SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen wishes to thank the various Town Departments for their excellent performances and cooperation during the past year.

Added improvements have been made in the Town Garage, further reducing heating oil requirements and improving working conditions.

Road construction was completed on Petrie Road, including drainage and surfacing which will prevent erosion. Grading and gravelling were done on part of Potter Road. Type "I" pavement was placed on Cross Road and Leshure Road.

The G.M.C. dump truck was sold privately and a new Mack truck purchased for replacement.

The Town Hall was scraped and painted.

The data processing service has been a distinct advantage to the Board of Selectmen, the School Committee and the Finance Committee in the administration of Town Finances and further improvements in the service are underway.

An audit of Town Finances has been performed by the State Bureau of Accounts.

The Board of Selectmen regrets having to report the passing of two well-known residents of Rowe: Miss Rae Kemp, who pioneered the development of the Rowe Historical Society, and Walter Bates, who served the Town in numerous capacities. Both will be sorely missed.

Three permits were issued to installers of sewage disposal systems and one sewage transport license was issued.

One recreational camp for children was inspected and licensed during the summer.

Because of the extremely dry year, the camp found itself in a critical condition due to lack of water. To help solve the problem, a meeting was held to determine what steps should be taken. The camp had a new well drilled and made renovations to the existing system.

Consultation was provided the Board of Health as needed during the year.

I wish to thank the Board of Health for the cooperation extended to me during the year. As a board, the members were very active in town work.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board agenda in 1980 included dealing with Town By-Law conflicts involving property owners, continuation of the Goals for Rowe program started in 1975, and the initiation of a study to determine the feasibility of using the Town Garage area for a new fire station.

The Planning Board newsletter, GOALPOSTS, was also issued during the year. However, this major project is due solely to the efforts of Planning Board member Jane Lindabury, and all credit must go to her. She deserves it. GOALPOSTS is not only a newsletter for general interest items, it also provides a mechanism to announce meetings whether for official town business, church, Grange, Historical Society or whatever. It can also be used by the Planning Board to comply with legal requirements for pre-noticing of Special Permit hearings. We have only heard good reviews of GOALPOSTS.

The Planning Board is also cooperating with the Fire Station Building Committee in the location of a site for a proposed new building. A consulting firm was hired to evaluate the feasibility of expansion in the existing Town Garage and Fire Station area. Their report indicated that the site would be ideal but additional land was needed. This possibility is being pursued.

The Planning Board lost one of its most loyal members with the passing of Walter Bates. Walter never missed a meeting. He was concerned with Rowe's future and was a vocal and active member of the Board. We will miss him.

John H. Williams has filled the vacancy on the Board.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

To the Townspeople of Rowe:

Despite our effort to head off further state intervention in our town's affairs, such as the data form so many of you kindly filled out last spring, it appears that it was too little, too late. Even though we revalued the town last summer, the state has not recertified us for 1981, and in fact, has threatened to send in its own team of Assessors at town expense unless we meet certain requirements.

The two principal areas of criticism are our record keeping methods, which are really inadequate, and the fact that our values for bulk land have remained the same for the past several years, despite inflation. It is difficult to argue with the state on these two points, so the Board is presently undertaking to correct these matters.

However, the state has also socked us with a 13% increase in our equalized valuation. We do not believe this is justified, and although we cannot predict the outcome, the Board has decided to contest the increase. We have also decided to lend our support to other towns in the Commonwealth who have expressed an interest to fight the state's discrimination against small towns in the matter of taxation. Ninety-one cities and towns in the Commonwealth have been ordered to revalue for a second time when the rest of the cities and towns haven't even revalued to 100% "full and fair cash value" for the first time. We are dedicated to trying to develop some political clout to combat this injustice.

One requirement we now confront, we regret to say, is that all homes in town must be visited and measured inside and out. All outbuildings must also be measured. This should help us maintain very accurate and complete records, which in turn should help us in our dealings with the state. We will be sending more complete information in the near future.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT NURSE

To the Board of Selectmen, and the people of the Town of Rowe, I submit my annual report as District Nurse.

