



# Annual Report of the Selectmen

---

One of the most important events that occurred in 1992 was the decision by Yankee Atomic Electric Company to permanently close its nuclear power plant here in Rowe. We were saddened by this news, as we have had an excellent relationship with the plant during the thirty plus years it has been in Rowe. Its closing has had a significant impact on the town, resulting in a 22.5% increase in residential tax bills for fiscal year 1993. Many families have been hit especially hard by the closing also, as Yankee's work force was reduced from 200 to 59 effective December 31, 1992. Decommissioning of the plant may provide employment for the short term, but beyond that any future use of the facility is questionable.


The long awaited opening of the new Rowe/Monroe bridge over the Deerfield River took place in October 1992. New England Power Company's offer to handle the bridge replacement in conjunction with the complete replacement of their No. 5 Dam adjacent to the bridge was accepted by the towns and the State DPW. This was a very complex project with several major unforeseen subsurface problems; especially on the Rowe side of the river bed. Having it overseen by one entity and handled by one construction firm (Daniel O'Connell's Sons, Inc. of Holyoke) saved both time and a considerable amount of money. We appreciate NEPCO's efforts and are very pleased with the results. The selectmen are concerned over the low height of the guard rail on the south side of the bridge, but have been told by the State DPW that the railing is in conformance with height standards.

No word has been received concerning repairs to the town line bridge on Zoar Road. The bridge evaluation report, prepared by the engineering firm of Dufresne-Henry of Greenfield, citing repairs/improvements of \$373,200, has been in the hands of the State DPW in Boston since November 1990. Since that time, all state funding for bridge repairs has dried up. Also, due to a state-wide reshuffling, as of September 1992 Rowe now falls under the jurisdiction of State DPW District 1 in Lenox. We had previously been under District 2 in Northampton. We met with District 1 officials in November 1992, and they assured us they will pursue whatever funds are available for the town line bridge project.

Although not a Rowe project, the replacement of the Rowe Road bridge in Zoar over Pelham Brook (the "barrel" bridge) took place in the summer/fall 1992. This bridge is on the major access route for our town, and we would again like to thank both Charlemont and State DPW officials for complying with our request that a bypass route be kept open during construction. The firm of Petricca & Sons of Pittsfield handled the bridge replacement, and did an excellent job.

In town, repair/reinforcement of the abutments of the bridge on Cyrus Stage Road over Potter Brook was completed by Koch Construction of Greenfield.

The Highway Department, under the diligent supervision of Superintendent Pete Brown, continues to keep the town's infrastructure in excellent condition. Bituminous concrete was laid on Monroe Hill, Newell Cross, Ford Hill, Pond and Leshure Roads, and at the intersection of Potter and Ford Hill Roads. Upper Tunnel and Petrie Roads received a coat of oil & stone. Maintenance of highway department facilities, vehicles and equipment

continues to be handled by our crew, resulting in considerable savings to the town. Included in projects during 1992 was the scraping and painting of the town garage, and a new concrete floor in the main bay area.

The crack sealing of roads has proved beneficial by preventing deterioration of existing pavement between applications of bituminous concrete. The Highway Department will continue this practice in the future.

In May, we were pleased with the acceptance by Mrs. Sarah Jane Gracy of our offer of a new 10-year lease to the Gracy House.

In June, a 20.6 acre parcel of land contiguous to Pelham Lake Park (corner of Cyrus Stage and Pond Roads) was put out to bid by the owner. Our bid of \$700/acre (subject to town meeting approval) was rejected. No further word has been forthcoming on this possible acquisition.

We voted to participate in a block grant for EOCD (Executive Office of Communities and Development) funds for repairs/weatherization of residential dwellings. We are pleased that two homeowners in town qualified for these funds, and repairs to these homes have been completed.

Changing to a bi-weekly payroll effective January 1, 1992, has proved to be both time saving and cost effective to the town. We appreciate town employees adjusting to this new schedule. This has also allowed us to hold bi-weekly Selectmen meetings (except during the busy budgeting season) for most of the year. At this same time we offered direct payroll

deposit to town employees, of which approximately 50% of our employees have taken advantage.

A Premium Conversion Plan (effective January 1, 1993) was offered to all town employees in December 1992. This allows payroll-deducted insurance premiums for full-time employees to be taken from pre-tax income, thus exempting these premiums from state and federal payroll taxes, and increasing the employee's net pay. All eligible employees took advantage of this offer.

The Chapter 30B Procurement Law, which became effective January 10, 1990, initially seemed quite onerous. The regulations have, however, been streamlined over the past few years, and although a little more time consuming in some areas, this law has proved to save the town money. It is especially helpful in small projects and purchases (less than \$10,000), allowing for verbal dickering over prices.

A new Toshiba photocopier was purchased for the Town Hall. The old Canon copier, after being offered to other town departments, was donated to the Rowe Historical Society Museum.

