built and placed in the swampy area at the far end of the lake in order to insure a continued woodduck population, and a large segment of the back boundary of the park was remarked in accordance with official surveys with the goal in mind of properly designating that area legally open to hunting.

A youth program providing sponsorship for weekly events and excursions for children in junior and senior high school, was very successful judging by attendance and the response of the young people themselves.

Last year the Town purchased the Gingras cabin and it is our hope that this coming summer, the cabin will be repaired and opened for a variety of uses by all age groups in Town. Repair of the Sibley cabin on Adams Mt. began last fall but was brought to a halt by the early snow. The cabin should be completed this spring and will be opened to residents who request its use, but only in cases where adult supervision is provided.

The Commissioners are striving to develop the use of the park by persons of all ages in town and propose to develop such programs with the interest of the general public in mind, even when they are aimed at specific age groups. We look forward to another season of continued improvements in your park system.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD - 1977

To the townspeople of Rowe:

James H. Williams resigned from the Planning Board in May of 1977 after serving for many years and was succeeded by Margalee O. Riggan.

Most of the Planning Board's activity during the year involved the study of Rowe's existing by-laws and protective regulations and the preparation of recommended changes and additions to bring our by-laws into compliance with Chapter 808 of the General Laws.

Chapter 808 requires fairly uniform zoning concepts and procedures statewide. We must establish "use zoning" which will spell out the types of uses permitted and establish procedures for granting of special use permits.

Among the changes being recommended will be to designate Rowe's present "Unrestricted Zone" (the northwest corner of town where Deerfield Specialty Paper Co. and Yankee Atomic Electric Co. are located) as "Industrial Zone".

Full details of the new proposals will be sent to all residents via a special edition of THE GOAL POST, the Planning Board newsletter. A formal public hearing for discussion of the changes will be held at the town hall on May 30, 1978 and it is expected that a Special Town Meeting to vote on the revised bylaws will be held on June 13, 1978.

THE GOAL POST, Jane Lindabury, Editor, continues to serve as the communication link between the town government and the townspeople. It evidently fulfills a real need because we hear many expressions of appreciation from its readers.

The Planning Board Expresses its collective appreciation to the Board of Selectmen and all the other town officers for the spirit of cooperation which is evident in our town government.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HALL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The remodeling of the Town Hall took such a long time and so many frustrating delays and problems were encountered, it is difficult to make a concise report, but a brief summary follows.

The Committee met, elected Sally Alix as Chairwoman and Norma Brown as Secretary. Our intention was to create an efficient interior in which the officials of the Town including various committees and boards could meet and work in attractive, comfortable surroundings. John Chornyak from Greenfield was chosen as Architect as we felt he could best fulfill our requirements.

After plans were completed and accepted, bids for construction were advertised and subsequently a contract was signed on May 3, 1977 with Avellino Bros. of Pittsfield, Mass. - the successful bidder. Sally Alix, at about this point, had to give up the Chair due to health reasons and Anne Bond was elected in her place.

Work progressed fairly well at first, then seemed to lag due to unavoidable delays and unavailability of many items - particularly in the heating/air-conditioning system. The Construction contract was for 120 days and when this expired at the end of August and work was far from completed, it was unanimously voted to dispense with the Architect's services since he would now be on a per diem plus expenses basis - further adding to the cost. This meant the Committee would work directly with the Contractor and we are happy to state that our relations were excellent and he was cooperative in every way.

Nevertheless, time went on and we were plagued with the frustrating problem of certain heating elements not arriving, and other work - mainly decorative, could not be accomplished until the heating system was completely installed. Finally the units came and work went forward and after all was practically completed except for a few minor details, the officials started to move in. Those of us who have been working in the new office are enthusiastic about the efficiency, attractiveness and comfort of the General Office and feel it is entirely ample and suitable for our requirements now and in the foreseeable future.

Open House was held on Sunday, March 19th and comments overheard by the Committee from the viewing public were very favorable. Final acceptance of the building by the Committee and the Town will be delayed until Spring when some outside work will be completed - painting of front porch and steps and landscaping, and 5% of the total construction cost is being withheld until this has been satisfactorily completed.

The Town Hall is now open to the public every week-day except Thursday and Saturday from 9 to 12 noon.

To: The Honorable Board of Health, Rowe, Massachusetts

During the year 1977, one store and the elementary school cafeteria were inspected in accordance with the Massachusetts Sanitary Code.

Water samples were taken at the Town Beach during the summer months. The quality of the water was satisfactory for swimming purposes.

Water samples were taken from the school cafeteria and from the Town Hall several times during the year. All samples were satisfactory for drinking purposes.

Sixteen percolation tests were taken for the installation of sub-surface sewage disposal systems. Of the sixteen tests made, permits were issued for the installation of ten systems. Eight final inspections were made and certificates of compliance were issued in accordance with the Massachusetts Environmental Code.