Two flu clinics were held in the fall. 78 people in our four town area received the vaccine aimed at A/Brazil, A/Bangkok, and A/Singapore strains. We were able to obtain all the vaccine we needed, even though there was a definite scarcity of the vaccine. Contact me if you are interested in next fall's clinic.

Schools continue to demand an ever increasing amount of time. State mandated procedures: testing of hearing and vision, measurement of height and weight, monitoring of immunizations, assisting the school physician, are all done. New legislation this year is for postural screening of grades 5 & 6. Schools have been thoroughly checked by the school physician, his recommendations are being carried out in an attempt to cut down on the incidence of illness spread as well as problems such as pediculosis and scabies. New diseases seen this year are the cox sackie virus and kawasakie disease. Lifetime immunization booklets were distributed to all students attending school; these are an official document for school and day care entry in Massachusetts.

Nursing procedures are performed by orders from your doctor. Blood pressures are read every Thursday 10-11 A.M. at Rowe Town Hall, and the first Wednesday of each month from 10:30 to 12 noon at the Charlemont Senior Center. If any of these times are not convenient for you, please call me weekdays from 8-9 A.M. at 339-4906

TOWN LIBRARY REPORT

The Rowe Town Library has again had a very successful year. Our collection has been expanded by the donation of 2 large groups of excellent books. Circulation for FY 1980 totaled 11,847 books and periodicals and 490 recordings for a total of 12,337. Our librarian, Dorothy Stevens, constantly strives to please our patrons with the current best sellers and the difficult to find volumes. The permanent collection increased by 396 books and 36 recordings with 68 magazine subscriptions, 18 of which are gifts to the library. Further needs are met by the Western Massachusetts Regional Library System Bookmobile and through Inter-Library Loan.

Exhibits this year ranged from a handcrafted jewelry display by Jacquelin Barceloux to the continuing stamp collections by Alan Bjork.

The library has been completely insulated and a new access door installed on the south side. Leakage and decay caused the replacement of the rear door and wall in the youth room with 6 windows and additional shelving.

The Librarian and Trustees attended courses sponsored by the Western Regional Library System and meetings conducted by the nine town library group.

Used books and paperbacks are constantly on sale at reasonable prices. Friends of the Library sponsor the sale of plastic book bags, available for 25¢, the proceeds of which are used for the benefit of the library.

The Rowe Town Library hours remain the same: Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 1 to 5 P.M. and Friday evenings from 6 to 9 P.M. Everyone is welcome.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Since fiscal year 1975 - 1976 the Rowe School budget has increased from \$244,468 to \$277,667. This \$33,199 increase is approximately 17%. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the cost of living during the same six year period has increased approximately 65%. Our school is feeling the impact of this widening descrepency. Now the dictates of Proposition 2½ cut even further into our budget.

The professional quality of the teaching staff has prevented these reductions from having the severe impact one might expect on the education of our children. Years of classroom experience, openness to new ideas, continuing course work and a positive attitude are all factors in the staffs ability to preserve high educational standards in these times of reduced spending.

With the return of our teachers we have continued to work towards strenghtening the academic curriculum areas. We continue to emphasize the social behavioral goals of having children be courteous to all adults and to each other. We have continued to strive towards increased understanding between Mohawk Regional School and the upper grades at Rowe so the transition for sixth graders can be made smoothly. Thus far nothing has altered my belief that, "The educational process should be a life experience oriented towards developing, in children, high academic achievement, refined social skills, and positive self concept within a structure of freedom with responsibility." I believe Rowe School provides this experience but as personnel and programs are eliminated through budget cuts the depth and breadth of education is reduced. The options are to let these components fall by the wayside or provide an alternative approach. I believe curriculum modifications must be made involving active participation of community members if the school hopes to maintain its high quality. The beginning of the parents information meetings may be a small step towards the kind of community involvement I believe necessary to fulfill this objective.