The town is very fortunate to have such dedicated public safety personnel...fire, police, and emergency medical services. In addition to responding to emergencies both in town and through mutual aid to surrounding towns, these individuals must fit many hours of requisite training into their busy work and family schedules. We truly appreciate their concern and sacrifice. Effective December 31, 1992 we accepted, with regret, Barbara Grogan's resignation (due to personal time constraints) as an EMT and as our Emergency Medical Coordinator. We thank Barbara for her service to the town.

A special thank you goes to the Old Home Day Committee (and those volunteering to help them) for a very successful celebration on Saturday, July 11. The weather was perfect, the food outstanding, the entertainment lots of fun, and the fireworks display stupendous as usual. Police Chief Dandeneau was pleased to report that there were no problems during the celebration.

The Board wishes to thank all of the employees and officials in town government for their dedicated contributions of time and service which makes the Town of Rowe the special place that it is to live. We are especially indebted to our Administrative Assistant, Melissa Quinn, for her ongoing assistance and expertise.

Taken from us by death in 1992 were Arvon Palmer, Frederick C. Scrivens, Arnold A. Veber, Katherine L. Brochu, Ferdinand J. Lehr, Geraldine M. Gaudry and Irene S. Veber, all of whom we deeply miss.

**ARTICLE 2:** The motion was made and seconded to approve the agreement entitled "MOHAWK TRAIL REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT AGREEMENT AS RECOMMENDED BY THE K-12 COMMITTEE ON ORGANIZATION AUGUST 27, 1992" pursuant to the "Corollary Agreement" of June 1982 between the Town of Rowe and the Mohawk Trail Regional School District with the express reservation that such approval is contingent upon the dissolution of School Union #65 in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 71, Section 61 and the unanimous approval of all towns voting on the above captioned agreement.

# Board of Assessors

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The most compelling issue we had to deal with during 1992 was the closing of Yankee Atomic Electric Company's plant and how it would affect the local tax base. The plant's officials announced in late February that its shutdown of last October (1991) would indeed be permanent.

In March, the Assessors approached Yankee officials to begin talks on how they planned to handle their tax liabilities. It was a major concern, since their tax contribution accounted for twenty-eight to thirty percent of monies collected. When the meetings were concluded, their valuation was reduced by the Board of Assessors by approximately nineteen million dollars (\$19,000,000.00). This reduced figure would result in a twenty-two and one half percent (22.5%) increase in residential real estate taxes. Many residents were surprised that Yankee's closing could affect them so dramatically.

Each year, on or before March 1st, it is incumbent on each exempt entity in Massachusetts to file a 3 ABC form with the local Board of Assessors. This filing is mandated by state law. If the filing is not done in a timely manner, the exempt organization loses its exempt status for that tax year.

The exempt organizations who must file a 3 ABC form are: Roman Catholic Bishop of Springfield, Rowe Community Church, Rowe Historical Society, and the Unitarian/Universalist Camp/Conference Center (herein called Rowe Camp/Conference Center).

During Fiscal Year 1993, Rowe Camp/Conference Center was returned to a taxable entity, for failure to file their 3 ABC form in a timely manner. It was also discovered that they had not filed during Fiscal Years 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, and 1992. This Board is unable to collect revenues lost by this oversight, according to state law.

On October 11, 1992, our fellow Assessor, Fred Lehr, died suddenly. Fred was originally elected in 1986 and was just beginning his third term, when he was stricken. His wit, dedication, and sense of fair play will be missed.

The office of the Board of Assessors became computerized this past year, and it is hoped that, once the system is fully operational, all tax bills will originate "in-house".

We are looking into the possibility of having a personal computer on the first floor of the Town Hall. This would give all residents and taxpayers the opportunity to "look" at their property and determine if all information is correct, and if not, that taxpayer can write down the correct information on a form, which the Assessors can review and verify through a home visit and then use to update files.

In October, the tax rate was set and approved by the Department of Revenue. The new residential property tax rate was set at five dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$5.98) per thousand dollars of value and the commercial, industrial, personal property (C.I.P) rate was set at nine dollars and eighty-one cents (\$9.81) per thousand dollars of value.

Soon after the tax bills went out, the Assessors began meeting with Yankee officials to determine the Fiscal Year 1994 valuation. A new reduced value of \$28,984,396.00 was determined, and it is not known how greatly this will affect the residential tax rate until residents vote on the appropriated budget at the annual town meeting to be held May 10, 1993.

# Conservation Commission

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1992 saw several changes in the Commission which left it without a chairman. The Commission also went from three members to five.

In 1991, due to heavy rains associated with Hurricane Bob, the bermed area of the waste disposal site above Yankee overflowed depositing grout into Lord Brook and associated sites. After conferring with the Commission, Yankee and New England Power began clean-up procedures. After site inspections by the Commission in September of 1992, it was determined that clean-up had been completed in compliance with the Commission's Order of Conditions.

In October, the Attorney General proposed a joint venture between the Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissions and the Office of the Attorney General that would help to identify wetland cases appropriate for civil or criminal prosecution. Referral of a case "...is not intended to supplant Conservation Commission efforts to enforce violations. Rather it is intended to supplement other options available to Commissions when violators repeatedly or flagrantly violate the Wetlands Protection Act and ignore Commission enforcement efforts."