At each percolation test and final inspection there was a representative of the Board of Health.

Three disposal works installer's permits were issued for 1977.

One milk dealers license, one milk store license and one oleomargarine license were issued in accordance with State law.

One recreational camp for children was licensed and inspected during the summer. Some renovation work will be necessary before the 1978 camping season.

Consultation was provided the board as requested during the year.

I wish to thank the Board of Health and the people of Rowe for the fine cooperation extended to me.

ROWE TOWN LIBRARY REPORT

The Rowe Town Library has had a progressive year during 1977. All of the wiring and the service entry to the library have been brought up to required standards, and flood lights have been installed on the outside of the library for security of the area, and for special events.

The Library reading room has been furnished with a memorial gift in memory of the Henderson Family, and we invite you to come in and enjoy all the magazines, and other items in the library. Our record collection is growing, and is a favorite item among young and old. We have enlarged our paperback collection, and if we haven't got a favorite author or book in the library, a word with the Librarian, Mrs. Stevens, will obtain it for you thru inter-library loan or the Bookmobile. Of special interest for the young people was the Circus Reading Club which was started on Old Home Day 1977, and many have completed the requirement reading of 28 books and received their special awards. Also of special interest has been the displays of stamp issues made by Alan Bjork during the past year. Should anyone wish to put on an exhibit of their favorite hobby in the library, please contact Dorothy Stevens.

Our Rowe Town Library has been host for a four-session workshop in cataloging and classification sponsored by the Western Regional Library System, and will again be host for a workshop during 1978. The library belongs to the Western Regional Library System, and as a member follows the minimum standards set up by the State which requires that the librarian work a minimum of 20 hours per week. In addition, the Librarian and one or more of the Trustees are required to attend at least two training workshops per year (usually a total of 20 hours per workshop broken down into 4 or 5 week sessions) which are held in various libraries in the region. Ashfield was the host of one in 1977, as we were.

A review of the State Reports that we must file shows us that during the year of 1977 we have added 566 new books, both thru gifts and by purchase, subscribed to 53 periodicals and have 62 periodicals available for borrowing. There have been 10,955 books in circulation during 1977, and 445 recordings, a total of 11,400 items in circulation. This is a good record for 192 subscribers, and shows that our Library is well used. The Trustees and Mrs. Stevens wish to take this opportunity to thank all those who have donated special items to the library during the past year. All such gifts are very deeply appreciated.

Rowe Town Library hours remain the same during 1978. We are open on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M., and on Friday Evenings from 6:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. Everyone is welcome.

REPORT OF THE ROWE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To The Townspeople Of Rowe,

In the 1977 Town Election, Mrs. Gail Newsome was elected to the School Committee, filling the position vacated by Mr. Ira Seybold.

Early in 1977 it was evident that the school cafeteria roof needed repair. The School Committee engaged an architect to design a roof system that would pitch the water off the roof, plus add insulation to the roof and make the roof water tight once again. The job is completed now and this area of the roof is water tight. This was an expensive undertaking but we believe we have a good roof now on this area of the school. In the hallway area several sky lights were replaced with a new water tight design. The flat roof over the classroom area of the school will need some attention in the near future. The school is nearly twenty years old and is starting to show signs of age. With a watchful eye and a good planned program of continuing maintenance we will have many more serviceable years from our school. The main foyer and hallway were recently repainted as well as two classrooms. The damaged and water stained cafeteria ceiling was replaced. All salvagable ceiling tiles were saved to be used as replacement tiles in other classrooms when necessary. The Committee is presently looking into the cost of insulating the rest of the school plus adding storm windows. Our information tells us that the cost of insulation and storm windows would pay for itself in fuel savings in about eight to ten years depending on the price of fuel.

The School Committee, in an attempt to better oversee the use of the building after school hours, approached several retired citizens to ask their help in monitoring the building. Much to our delight we found four men who volunteered their services. These "Evening Proctors" took time from their days and evenings to oversee the young people of our community as they used the school gym. Unfortunately this endeavor did not work out. It appears that someone entered the school after it was closed for the evening and caused minor vandalism on several occasions. Presently the School Committee and the Park Commission are working together in hopes of providing some method of shared supervision throughout the year. The school is still available to young people in the evening and on weekends if they are chaperoned by an adult, preferably a parent.

The School Committee recently sent the Town residents a questionnaire to see if there is an interest in having Adult Evening classes in the Rowe school. Once the questionnaires have been processed you will be hearing more about this idea.

In June Mrs. McIsaac retired from our teaching staff. Since the projected enrollment appeared to be dropping and we were trying to hold school costs down the Committee decided not to replace Mrs. McIsaac's position. The principal redistributed teaching assignments for the staff of five full-time teachers. Mrs. McIsaac visits the school occasionally. She says that she misses the children and staff but is also enjoying her retirement.