I would like to thank Mrs. Dorothy Evans and Mrs. Joyce Boutwell for their reliable help as parent volunteers. Mrs. Housner deserves recognition for her continuing Art Program. The results of her students were on display in the Regional School Library during the month of April. I would also like to thank parents and community members who have taken the time to visit the school and ask about what we are doing and why.

ROWE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL LIBRARY REPORT 1980

This past year a grant for \$652.05 funding a library inservice program for all library personnel in the district was awarded by the South Berkshire Educational Collaborative in Great Barrington. A series of workshops on such topics as Book Conservation, Nonbroadcast Video Distribution, Children's Literature and Managing a Library combined with consultants for each building, provided a meaningful inservice program.

The annual allocation of Title IV B funds for the purchase of print and non-print material and equipment for school libraries in the district was \$4,744. This sum was expended in the area of social studies for the nine town regional school district, with material purchased being housed in each respective school library.

Additional on-going programs included inservice for students and faculty, the annual Preview Day held in October, Book Fairs, special art exhibits and National Library Week activities in April. Interlibrary loan continues to support a philosophy of sharing and reducing duplication of materials. The 16 mm. film library housed at the Hawlemont School still supplements non-print holdings and helps to replace the costly rental of films.

Beverly Williams, Helen Mackie, Jane Wishart, Judy Lively and Gladys Shumway are the regular library personnel in our various school libraries, and they, including our many fine volunteers, are to be commended for their efforts and conscientious dedication to the school library programs in our district.

ROWE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Rowe School has been having an eventful year. The School Committee has been unusually busy facing more decisions than usual.

As a matter of policy, the School Committee asked the teaching staff to prepare report cards that would give parents complete and accurate reporting on their children's progress. This was done for grades three through six, and for kindergarten. A new form of reporting for grades one and two is due in the fall.

A new curriculum for reading is being considered which will provide sequence and continuity through all grades. Goals will be set for each child, with a method for determining if these goals are achieved.

Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ has compelled the School Committee to present a no-growth budget. This has been in spite of the following increased cost of oil and electricity, of transportation, of all paper goods (40% for 1980-81 and estimated 15% to 20% for 1981-82), and increased cost of all supplies.

The Summer School Program was held during July. The combination of this program with the Park swimming instructions gave our children enjoyment and constructive use of their vacation time. Unfortunately because of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$, summer school is in jeopardy.

The school energy audit has been completed. The items recommended are mostly structural changes. The implementation is being delayed because of financial considerations. We hope it will be possible to carry out some of the recommendations in the following fiscal year as they would represent sizable energy cost savings to the Town.

The school building was not only built as a school, but as a community center, and is used as one for, at least, fifteen hours a week, year round. The cost of heating, lighting and custodial service for this use are paid from the educational budget. We refer to this because the lighting of the gym, is, by far, the most expensive in the building. We believe, however, that this is a much needed service. We simply want the people of Rowe to be aware of the use of the building.

Our Superintendent of Schools, Bruce Willard, has been called upon many times to show his excellent administrative abilities. His resourcefulness and candor has greatly aided the work of the Committee.

Fred Homer has resigned as principal and it is with regret, that the School Committee accepts his resignation. He has maintained the warm and friendly atmosphere of the school during his term as principal. The Committee wishes him well in all his future endeavors.

Rowe School is your school. The Committee's meetings are open to everyone. They are usually held on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:15 P.M. We need as many of you as possible to be present if the school is to reflect your desires, attitudes and goals. We hope you will attend our meetings.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

It's with pleasure that I write my second annual report as Superintendent of the ninetown area schools. Due to the high cost of printing, the towns have requested that we make our reports brief.

Since the passage of Proposition 2½ in November of 1980 we have had many questions and concerns about the impact of this new law on our educational programs. This law will limit the amount that our various communities can appropriate for the 1981-82 school budgets and will require substantial reductions in the budget. With the loss of fiscal autonomy it will mean that the school budgets will have to be approved by the taxpayers at town meeting. In the case of regional school districts the member towns will each have to approve a budget figure for the 1981-82 school year. This process creates much uncertainty as to the final outcome of the budgets for next year. We are deeply concerned about the effects that will result in our schools if we are required to make drastic reductions in our budgets.