# Fire Department

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During the last report period the Fire Department responded to twenty-one calls:

6	Chimney Fires
3	Brush Fires
12	Medical Emergencies

As a result of the Department's chimney cleaning program, twenty homes' chimneys were inspected and/or cleaned this year. In the coming year, as in the past, we will clean the chimneys of the elderly and assist able-bodied residents. We will attempt to conduct the cleaning in August and September, before the heating season, so names should be submitted early.

Three different fire prevention programs were conducted for the children and staff of the Rowe Elementary School. The program provided to the child was based on his/her age. The programs included a demonstration of the protective equipment worn by fire fighters, a discussion of fire prevention measures and response to fire emergencies, and a tour of a fire truck and available equipment on the truck. Also included were videos titled "The Smoke Detectives", "Fire Power", and "Plan to Get Out Alive".

During the annual town meeting \$200,000 was appropriated to purchase a new attack truck. A specification for the new unit was written and sent to prospective bidders. (The invitation to bid was duly advertized as required by Massachusetts General Law). Bids were requested for the truck and truck equipment as separate items. Following the bid opening and bid evaluation meetings the bids were awarded to the lowest bidders. The attack apparatus contract was awarded to Conway Associates of Groveland, Massachusetts. The chassis will be built by Mack Truck. The aluminum body will be built by 3D Manufacturing, Inc. of Shawano, Wisconsin. Delivery of the truck is expected the summer of 1993. Much of the equipment has already been received.

The Franklin County Emergency Dispatch Center, which we entered five years ago, has provided reliable, effective service throughout the year. The dispatch service is housed in the Franklin Medical Center in Greenfield. The dispatch center answers our emergency phone and activates the pagers and plectrons of the towns' firemen, policemen and/or EMTs, as necessary. In the event of ANY emergency, (Fire, Police or Medical) dial 339-4961.

Work is continuing on the statewide Enhanced Emergency 911 system. All plans and required numbering of the houses in town must be submitted and approved by July 3, 1993. When the plan is completely implemented, dialing 911 will get emergency service response. The individual answering the 911 call will have the phone number and street listing of the location of the originating call indicated on a computer screen.

The Fire Department is made up completely of volunteers from Town. The effectiveness of this organization is determined by the number of individuals it can train and maintain in a state of readiness, and by the condition of its equipment. We welcome anyone who is interested in protecting his/her own and/or neighbors' lives and property from the potentially devastating effects of fire. Not all of the activities required to prepare for and combat a fire involve hands-on fire fighting. There is plenty of other work with which could use help. Our program of regular monthly training/meetings is announced in the Goal Post for each upcoming month. These sessions are approximately one hour in length. This is a small investment of your time when you weigh it against the potential benefit that may be derived from your membership. The officers of the department would like to take this time to thank all members who participate in fire department activities regularly, and ask other members of the Town to become involved.

I would like to thank June Ahern, of Colrain, for providing First Responder first aid training. Seven members of the police and fire departments received First Responder certification.

# Board of Health

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A major change instituted in 1992 by the Board of Health was the hiring of an attendant at the Refuse Garden simultaneously with limiting dumping hours. This action was taken in an effort to curb rising solid waste disposal costs. Steps had been taken over the past seven or eight years to restrict access by outsiders to the Refuse Garden. In time, these systems became ineffective as cards allowing access eventually fell into the hands of unauthorized users.

The Board is very pleased with the new system. Even with the added expense of an attendant and the cost of constructing an attendant's shed, we are still realizing savings in disposal costs. In addition, the attendant has, on several occasions, averted the town from being dismissed from the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in Springfield which takes our paper/can/bottle recyclables. We had already been placed on notice for an oil-contaminated load sent to the facility in 1991, and one more mishap would have resulted in our dismissal--with fines--from the program. Our attendant has cleaned up other contaminations he has found in loads, before they've been shipped to the MRF.

Contracts with the town's trash hauler (Commercial Disposal of Springfield MA) and landfill (Connecticut Valley Sanitary Landfill) were renewed with a new expiration date of June 30, 1994. Via a program instituted by the Franklin County Solid Waste District, a plastics recycling shed with bins was delivered to the Refuse Garden. These units were constructed by students at Franklin County Technical School and assembled by Dan Wessman, B.J. Roche and several volunteers. The plastics are picked up free of charge by Goodwill Industries. Data disseminated by the Franklin County Solid Waste District shows that from July to December 1992 Rowe residents recycled 3.15 lbs. of plastic per person—the highest participation among the 17 towns in the program. The average participation was 1.38 lbs. per person.

Upon the recommendation of the Stump Dump Siting Committee, there will be no siting of a stump dump in Rowe (see separate report).

The town again participated in a Hazardous Waste Collection Day in the fall of 1992. All of our allotted slots (5) were filled, and the average cost per participating household was \$63.00.