This year a new Artist in Resident Program has been initiated in our school. Thus far several talented local artists have been to the school to teach the students in their specific area of expertise. Everyone seems to enjoy this new program and have learned much from it.

The downhill skiing program was very successful this year with excellent skiing conditions nearly every week while the program was in service. Last year's newly initiated Math Program is in full swing now and is working out well for both student and teacher. The new Science Program S. C. I. S. (Science Curriculum Improvement Study) is doing well at all age levels. It is difficult to predict just what school enrollment will be in the future. Last year all indications pointed to lower school population for this year. Enrollment is up this year and looks like it will increase again next year.

We welcome to the school staff this year Mrs. Nancy Rillings, Mrs. Johanna Weinstein and Mr. Fred Homer, who are replacing Mrs. Sally Stern, Mrs. Nancy Dorsey and Mr. Eric Archenbach. The staff is once again working smoothly and efficiently to bring about quality education in Rowe School.

The future is bright for Rowe School. We have a talented, hard working, dedicated staff who are striving not only to educate your children in the three R's but also making the children think, ask intelligent questions, to be sensitive to other people's needs and become responsible citizens of our community.

The School Committee wishes to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Rowe and Heath for their continued support of the school. Special thanks to Superintendent of Schools Arthur P. Silvester, Principal Elizabeth Connelly, the school staff and parent volunteers for their continuing hard work, pride in the school and support of school activities which help keep the Rowe School an outstanding educational institution in our area.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

This year the Rowe School has three new classroom teachers and they were introduced to you at the beginning of the year in a community newsletter. Depending upon the size of each class, classrooms are grouped in various ways from year to year and this year's grouping is as follows: Mrs. Law - Kindergarten/Environmental Education Co-ordinator; Mrs. Fournier - 1, 2,; Mrs. Rillings - 3, 4; Mrs. Weinstein - 4, 5; and Mr. Homer - 5, 6. Class sizes are larger than they have ever been and this is attributable to two factors: 1) one teaching position was

eliminated last year, giving us five teachers rather than the former six; and 2) an increasing school enrollment. We continue to share art, physical education, vocal music and instrumental music teachers with two other elementary schools, and continue to contract with a speech therapist and a clinical psychologist.

Last year the school purchased a new math program which I referred to in my 1976 report; the program is called IMS (Individualized Math System) published by the Ginn Company. We implemented the program at the beginning of last year, and requested that it be evaluated by Ginn in May of 1977. They observed that the school had properly implemented the program and that students were successfully working with math. We also distributed a student evaluation form to assess student response to the program. This response reflected a full spectrum of opinion, but the majority of responses were favorable. During that same month teachers worked on an assessment of the entire school and this assessment included instructional and social development objectives as well as the total school climate. Each objective was listed and then the staff rated the school as either strong or weak in that area. Subsequently this assessment has been used with the new teaching staff to give us a direction in which to work this year.

During May of 1977 the Environmental Education program was evaluated by an Environmental Education expert; his assessment of the program was stated both in terms of the objectives which had been accomplished in the school during the year as well as his recommendations for this new year. There has been work this year implementing his suggestions as well as in designing objectives for the program. The Environmental Education Program is actually in a continual state of assessment by the classroom teachers when they meet together as a staff or separately with Mrs. Law.

The last week of August, 1977 was workshop week for the Rowe School staff. Teachers attended workshops each day of the week in three different areas: math, reading, and science. The math workshop was conducted by Ginn representatives and the time was directed toward the effective teaching of math in general as well as effective teaching of the IMS program. Another day was devoted to a workshop in how to administer an individualized reading diagnostic test. Formerly, at this school and at all the other elementary schools in the district, the reading test was administered to all members of the class simultaneously. This year we implemented a new testing instrument called the Woodcock Diagnostic Reading Test (each child is tested separately) and the workshop in August was spent teaching teachers to administer the test. The teachers were very pleased with using this individualized testing method because once the test is administered it allows them to know exactly where each child's strengths and weaknesses are in reading. Thus the child's reading program can be designed around these factors. Another two days were devoted to a science workshop which was designed to familiarize the teachers with our new science program. Last year the staff had spent time exploring different science programs and after visiting several schools which were using the SCIS program (Science Curriculum Improvement Study) we decided to purchase it. This year we began working with half of the components of the program with the option of purchasing the other

half if we feel that the program has been proved effective and has been successfully implemented during the 77-78 school year.