In the past year there has been substantial progress made in the development and implementation of the state mandated Basic Skills Improvement Program. Basic skills assessments in the areas of reading, writing and mathematics competencies are scheduled for April 1981 for all students in grades two, five and eight in the system with the results being reported in May. Plans for assessing listening skills competencies are underway.

Staff members from the several districts will be involved in a Chapter 622 (sex equity) inservice training program during the spring in preparation for a future audit of our school system. Other projects this year include the implementation of the Middle School Program for grades seven and eight at Mohawk Trail and establishment of a district-wide method of student achievement assessments. The Title I Math and Health Education programs have continued this year and have helped to enrich our students academically.

The school district's special education programs are effectively serving over 200 students, offering a full range of diagnostic and prescriptive programs. Several state and regional audits have commented favorably on our programs and personnel.

A new computerized system of data management, many inservice programs, and extensive training in the process of writing educational plans are providing an incentive in implementing the "spirit" of Chapter 766 legislation.

At this point in time our educational systems face many serious challenges. Together, we must face these challenges squarely so that we can provide the best quality education within the framework of our limited financial background.

In closing this report I wish to thank the many people who have supported us this year.

Our successful musical concerts, the class dances, Creative Arts Program and the general inclusion of worthwhile experiences have increased the kind of growth and maturity in our school which has been developing through the years.

The advent of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ has added many challenges to the faculty and administration of this school in their effort to maintain quality of education. The challenge must be accepted not only by the school community, but also by the community as a whole. Now, more than ever, the integration of school and community must become a reality.

Another busy year has passed at the Technical School; some major things were accomplished, First, a change in the Administration structure was designed to eliminate overlapping responsibilities. Some Administrative positions were realigned and others were redefined while still retaining the same fine staffing quality which has existed at the school.

After much study, an agreement was reached to expand the agriculture program to include animal sciences. This has not, as yet, come to full realization, although much ground work has been done. We are anticipating a healthy future in this area, especially when the new Multi-Species Animal Building is operational.

As you know, the second multi-year contract with the Teachers Association was signed only recently. The Committee feels this contract to be fiscally sound and at the same time respectful of the excellent teaching staff that the District has employed.

Your District Committee has twenty-two members and is one of the largest in the State. It seems appropriate to offer a word of thanks to all of the members for their excellent participation and attendance record; a quorum is rarely a problem.

Further appreciation is extended to the entire Tech School Staff for their fine efforts and accomplishments; I would especially like to single out for special praise our Custodial Staff. Their extra care and dedication have helped to keep this the best maintained school in the Commonwealth.

Finally, it is my belief that continued cooperation among and between all concerned will enable the District Committee to continue to maintain the high degree of fiscal responsibility and judgement that has been our trademark in the past.

With high hopes for the future, I respectfully submit this report.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT-DIRECTOR Calendar Year January 1, 1980 to December 31, 1980

I am pleased to submit my fifth annual report of the management of the Franklin County Technical School. As in my previous reports, I will attempt to briefly summarize the more significant aspects that have contributed to our school's growth during this past year.

As in our two previous years, the Tech School reached a maximum capacity in its day school student enrollment. For the first time, however, there is a large waiting list of both District and non-District students. The October 1, 1980 enrollment report listed 576 male and 284 female grade 9-12 students. Our women enrollment continues to increase; and, this year, women were registered in all 18 shops. Fifty percent of this year's ninth grade class were women. The District residents may be interested in the enrollment by trades and technical areas:

The Adult Education Program continues to operate at near capacity in 19 trade and technical courses. In addition, area industries are utilizing the Tech School's facilities and staff in our manpower Training program during our non-school day periods.

As in the past years, the school has been the proud beneficiary of a number of substantial donations from area business and industrial firms. Also, through the generosity of many individuals, firms, and civic and fraternal organizations in the District, our graduation scholarship funds reached another record high.