The Board investigated two residential well contamination problems. It was determined that one well was contaminated by a failing sewage disposal system. Upon orders from the Board of Health, the owner had a new septic system installed, and was advised to upgrade the well casing, install a vent, and chlorinate the system. Other residential wells in the area were tested at the town's expense, and no other contamination was found. It was determined that the other well had been repaired previously, and simply needed chlorination.

Town-owned public water supplies (municipal center well, school well, Avery fountain, and pitcher pump and swimming area at Pelham Lake Park (in season) were tested as required. All results were within allowable limits.

The annual cat and dog rabies vaccine/dog licensing clinic was held at the Rowe Fire Station. Dr. Robert Sidorsky (veterinarian) and Norma Brown (town clerk) were present.

Deborah Lively was reappointed Animal Inspector, and B.J. Roche and Daniel Wessman were reappointed Recycling Coordinators. Special thanks to them for their efforts and services to the town.

Our town nurse Dianne Rode was also reappointed. We thank her for her service to the townspeople.

# Health Agent/Sanitarian

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During the year 1992, I observed, with two members of the Board of Health, the performance of four percolation tests for the installation or repair of sub-surface sewage disposal systems.

Of the four tests performed, two lots passed and applications to install were approved and permits issued.

Final inspection of installed systems were made and certificates of compliance issued.

Inspection was made of the Rowe Country Store with members of the Board of Health. A permit was issued.

A nuisance investigation was made of an alleged sewage disposal system. Dye was placed in the septic tank but results of the test were inconclusive at the time. Further investigation will be done in the spring of 1993.

Consultation with the Board of Health was provided as needed during the year.

I wish to thank the Board of Health for the fine cooperation extended to me during the year.

# Town Nurse

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To the residents of Rowe and to the Board of Health, I, Dianne Rode, L.P.N., Town Nurse, submit my annual report. In 1992, a total of 450 skilled nursing visits were completed, including physicians referrals in which post-surgical patients were monitored, diabetic teaching with insulin management, along with medication and nutritional instruction was provided. A total of twenty-two medical emergency home visits were made to town residents.

The Town Hall's scheduled nursing hours continue to be a noteworthy assistance to our residents, demonstrated by the accelerated number of patients I have seen this year. Blood pressure screening and Glucose testing was utilized this year by residents during these hours, although we are now unable to do Strep throat cultures due to a federal regulation and the resulting high cost of certification.

I received many telephone calls in regard to medical questions, and follow-up calls have noticeably increased also.

A total of 100 residents took advantage of the annual Influenza Clinic after requesting an increase in the number of vaccines for our residents. This vaccine was once again provided free of charge through a grant from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

I would like to extend my appreciation at this time to all of the local EMT's who devote their free time to responding to emergency calls for the residents in need of help and to Alexis Franzoso for her invaluable assistance with me during the flu clinic hours which enabled things to run effortlessly for the patients and myself. To my patients, whom I have had the pleasure of providing nursing care to, I look forward to serving all of you for another year.







Nineteen ninety two was an active year for the Park. Many projects were completed. The Percy Brown Memorial Park at the causeway was almost completed. # Stump Dump Siting Committee

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New Department of Environmental Protection regulations state that yard waste (leaves, grass clippings, etc.) can no longer be placed in landfills, but must be composted. This includes brush, which must be chipped and then composted. The only items that may be placed in vegetative landfills are stumps.

In light of this, it was the recommendation of the Stump Dump Siting Committee to the Board of Health that the cost of site preparation and maintenance of a stump dump did not justify the small demand for stump disposal. It is permissible for stumps to be buried on site; or tree professionals may be hired to grind down stumps on location.

The Board of Health has concurred with our recommendation. No further action has been taken by the Stump Dump Siting Committee, and the committee has been disbanded.

# Visiting Nurse and Health Service

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The Visiting Nurse and Health Service in Franklin County, a program of Franklin Medical Center, has continued to provide a comprehensive array of health services to patients recovering from acute episodes of illness, and high risk infants and mothers at home this year. Services are provided by qualified professionals including registered nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists and speech pathologists. Personal care services by trained home health aides are provided as an adjunct to skilled care.

In 1992 the following services were rendered to nine (9) patients in Rowe:

Skilled Nursing Visits:	65
Home Health Aide Visits:	8

In addition, the agency has home health aides, homemakers and personal care homemakers whose services are available to help the frail elderly to remain independent at home by assisting with light housekeeping, personal care, shopping, and errands. Referrals for any of the above services are accepted from physicians, hospitals, patients, and/or families. Call 774-2302 for services.

In addition, the agency provides for the Women, Infants and Children Supplemental Food Program (WIC) for all of Franklin County from our office at 50 Miles Street in Greenfield. Call 774-2302 to enroll.

# Wiring Inspector

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There were seventeen (17) wiring permits issued for the year 1992. I would like to remind everyone that a wiring permit is required in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the installation of wiring and electrical apparatus.

The 1993 code is out with numerous changes. Starting January 1, 1993, all fire alarm systems and security systems have to be done by licensed installers.

# Franklin County Commissioners

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At your 1992 Town Meeting, citizens chose how your town would be represented at the "County Town Meeting" had the proposed Franklin County Charter been approved last November.