Early in the fall our teachers reviewed, and decided to purchase, the Continuous Progress in Spelling Program. This program was used last year by our sixth grade teacher, Nancy Dorsey, and her students had met with such excellent results that she worked for an afternoon this fall with our teachers, going through the program and explaining it to them. The program has been implemented throughout the school. Although CPS is individualized, its instructional method is designed for children to work in pairs.

We are participating in the Mohawk Trail Children's Concert program. It is directed by Bill Wittig, a music professor at Smith College and the program consists of six visits to the school. A group of three or four musicians visits each classroom and follows through an educational format. The last event of the series is a concert which includes the children and will be performed at the Rowe School with an invitation extended to the public to attend. Subjects of the classroom presentations are: the language of music, musical styles, music in your life, and music in history (2 sessions).

We are continuing this year to sponsor artists-in-residence in the school. The main objective of this program is to expose the children to an artist for a three-day time block. The artists begin with a full-school assembly where they introduce themselves and discuss the life-style of an artist—how one must live to survive as a working artist. The remaining time is then scheduled for working with the children. This year we have scheduled a sculptress, an artist who will be working with collage and fantasy, a jewelry-maker, a silk-screener, and a percussionist. Last year the artists-in-residence worked with puppetry, weaving and drama. All of these programs are evaluated after the three day program by the principal, the artist, and one of the parent volunteers who works with the artist. This is a constructive process to help improve the program so that, ideally, each succeeding event will run more smoothly and will be more effective than the one previous to it.

The sixth graders have chosen for their class trip a week in New York City and have already been very busy with fund-raising. To date they have served two dinners at the Rowe cafeteria, have been selling cards, and have sponsored food sales and raffles. I would like to extend my special thanks to the sixth graders, their teacher and especially the sixth grade parents. This class will begin studying New York as a social studies unit in preparation for their trip which will occur during the first week in May.

The fifth graders again participated in our environmental education program at the Cape Cod National Seashore. This year they attended during the first week in November but had begun preparing for the trip in September with Mrs. Law. She has many materials and classes which are directed to preparing the children for what they will do once they arrive. The purpose of the week is to study the seashore, an environment much different from our own. In November I wrote an

extensive newsletter to the parents outlining in detail what the children did day to day while at the Cape—the experience essentially is a school away from school. The adults who taught and chaperoned the program were Mrs. Law, Environmental Educational Co-Ordinator, Mr. Homer, fifth grade teacher, and Mrs. Dawn Peters, School Committee member. Mrs. Peters is also a licensed school bus driver and was kind enough to drive the bus to and from the Cape.

A parent-volunteer program was continued this year and parents and a community member have volunteered to work with children—again, I would like to extend my appreciation to these people who come into the school. It is very heartening to see members of the community and the parent body in the school during the school day working with the children and observing school in session. It also makes us feel more a part of the community by having community people working with us.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

There is no such thing as a typical school year in education and this truism is certainly born out by the record of the past 12 months. The year has been characterized by declining amounts of money in the area of state aid particularly for transportation and Chapter 70. The year has been further characterized by the continuing rise in costs for all services and salaries due to continuing inflation. Local school departments have also had to deal with increasing state mandates for school programs and the operation of schools in general. The school committees have been put in a position of an increasing bind. The bind has been caused by the need to try to maintain educational services to children and at the same time to restrain constantly increasing school budgets. The problem has been compounded by inflation, and less state aid together with increasing state mandates that constantly confront school committees.

One bright spot in our local educational scene has been the creation of a Teacher Community Center that has received federal funding since the inception of the program in September 1976. Because of the fact of increasing costs for school services, school committees have felt the need to review and eliminate programs that were not mandated or which did not meet the needs of a wide majority of students. However, the Teacher Center, commonly called the SEED Center, has been of material assistance to students, teachers and parents during the period of the past 15 months. It is one of our brighter spots in the matter of local school offerings. In the words of a consultant employed by the state to evaluate federal programs, "We're getting a greater dollar value from that small Teacher Center project in Shelburne Falls than any other IV-C project in the state".

Some of the areas of activity of the Teacher Center are worthy of note at this time. The Center has provided workshops free of charge to teachers and people within the community. These workshops have been held essentially after school hours or on weekends. They have been facilitated by in-district teachers, college professors from neighboring institutions, extension service personnel and outside consultants. The topics covered by these workshops have been those that have been designed to broaden both the interests and the effectiveness of teachers.