Since the major goal of a Vocational Technical education is "to prepare students to seek, acquire, and succeed in a specific trade, technical, or occupational field," the school continued to stress and improve our job placement and cooperative work experience programs. Over ninety four percent of the 1980 senior class were successfully placed in career related occupations or advanced into post secondary training programs. Our largest group of seniors, to date, fifteen percent of the class, enrolled in two and four year colleges. Also, through the financial assistance of a federal grant program, a large number of our handicapped students were successfully placed in self-supporting employment.

A major innovation this school year was the inauguration of a school wide testing and remediation program in the state mandated Basic Skills areas. Major emphasis is being directed to the improvement of mathematics, reading, writing, and listening skills as they apply to all subject and shop courses.

As in the past, the Culinary Arts, Agriculture, Auto Mechanics, and Cosmetology programs continue to receive very strong community support throughout the year.

In closing, I would like to briefly offer my assessment of the Technical School's future role in Franklin County. Certainly, along with every town and county municipal body, we anticipate that the fiscal effects of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ will be paramount beginning with the next budget. The District Committee will present, for approval, a FY-1982 Budget four percent over last year's District Assessment. Therefore, we should be within the legal limits. However, it will be impossible to maintain present staff, programming, and operational capacity under a four percent future annual growth pattern. The spector of energy problems, particularly those relating to transportation and utilities, are awesome. This School District has already begun both short and long range energy audits and conservation programs. Every aspect of the school's day and evening programs are being reviewed for cost saving benefits.

The present student application list, and our future projections indicate that interest in this school's programs will continue at a very high degree. Women applicants will continue to demonstrate strong growth. Consequently, with leveling or declining enrollments in the area high schools, it is imperative that an orderly and systematic total county wide educational planning program be implemented. This has already begun.

It seems equally certain that this Vocational Technical training school will be called upon to develop effective long range adult job training and retraining programs. As the County Schools' Coordinator for all Ceta Youth Programs, we have already begun to develop models for successful adult employment programs in association with the other area post secondary schools. As a further assistance toward the area's public and private efforts in developing new jobs and businesses in Franklin County, we have joined with the Franklin County Chamber of

Commerce and the Franklin County Planning Office by offering our computer facilities and staff to assist with future economic analyses.

Finally, I would like to express my gratitude to our entire educational community at the Tech School for their significant assistance and cooperation during our successful fifth school year. I am indebted, also, to hundreds of parents, townspeople, business, industrial, and educational benefactors for giving so generously of their time and talent to our school's growth. And certainly, Mr. Chairman, I wish to express my appreciation to you and your Committee. Your consistent support, encouragement, and confidence in my administration of this fine school is deeply rewarding.

District Agreement, Section IV, E (3) - Operating Costs

"If there is enrollment in the regional district school on October 1 of any year and the total of such enrollment on said date is equal to or greater than 75% of the design capacity of the school, operating costs for the ensuing fiscal year shall be apportioned to each member town on the basis of the ratio which the town's enrollment in the regional district school on said date bears to the total enrollment in the school on said date."

District Agreement, Section IV (F) - Special Operating Costs

The Committee shall determine the operating costs for each fiscal year of any evening trade extension courses or any other types of courses which are offered by the District to persons other than pupils attending the regular day regional vocational school. Each member town's share of such operating costs shall be determined by computing the ratio which that town's enrollment of pupil hours in such courses on November 1 of the year preceding the year for which the apportionment is determined bears to the total enrollment of pupil hours in such courses from all the member towns on the same date.

District Agreement, Section IV (D) - Capital Costs

"Each member town's share of capital costs shall be determined annually according to the following formula:

- (1) Compute to four decimal places the ratio which the town's total population bears to the total district population as established by the last preceding official United States Federal Census.
- (2) Compute to four decimal places the ratio which the town's equalized valuation bears to the total district equalized valuation as most recently reported by the State Tax Commission to the General Court, prior to the start of the fiscal year for which the determination is being made.
- (3) Add the two ratios computed to four decimal places together, and;
- (4) Divide the sum by two and round off the resultant combined average ratio to nearest third decimal place."