The Charter Commission which drafted the proposed Charter wanted to give voters control over how they would be represented by a directly elected representative or through the Selectmen or their designee.

The Charter Bill, which required the state's approval before being placed on local ballots however, was not reported out of House Ways & Means. As such, the Legislature failed to give Franklin County the choice of having a Charter or not.

It's not difficult to understand why the legislature did not give Franklin County voters home rule control over their future as a region. Our Charter would protect County taxpayers from being fleeced by the state when the legislature fails to responsibly fund the County Jail or the state's occupancy of the Courthouse.

The Charter is once again before the legislature. The Commissioners and Sheriff are working together to assure that adequate funding of the Jail does not come at the cost of regional services to the municipalities. Please let your legislators know that Franklin County deserves to decide its own future; and the state needs to meet its responsibilities and get out of the way.

# Franklin County Solid Waste Management Commission

---

Solid waste composting, plastic recycling, hazardous waste collection, and environmental education were the major focal points for the Solid Waste District in 1992.

The plastic recycling program continues to grow, with more than five tons of milk jugs and detergent containers being pulled from the waste stream *every month*. That's about 285 cubic yards each month. Goodwill Industries, our contractor for this program, now operates out of a warehouse in Greenfield, and the program will be expanded to include additional grades of plastic in the Spring of 1993. Using a grant from the Mass. Municipal Association, the District purchased a granulator to reduce the volume of our plastic.

The District coordinated a highly-successful collection of household hazardous waste (HHW) in October, with 713 households from 15 towns participating. Just under 7,000 gallons of toxic materials were collected at four separate sites; the average cost per participating household was \$63.00, which is less than what the last collection (in 1989) cost. The District will sponsor another collection next year for any towns that wish to participate.

The search for a solid waste composting site continued into this year. Four sites were considered and rejected by the District for various reasons; additional sites are now being investigated. At the same time, the District is closely following the proposal of a private developer to build a solid waste and sludge composting facility in Northfield. This could become the destination for our trash and sludge if all works out.

Thanks to a grant from the federal Farmers Home Administration, the District hired a half-time Educational Coordinator to promote environmental educational efforts in our towns and schools. Other environmental education grant proposals have been submitted. We are cooperating with other western Massachusetts solid waste management groups on several of these grants.


As state and federal deadlines for closing unlined landfills draws near, the District has worked with many of our towns to move "beyond the local landfill." The District helped the town of Bernardston open up its landfill to other District towns, which saves money for all the towns using the landfill, and helps Bernardston generate the money needed to close the landfill next year.

Our Administrator is actively working with state officials to determine what will happen when the state subsidy of the Springfield MRF expires in January 1995. Local recycling programs have enjoyed the benefits of free tipping at the MRF, courtesy of the state. Most people expect this to end in 1995; we may need to create a local substitute for the MRF to maintain effective and economical recycling programs.

It has been an active year; next year promises to be equally challenging. The volunteer representatives from our 20 member towns have worked hard to wrestle with the complex solid waste management issues, large and small. They deserve your vote of appreciation. We welcome your continued interest and participation in, and support of, our work.

# SCHOOL REPORTS



## Rowe School Committee

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Over the last year the Rowe School Committee has worked diligently in providing quality education for the children in a positive learning atmosphere while maintaining fiscal responsibility despite serious space limitations.

Mary Jo Phelps joined the Committee and was appointed as secretary.

The Long Range Planning, Personnel and Policy and Procedure sub-committees were moved back into the regular school committee meeting and a half hour was set aside to discuss the structure of the building (overcrowding issues) and an additional half hour was spent on the educational issues at each meeting. This enabled all three School Committee members and Heath Committee members to be present for discussion of issues. A time line of six months was set for formal reports to be made to respective towns.

An architectural study by Alderman and McNeish on ways the existing structure could be modified to accommodate educational needs including proposed cost of modifications was completed and presented to the people of Rowe and Heath at three forums.

A one year agreement was signed with the Town of Heath to tuition students to Rowe School at a rate of \$2000 per full time student and a share of the Rowe School specific budget increase based on percentage of Heath students attending.

Maggie Rice, as Chairperson, continued to work with the district towards a K-12 regionalization. Rowe would not be accepted as a member, but because of contract language the Town of Rowe's rights are preserved to continue educating our students at Mohawk Trail Regional High School and also share in contracts for superintendent and transportation.

All personnel were hired back for the 92-93 school year, including twelve professional teachers, full and part-time, and thirteen support staff personnel.

A pilot Spanish program with Joanne Giguere as instructor was begun. This was an introduction to the language only and was hoped to be used as a possible gradual implementation of a K-6 second language program.

The Committee adopted a program with the help of Massachusetts Electric Company for the replacement of all fluorescent bulbs in the Rowe School along with replacement of all gym lighting fixtures as well as additional changes in outdoor lighting for energy efficiency. This program was completed and a savings of one third of the current bill should be realized.