The Center has also sponsored five week mini-courses on a continuing basis for teachers and community members who wish to receive low cost instruction in areas of particular interest. Graduate classes have also been organized and sponsored in cooperation with neighboring collegiate institutions. Teachers or community members completing these courses are eligible for college credit at the institution sponsoring the particular course. The Center has been instrumental in helping to coordinate workshops for those teachers in grades 5-8 who have been working to facilitate the articulation of students between the elementary and the high school. The Center has also sponsored workshops on Teacher Evaluation for supervisors and building principals. The Teacher Center has, in cooperation with the Director of Special Education, established a series of workshops dealing with problems of children requiring Special Education. The Center has met with representatives of the Parent-Teacher Organizations from our several schools to develop programs of

common interest on behalf of our public schools. The Center has in the space of the past year and a half assembled a professional library for use by teachers. Learning kits are available for teachers in all of our schools. Some of these learning kits have been developed by our own teachers, some are on loan from the Boston Childrens' Museum. The SEED Center has been active in developing special programs. All of these special programs have been those that will increase the effectiveness of teacher instruction as well as add to the aesthetic and cultural development of our staff. There is an Advisory Board for the Teacher Center that is composed of not only teachers but school committee representation and parents. The Center has tried to extend its services to other groups within the community and also to teachers in towns that are contiguous to our own.

In a period of time when our local school committees have had to review and assess individual programs and make decisions as to whether we could continue to finance them, this particular program has made a strong and worthwhile contribution to our schools. It has helped to fill the vacuum caused by the small amount of professional assistance available to our teaching staffs from the central office.

The attention of citizens is directed to other reports by school personnel that follow.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL MOHAWK TRAIL REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The influence of the Ad Hoc Committee and recommendations which they made in December of 1976 greatly influenced and affected the changes in the school during the year 1977. Some of the recommendations which the School Committee accepted and put into effect based on the Ad Hoc proposals were an Early Graduation Program which will be effective with the Class of 1980, new graduation requirements that will be effective with the Class of 1981 and a recommendation that asked for various changes and improvements in our English and writing curriculum. A Contemporary Family Life course for juniors and seniors, a special program which would allow for students' independent study if they so desired and a blocked time Language Arts Program were some of the additional improvements recommended and introduced in 1977.

An explanation of the Language Arts program is most easily given as a blocked time instruction of two periods for the seventh grade which inleudes English, reading, independent project work, and enrichment. The block time, as presented, is an effort to accomplish the academic objectives of the English and Language Arts Program at Mohawk much like the elementary grades accomplish

them. It is felt that two periods in the same room helps ease the transition from elementary grades to secondary school by creating a more familiar atmoshpere, as well as providing instruction better adapted to the abilities and needs of the students. It is also hoped that this extra time will permit greater individualization of instruction for the student.

Another important program was introduced during this past year that is designed to improve the articulation between the sixth and seventh grades at Mohawk. Along with several articulation workshops in the Spring of 1977, attended by fifth through eighth grade teachers, there are plans for this program to be extended into the coming year, as well. These efforts to improve the junior high orientation and the articulation between elementary and junior high have been planned by a committee from both elementary and secondary grades and is an outgrowth of a cooperative effort on the part of the district schools as well as the combined elementary and secondary committee which has done the actual planning for the specific activities. What has evolved from the original decision to have a concerted effort to improve this area and from the meetings of Mohawk administration and parents and other community members, has been a more integrated and better oriented school opening in 1977 for the seventh grade than ever has been accomplished prior to this. One of the events of the 1977 school opening was the attendance on the first day of school by only the seventh grade. This gave these students an opportunity to move about the school in a leisurely fashion to meet some of their peers from other feeder schools and to accomplish their readiness for the following days with less pressure and with more individual attention. The feedback from the students as well from the parents has been gratifying in their remarks concerning this orientation. It is hoped that the extension of discussions in the areas of curriculum; homework policies, student activities, and career education will bring better orientation and better education to seventh grade students.

Other new curriculum courses introduced this year have been the Woodwind Ensemble course, Brass Ensemble course, Creative Composition, Political Novel and Practical Mathematics. Expanded programs for students have added participation in assemblies, expansion of our school store and more in-depth career exploration. In another program, the art students became involved in decorating the school, assisting in drama productions, and helping with the school newspaper, student handbook and many other areas of school life. In addition, a math tutoring program was initiated to help students with math learning difficulties.

Based on a recommendation by the Ad Hoc Committee, five master teachers, one in each of the discipline areas of English, Foreign Language, Math, Science and Social Studies, accepted the responsibility of aiding teachers in their respective disciplines to improve their teaching techniques and to help evaluate and upgrade our curriculum.

The Resource Center continues to be a leading influence in the upgrading and betterment of our education here at Mohawk. Besides conducting an annual Creative Arts Festival and the Artist of the Month program instituted several years

ago, and the Media Day for Seventh Graders and other regular programs, the center reports increased usage of both AV and book materials. We have also gained a district grant through Title IVB to supplement fine arts materials for feeder elementary districts as well as for Mohawk.