The process of education with all the issues has been very complicated over the last year and all townspeople need to remain informed concerning the issues of overcrowding, K-12 regionalization education reform in Massachusetts, School of Choice and capping enrollments.

We as a committee encourage townspeople to attend our meetings regularly and want to thank all of you for your support over the last year.

# Rowe Elementary School

## Principal's Report

---

As a child, someone once told me that the older one gets, the faster the years go by. Well, 1992 was a year that seemed not to be quite a year even though the calendar had 366 days!

As always, Rowe School was bustling with activity throughout the year. Children were involved with the Rowe School traditional programs. Downhill skiing became an all school winter physical education program. Nearly 100 skiers hit the slopes in January and early February. Snow was hard to find, but our skiers benefited greatly from the chance to be outdoors during the long winter months. The trip for sixth graders to Washington D.C. took place in early May when students actually met George Bush in the White House. Students took vans south rather than the train and stayed in a motel outside the city instead of a youth hostel in the heart of the city. Fifth graders also continued the tradition by once again going to Cape Cod. John and Wanda Musacchio accompanied Leonard Schoenfeld and seventeen children on this science and natural history extravaganza.

Rowe School's cultural events once again continued this year. Thanks to local support, Parent Teacher Partnership funding, and grants from the Heath and Rowe Arts Lottery Councils, children experienced many interesting programs. Onye Onyemache delighted the school with a visit in early February. Onyemache, an African who visits the states often, spent a day with the children spreading his uplifting nature through native dance and song. This program was part of our world study program which occurs each year. During 1992 the children learned about the people, places and happenings of many of the countries of southern Africa.

Other cultural events included musical performances by the "Young at Heart Chorus", a group of energetic and talented senior citizens, and "Playing Together", a group of local youngsters and seasoned musicians dedicated to classical music. Both events were exceptional experiences for Rowe School students, as well as for many visiting community members.

Another wonderful experience for all of us at Rowe School was the play, Prince Fire Fade and the Jewel Princess performed by the professional actors and actresses from Stage West, who came to the school in December. Students, teachers and visitors were awed by the group's exceptional acting talent. Children were also delighted when these talented people visited each classroom and spoke to the children after the performance.

Rowe School faculty and administration continued to revise language arts curriculum materials. Much time has been spent working together identifying the scope and sequence of skills taught at the elementary level. Teachers have identified class book lists, which accompany children year to year. Also, we have decided to include two writing samples that move with the children each year, as well. In June, faculty and administration met for a week to begin the process of evaluating how science is taught at Rowe School. Science content was

streamlined to include three science disciplines. Earth science, biological science and physical science will be taught at each level beginning at the kindergarten level. Working together, the team also identified concepts that are appropriate for each of our seven grade levels. Teachers then viewed catalogs and previewed materials and began the process of developing science kits for their own topics. The evaluation process in science will be explored in the first half of 1993.

Another interesting happening in the area of science was the addition of a summer program at the school in 1992. The daVinci Project, designed and run by parent Patti Lentz and myself, took place during three weeks in July. Students entering grades four, five and six had the opportunity to explore many scientific phenomena through group and independent projects. Chemical experiments, projects with birds and bubbles, many real animals, and even a visit to the Boston Science Museum, made this project an active, enjoyable experience for everyone involved.

No new staff members were hired this year, although several people chose new assignments. Joanne Giguere returned to her special education position from grade six. Karen Fornier took over as teacher in grade six, after many years teaching grade two, and Roberta Baker left special education to teach the second grade children. All three teachers deserve much credit and thanks as each of them worked extremely hard during the summer to prepare for their new assignments.

Other projects that have occurred this year that have proved to be exciting changes to the normal program included an inspiring contra dance unit designed by music teacher Edward Hines and physical education teacher Kathy Sprague. Also, thanks to the participation of Readiness/first grade teacher Janice LaPointe and special education teacher Joanne Giguere, twelve volunteers from grades five and six spent a weekend training with these staff advisors and Buckland-Shelburne teacher Marcia Schuhle as student mediators. The mediation program is designed to allow students the opportunity to discuss and solve conflicts with one another without the direct involvement of adults.

This year the school committee, after much discussion and debate, voted to establish an enrollment cap of 90 students. It is anticipated that the kindergarten class at Rowe School will be capped at twelve students for the 1993-94 school year and for each year thereafter until the enrollment cap is reached.

The establishment of the enrollment cap was a difficult decision for everyone involved in both communities. This decision will require the enrollment of some Heath students in other area schools for the first time in many years.

The staff and administration at Rowe School will continue to provide a quality education to all students.



# Superintendent of Schools

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This year the Legislature and Governor Weld are again involved in a debate on the creation of an Education Reform Bill for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Last year the various parties were unable to agree on what components the Education Reform Bill should include.

As of January 1993, the major highlights of the proposed legislation are as follows:

1. It limits the role of the school committee involvement in personnel matters to the hiring and dismissal of the superintendent. The superintendent would be responsible for the hiring and dismissal of all other central office employees. Principals would be responsible for the hiring and dismissal of all staff members subject to a review and prior approval of the superintendent.
2. Tenure for teachers and administrators would be eliminated.
3. Local school education councils would be established for each school. The council would be very active in advising the principals and school committees in all aspects of local school operations.
4. The council would be the municipal appropriating authority to approve school committee collective bargaining contracts.

The Reform Bill would require the establishment of K-12 regional school districts by 1997 under the governance of a single waiver of the policy from the Commissioner of Education.

Much uncertainty still exists regarding the financing of the educational reform plan. It would be unfortunate if the law was passed without sufficient financial benefits to school districts. School systems are under duress and will continue to struggle until a long range financial plan is established in Massachusetts. Preliminary figures show only modest financial gains for local school districts in any of the education reform funding proposals.

During this school year, a major effort is underway to consider the expansion of the eight communities in the Mohawk Trail Regional School District to a single K-12 regional school district. In October 1992, special town meetings were held in nine communities, including the Town of Rowe. Six communities approved of the amendments to create a K-12 regional school district. Three communities either voted to defeat the amendments or approved other amendments which had the effect of defeating the K-12 amendments. Some communities were concerned about loss of voting representation on the single school committee, and loss of local control. Two communities have established study committees to review the specific impact of a K-12 school system in their respective towns. Voters in all nine communities must approve the establishment of a K-12 school district.

The K-12 Committee on Organization is working diligently on revising the district agreement in an effort to find a compromise that would encourage the approval of all communities.

Under existing state funding formulas the approval of a K-12 school district would provide approximately \$900,000 in additional funds in the 1994-95 school year. If a K-12 school district existed in the current school year, the school systems would have been eligible to receive the \$900,000. These funds would have consisted of \$818,000 in school district aid and an additional \$73,000 in Equal Education Opportunity Grant funds. If a K-12 school district is approved prior to June 30, 1993, the school district will receive \$165,000 for the 1993-94 school budget.

It needs to be noted that these figures are based on existing funding formulas which could be changed if an education reform package is approved and becomes effective July 1, 1993.

The need for additional state funding becomes very evident as school committees develop budgets for the next year. At Mohawk large increases in assessments will be necessary to maintain existing educational programs. There is a need for three additional teachers to accommodate an increase in enrollment of 60 students. There is a critical need for more space to house the increasing numbers of students that will be attending Mohawk in the next five years. The building needs a new roof, upgrading of the heating system, new equipment for the computer programs, and other improvements. There were 38 recommendations pertaining to the building contained in a report of the Visiting Committee of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges in October of 1992. In addition, the budget decisions for all elementary schools will be difficult as they face similar problems relative to space and program needs.

Building committees have been approved by most of the school committees in order to address the serious space needs that confront the schools. It's imperative that these building committees make recommendations to respective school committees by the end of the current school year in order to address the long term educational needs of the various schools.

# Mohawk Trail Regional High School

## Annual Report of the Principal

---

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present my eleventh annual report as principal of the Mohawk Trail Regional High School. In the past year the school population has grown to 725 students which is slightly above the rated operational capacity of the school. Ninety-eight seniors will graduate this June and we expect our incoming seventh grade to bring 165 students in September. This marks the beginning of several years of large growth in population. We anticipate nearly 900 students by 1996.

In the fall of 1992, a fifteen member visiting team from the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges spent four days here to evaluate the school's compliance with the standards of membership. The report, issued in November, pointed to a hard-working, dedicated staff, an excellent student body and a challenging academic program. The visiting committee also noted the insufficiency of finances to support educational programs and the great needs of the physical plant, including the need for a new roof and expanded space for classes. There was also a clear indication that the school needed to upgrade its computer hardware and its technology programs.

Athletic programs are continuing and demonstrating high degrees of success. Our thanks to the Mohawk Athletic Association for its enduring support. Also many thanks to the host of school and community organizations for their assistance in replacing the bleachers on the football field which had been condemned. The Middle School Musical "Meet Me In St. Louis" was an acclaimed success throughout the county. This spring will bring a repeat of "Oklahoma", the all-school musical. In academics, the school has added an Advanced Placement Course in American History and is refining its curriculum in math to include a course in statistics. We anticipate that 60% of seniors will continue their education at two and four year colleges.

Once again we face the uncertainty of state financial support of education and the confusion engendered by the various forms of legislative reform packages. It appears that the sole stable support of education are the nine-town citizens who historically do whatever is necessary to insure that their children receive a quality education.



# Special Education Annual Report

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As of December 1, 1992 there were 315 children receiving special education services throughout the nine towns of the Mohawk Trail Regional School District. This accounts for approximately 17% of the total student population.

The majority of special services are provided within the individual's school district whenever possible. When, as in some cases, it becomes more effective to provide out-of-district services, such services are sought.

Chapter 766 of the Acts of 1972 requires that, ..."school age children: any person of ages three through twenty-one up to his/her twenty-second birthday, who has not obtained a high school diploma or its equivalent because of a disability consisting of a developmental delay or an intellectual, sensory, neurological, emotional, communication, physical, specific learning or health impairment or combination thereof", is unable to progress effectively in regular education and requires special education services in order to successfully develop the child's individual educational potential.