At the end of this last year, both parents, teachers, students and administrators were thrilled by a concert given by a new organization in our school. The Dance Band, under the direction of Mr. Donald Kitson, played to a large audience in our cafeteria as well as at an assembly and proved that it was one of the school's leading organizations even in its primary year. This popular music ensemble has given opportunity to many of our students to engage themselves in a contemporary music organization other than in our regular junior or high school bands. The students show their enthusiasm for the activity in performing and the audiences have shown great appreciation for their efforts.

For the first time in recent years, Mohawk has only one first year teacher. The faculty has remained stable other than loss by attrition. As has been mentioned, the new programs and curriculum have been put into effect with the personnel available in the school minus four members of the faculty who we lost by attrition in the past year.

In retrospect, the school has definitely taken a step toward improving standards through upgrading its curriculum and by paying special attention to the areas of writing and composition. The changes in our school and in some of the procedures of testing and other ways have brought about a more academic atmosphere in the school which is noticed by both student and faculty.

The Resource Center Council again sponsored the annual Creative Arts Festival in February; the many outstanding community resource people who donated their time and talent are greatly appreciated. Our goal of community communication

is further realized through the ongoing Artist of the Month Program which features a local artist or craftsperson.

Video production has been enhanced this year by the fact that we now have the capability of sending a closed circuit video signal to all the classrooms in "D" building in addition to the auditorium and library conference room. A Title III grant proposal has been submitted to the Bureau of Library Extension for the acquisition of color video cassette equipment for a project involving Arms Public Library in Shelburne, Belding Memorial Library in Ashfield and the high school Resource Center.

This past year our nine town regional school district received \$3,043.44 for a Title IV B Fine Arts Grant; a major portion of the money was used to purchase 297 art prints, which, together with the rest of the collection, are housed at the Buckland-Shelburne Elementary School. Catalogs of the material are available.

New programs for the year included an Exchange Library of hard cover and paperback books and a professional magazine routing service for faculty and administrators.

MOHWAK TRAIL REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

In this annual report of the Mohawk School Committee Chairman, the first concern is to express appreciation to former Chairman Winston Healy for his six years of service to the Mohawk District. Public service without compensation is becoming a rarity in our society; it is something America needs and cannot buy, but must give to itself.

The School Committee consists of seventeen members from this nine-town rural area. Some members are very knowledgeable in the area of education, many members have the distinction of being parents, the most fortunate members have both assets. Unlike our counterparts in larger metropolitan areas, this school committee is not remote but is close to the students and the community. Membership does not lead to a higher social or political echelon. This year the committee has approved the formation of three subcommittees and with the advice of the Superintendent three task forces to scrutinize areas where money might be saved

through cooperation. The Budget Subcommittee with its sense of perspective has completed a budget for 1978 - 1979 with qualitative and quantitative aspects of education foremost in its endeavors. The Negotiating Subcommittee last September completed a two-year contract with the Mohawk Trail Teachers' Association. The Education Standing Subcommittee whose duties are not seeking perfection but rather the ever-enduring process of perfecting and refining education at Mohawk. The three task forces are currently working in areas such as extra curricular activities, transportation, and energy conservation within the school plant.

Our various administrators will give concise and accurate reports of finances and programs at Mohawk, but there are some observations and thoughts I would like to express.

Education in any society, and throughout history, has always been expected to represent and transmit values and knowledge to the next generation. This is why education will continue to be a subject of controversy. Some of the values of our society (Western Civilization) are universal, humane, and democratic. I have noticed the growth of these values at Mohawk which gives our school purpose and direction and keeps it from becoming a neutral institution, values I believe most parents want for their children, values that can best be learned in school and that they will never get from television. Public education should be concerned about the whole student: Knowledge, Ability to think, humane qualities all of which equal a worthy attribute to our society.

Occasionally, Mohawk is the subject of criticism, both just and unjust. Problems we all have and must not pretend otherwise. But, in coming to grips with them, we must keep a sense of perspective. To the doomsayers, I would like to quote Will Durant, philosopher historian: "Civilization is a stream with banks. The stream is sometimes filled with blood from people killing, stealing, shouting and doing the things historians usually record, while on the banks, unnoticed people build homes, make love, raise children, sing songs, write poetry and even whittle statues. The story of civilization is the story of what happened on the banks."

The story of Mohawk is the story of hundreds of its graduates who have become responsible attributes to society and are completing various endeavors; it is most of the present student body anxious to learn; it is the unnoticed dedicated members of faculty, staff, and administration who work beyond their contractual duties in the service of our youngsters; it is the untold contributions of parents, citizens, friends, and school committee persons. If you wish to improve or to know more of the story of Mohawk, get in tune with the people on the banks. Maturity of Mohawk is ever nearer; its minds and cultures are catching up with the possessions it acquired ten years ago.

Our intent has been to enable the reader to have a completely open and comprehensive review of our school's financial and programmatic status. If these reports need further clarification, please call me at your convenience (413) 774-2066.

For The Calendar Year January 1, 1977 to December 31, 1977

I am pleased to submit this as my second annual administrative report. As in my first report, I shall attempt to summarize the more significant activities that contributed to our school's growth and development during this past year. I shall close this report with a brief analysis and projection of the Tech School's future.

In this, the second year of our school's operation, all previous enrollment projections have been exceeded. The October 1, 1977 enrollment was 770. Of this number, approximately thirty-two percent were female. It is estimated that this student category will increase to about forty-two percent by 1980. At this writing, one out of every four Grade 9-12 students in Franklin County is attending the Tech School. The anticipated enrollment for the school year 1978 - 1979 is 850.

During the past year, a number of important changes were made in our basic studies curriculum. Although this school's programs were planned to integrate a strong measure of essential competencies into the core subjects, our Math and Science Curricula were strengthened to include a firmer connection to the World of Work. Also, since the initial year's exploratory ninth grade program was not

entirely satisfactory, a number of beneficial changes were incorporated to broaden the choices for career exploration.

The opening of three shops - Distributive Education, Metal Fabrication, and Plant Maintenance made the school fully operational with eighteen trade and technical occupational programs.

The continuing heavy enrollments in Special Needs Programs has resulted in a strengthening of the entire Special Education Department. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts enabled our school to receive a Special Education Program Audit during this school year. It should pin point those areas that need further refinement.

The Athletic Program, under the guidance of Athletic Director Ray Willis, made great strides in expanding the variety of school sports to more male and female students. Our first Cross Country Team placed very high in County competition. Our softball, track and field, soccer and basketball teams all gave very impressive first year performances. The cheering squad, activated during the basketball season, gave an added flourish to all of the sports programs. In addition, the Art and Music programs combined on a number of successful ventures. Perhaps the most outstanding extra - curricular program was the Spring Festival directed by Thelma Moeckel. The proceeds from this popular program went toward the purchase of band and choral uniforms.

An unexpected bonus during 1977 was the award of a Federal Construction Grant of \$225,000. The money will be used to build physical education and athletic fields which were left out of the original building plans because of tight finances.

A major event this past year was the inauguration of the Adult Education Evening Program. Over (350) adults registered for 19 trade and technical career programs. Dr. Edward Lareau, Evening School Director, has projected a 1978 evening student increase to about (500).

As part of our plans to utilize this school as a training vehicle for a variety of work experiences, our school became the Coordinator for an eight high school CETA Consortium for youth employment training. Also, three late afternoon Adult Work Experience contracts were signed with CETA for the 1977-78 school year.

Among other firsts during this school year was the awarding of our first House Carpentry Building Contract. A large Colonial house is being built on Turnpike Road in Turners Falls for a Montague couple. An Open House is planned for May. The first Teachers' Association - School Committee Employment Contract was ratified during this school year. It is a three year contract, and it promises to become a major tool in effective personnel management. Another first was the addition of elected student school committee members and student government representatives to the State Good Government Program. The first School News-

paper, the first Yearbook, and the first Awards' Banquet and Graduation were all part of this busy first school year.

Since the major goal of vocational education is "to prepare students to seek, acquire and succeed in a specific trade, technical, or occupational field", a new position was authorized this year — that of Vocational Placement Counselor. This counselor's primary task will be to assist post graduates, seniors, and job ready juniors in entering full-time employment fields. Also, since Voc-Tech Education uses cooperative work experience as a valuable pre-job training tool, the job counselor also coordinates this program. Last year's graduating class, a very small one, were all successfully placed. This year's graduating senior class will be the first major test of our job placement and training programs.

In closing, I would like to document what I believe to be the major programmatic projections in Franklin Tech's future. It appears certain that the presently scheduled day school programs have exceeded capacity. Yet it is equally obvious that there remain a large number of student applicants whom we cannot accommodate. Therefore, it is essential that some orderly and systematic planning process for future growth begin immediately. All of the County high schools have a major stake in this plan and, therefore, will be invited as planning participants. Alternate programming, whether it is half day, satellite, late afternoon, or year round school models must be developed for as early as 1980.

Also, it seems equally certain that there will be a significant growth in the demand for adult career training programs. Therefore, this institution must be prepared to cooperate with all of the area's employment training facilities such as CETA, DES and GCC to plan jointly nonduplicative service centers.

Energy costs, inflation, and negotiated personnel costs are placing public education in a seriously negative financial posture. Stringent efforts will be necessary to develop fiscally responsive budgets that will address the problem areas and yet remain educationally sound. A trend towards measured cost, effective staffing, and services can be expected in all future programming.

Finally, a comment must be made relative to the present unstable local-state relationship, especially regarding reimbursement monies. Regional Vocational-Technical Schools were planned and budgeted on the good faith assumption by Franklin County citizenry that the state would honor its lawful obligations. Every specialized training facility such as our regional vocational technical school operates under a higher per pupil cost status than the comprehensive schools. By law this cost is offset by a more equitable state reimbursement formula. Unfortunately, our program plans and budgets are prepared on future estimated state receipts which have recently been seriously under funded. If the Commonwealth continues to erode local confidence and, consequently, hinders the development of fiscally sound programmed budgets — everyone will be the poorer for it.

Despite minor set backs, this year, has been a great educational experience at Franklin Tech. I would like to extend my appreciation to the staff and student

body for making it so rewarding. Also, I wish to thank the hundreds of parents, townspeople, business and industrial supporters, and my area fellow educators for giving so generously of their time and talents toward our common goals.

Finally, I wish to express my gratitude to you, Mr. Chairman, and your fellow Committee Members. Your constant support, encouragement, and confidence in my administration this year is sincerely appreciated.

With the close of 1977, Franklin County Technical School has been in operation for one and a half years. Many steep hills have been climbed to reach the top of the mountain. The view of the bright sunlight is quite rewarding. There are many small clouds ahead that will shade this sun, but with the vigorous work of your committee, administration, faculty, staff, advisory committees and you the taxpayer, we can become the finest vocational technical high school in the state.

Many sub-committees this year have worked long hours and many nights to build effective employment contracts for teachers and staff. Also, a number of meetings have been devoted to budget preparations this year.

Five resignations from the Committee occurred in 1977 — Judith Beckwith of Bernardston, Francis Dubay, Sr. of Erving, Domenic Ferrante of Greenfield, John Riggan of Rowe, and Joyce Ray of Warwick. This school gained a lot by their long and many hours of work. Their towns should commend them for it. They were replaced by William Cameron of Bernardston, Harold Reed of Erving, Frank Sussenberger of Greenfield, Charles Ogren of Rowe, and David Ray of Warwick. Three vacancies which we had at the beginning of the year are filled by Robert Gruen of Heath, Donald O'Hara of Montague and Paul Westbrook of Wendell.

The Committee, staff, and student body were saddened this year by the death of two faculty members — Harrison L. Barrows, Sr., Instructor in House Carpentry, and Charles Hammann, Jr., Instructor in Vocational Agriculture. Both of these gentlemen will leave a significant gap in our educational community. Also, Mrs. Patricia Clark, Financial Secretary, left school district employment during the year. She was a dedicated worker.

In an attempt to make the Tech School a beneficial community center, a great deal of effort was expended on encouraging widespread use of the school facilities. Many organizations visited our school and used our staff and building extensively. Also, the Committee attempted to reach out to the communities to enable the area school committees to learn more about our school. Introductory meetings were held with the School Committees of Frontier, Pioneer, New Salem, and Gill-Montague.

On behalf of the Committee, I wish to thank Superintendent-Director James J. O'Neil, Jr., his administrative team, secretarial and custodial staff, faculty, advisors, municipal officials and area educators for their assistance during the year. I look forward to another year of fine cooperation between the School District and the communities which have helped to make Franklin County Technical School a great opportunity for all students in Franklin County.

APPORTIONMENT OF OPERATING COSTS

District Agreement, Section IV, E (3) - Operating Costs

"If there is enrollment in the regional district school on October 1 of any year and the total of such enrollment on said date is equal to or greater than 75% of the design capacity of the school, operating costs for the ensuing fiscal year shall be apportioned to each member town on the basis of the ratio which the town's enrollment in the regional district school on said date bears to the total enrollment in the school on said date."

District Agreement, Section IV (F) - Special Operating Costs

The Committee shall determine the operating costs for each fiscal year of any evening trade extension courses or any other types of courses which are offered by the District to persons other than pupils attending the regular day regional vocational school. Each member town's share of such operating costs shall be determined by computing the ratio which that town's enrollment of pupil hours in such courses on November 1 of the year preceding the year for which the apportionment is determined bears to the total enrollment of pupil hours in such courses from all the member towns on the same date.

FISCAL YEAR 1979 APPORTIONMENT OF OPERATING COSTS

District Agreement, Section IV (D) - Capital Costs

"Each member town's share of capital costs shall be determined annually according to the following formula:

- (1) Compute to four decimal places the ratio which the town's total population bears to the total district population as established by the last preceding official United States Federal Census;
- (2) Compute to four decimal places the ratio which the town's equalized valuation bears to the total district equalized valuation as most recently reported by the State Tax Commission to the General Court, prior to the start of the fiscal year for which the determination is being made.
- (3) Add the two ratios computed to four decimal places together, and;
- (4) Divide the sum by two and round off the resultant combined average ratio to nearest third decimal place."