In order to meet the needs of our students, a wide variety of services are provided. A number of these services and their providers cover the entire nine town district, while others are found in individual districts.

System-wide, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy and the services of an Early Childhood Coordinator are provided. A great deal of the therapy is on a one-to-one or small group basis. The goals and objectives that the therapist and student work on are addressed in the child's Individualized Education Plan. These goals and objectives are periodically reviewed so the child's program will continuously provide for the best possible program.

The Early Childhood Coordinator is responsible for implementing federally mandated child search activities in the nine town area throughout the year. The Early Childhood Coordinator coordinates and/or participates in: a) special needs screening of preschoolers age 3 to 5 years; b) special needs screening of Kindergartners; and c) team meetings of preschoolers and Kindergartners. The Early Childhood Coordinator acts as a liaison with outside agencies serving young children as well as coordinating special education services to preschoolers ages 3 to 5 years. The Early Childhood Coordinator also acts as a resource person to parents, teachers, and other school staff in regard to resources, programs, and services for your special needs children.

The goal of our special education system is to "mainstream", that is to integrate the children into the regular education programs as much as possible. The special education programs within our district strive to mainstream youngsters as much as possible. There are nine special needs rooms throughout the nine town district. Most of the students serviced by

these programs are seen for areas such as language arts, math, study skills, etc. The special education instructor often coordinates the child's program with that of the regular education program. With the assistance of the special education aides, the goals and objectives of each child's Individualized Education Plan are implemented and periodically evaluated.

Each of the schools within our district receives services from a school psychologist. The school psychologist contributes a variety of services to our schools. Chief among these services are their assessments of individual's ability and the counseling provided to individuals.

All of the support services provided within our nine town district depend upon the strong networking of talents. Parents, through individual and Parent Advisory Council support, school personnel and outside support agencies, all assist in providing guidance in programs for children in both special and regular education programs. It is this coordinated effort that strengthens special education programs and enables us to meet the special needs of those we serve.

# School Library/Media Services Report

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Goals for the six school library/media centers in our school district included updating the card catalog, weeding outdated material, repair of audio-visual equipment, refinement of library skills curriculum and establishment of a student assistant training program. The publication of a catalog of all non-print material in our school libraries is a district wide goal that will reduce duplication of expensive software. At Mohawk Trail Regional School the utilization of MassLearn Pike television programming for curriculum enhancement has been a major project. A satellite dish was installed on the roof of the school, and classrooms will have access to both cable and local programming. The Falls Cable Corporation television studio located adjacent to the Resource Center has provided excellent technical assistance for many student productions. Under the guidance of Dr. Mark Purinton and Mr. Robert Kugell, an after-school course in television production has been offered to students for high school credit.

This past year a portion of the budgets for personnel and supplies was reinstated in many of the school libraries that had previously experienced budget cuts. Although still not completely restored to level funding, the six school libraries have been operating with resumed efficiency as indicated by the following total circulation statistics for the school district:

# Report of the Superintendent/Director

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January 1, 1992 to December 31, 1992

I am pleased to submit my eighth annual report of the administration of the Franklin County Technical School. As in previous reports, I will briefly report only on those significant events that have contributed to our school's growth and progress during the past year.

The student enrollment decreases which have been in evidence in the nation, state, and county high schools for the past seven years appear to have come to an end. The school enrollment increased this year and sending school numbers indicate this trend should continue for the next few years.

As in every year since this school's opening, perhaps the most serious problem facing this School District is the major handicap of attempting to establish educationally sound and fiscally responsive operational budgets nearly two years in advance of the expenditure calendar for those budgets. This difficulty is compounded by the fact that nearly fifty percent of the cost of every regional school budget is borne by state reimbursements. When, as it often happens, the state changes reimbursement projections, after local budgets have been finalized, the results are destructive to effective budget analysis and management.

We continue to enroll unemployed or underemployed adults on a full time basis into our regular day programs. This will provide skill training or retraining to assist these people in entering the job market.

A very successful Career Fair was held last Spring and eighth graders from each of the sending schools were given an opportunity to explore careers in many vocational fields. Articulation agreements with Holyoke, Springfield Technical, and Greenfield Community Colleges have been signed which allow our students to receive college credit based on their competence in vocational programs.

As in the past, a large number of community service projects were completed by our school production shops. The annual house building project (being built this year in Greenfield) is our major project, however, a large number of District towns benefited from the skills of our student body. We have also been involved in a number of remodeling projects at County Senior Citizen Centers and the construction of recycling sheds for several member towns.

The Tech School continues to receive a large and varied number of federal grants allocated to curricular improvement. The school receives in excess of two hundred thousand dollars in direct grant dollars to assist us in developing a large number of vocational and special education programs. Furthermore, a number of our area businesses and industrial firms donated valuable materials, equipment, and services to our school.

Our work experience and cooperative work programs continue to be very effective job placement vehicles for the Tech School student. As of September 1992, our Senior placement record was as follows:
