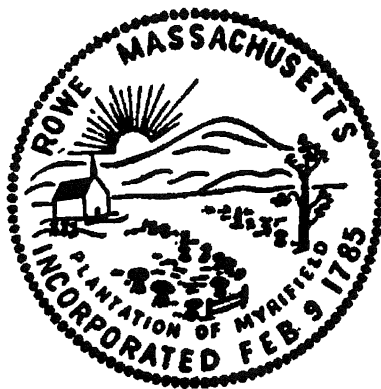

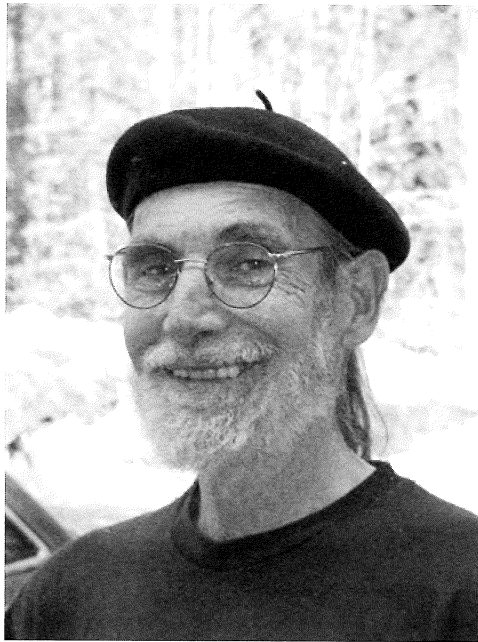

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Board of Selectmen

This has been a year of changes for the Town of Rowe. For one thing **Jack Williams** who has served the town in many positions for the past 30 years retired. At the Annual Town Meeting in May he was honored by then Chairman David Scrivens with a certificate of appreciation and a bottle of white out—with the comment that in case he (Jack Williams) decided to come back into politics, all he would have to do is white out the current retirement date and enter the new one when he retired again—thus saving the town from having to give him another certificate. This was accepted with the humor and well wishes that were intended.

Though the Selectboard still meets every other Tuesday, the times have been changed from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. This was done so that all interested parties would have a chance to come to one of the meetings. This was done at the June 28th meeting. Later when we got into the Fall we then voted to make the meetings starting with the first one in December all 10:00 a.m. meetings, as none of us really wanted to come out on a cold winters night or end up having to cancel meetings because of snow storms or icy conditions. This will change back April 1st to alternating between 10:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m. meetings.

At the annual election in May Ms. Myra Bennett Carlow was elected as our newest Selectman, making it the first time in the history of Rowe that two women were serving on the Selectboard at the same time. Welcome aboard Myra.

The New Year also started with a new Town Clerk, **Heidi Cousineau**. She replaced former Town Clerk **Sue Wood**. I hear that since Sue has moved on to other things she has been going to college and has made the dean's list. It's good to see a former town employee doing well in their personal life, whether it is in retirement or academics.

Department of Public Works

As Selectmen it is our responsibility to work with our Public Works Department. This year the Selectmen made changes to hours the crew was working. We put them on a forty hour week with no overtime unless in an emergency for the non-winter months, working four 10's—four 10 hour days per week—with a flying 20 minute lunch break. What that means for those of you like me that didn't know what that means is that wherever the crew is at lunchtime, they take a twenty minute lunch break and then get back to work. Otherwise, if they went back to the garage then they got their regular lunch break with no pay. All the road crew seems to really enjoy the change and the longer weekends. Who wouldn't! The crew worked these new hours starting the first week of May going to the end of October. In November they went back to five 8's—five 8-hour days per week—for the late fall and winter months.

I also would like to take this time to personally thank **Jim Taylor** and ALL the road crew for their excellent job at maintaining the roads in fair and foul weather.

Public Safety

This part of the Selectman's report I take great pleasure in writing. I personally feel—and I am sure everyone in Rowe feels the same way—that just saying "Thank You" isn't really enough. **Police Chief Henry Dandeneau, Fire Chief/Emergency Management Director Ed May and EMS Director Gail May** and all of their personnel always go the extra mile to protect and serve this town. Our heartfelt Thank You to all of you!

Town Hall Staff

I wish to take this time to thank **Ellen Babcock** who took this new fledgling in politics under her wing. You have given me much support and answered any and all questions pertaining to town government. Also, I wish to thank the rest of the town hall staff for their dedicated and efficient work...**Sandy Daviau, Florence Veber, Sue Williams**, and our newest member **Heidi Cousineau**.

Other Highlights of 2005

The remodeling of the front entrance to the town hall is mostly completed. The new steps are in and the front doors have been replaced. There is a hand rail down the center of the steps for added safety. There is also a new side walk. It all looks really nice. There was one glitch though. It seems there is a leak somewhere in the heating system for the side walk to keep it free of ice. That will have to be repaired this coming spring.

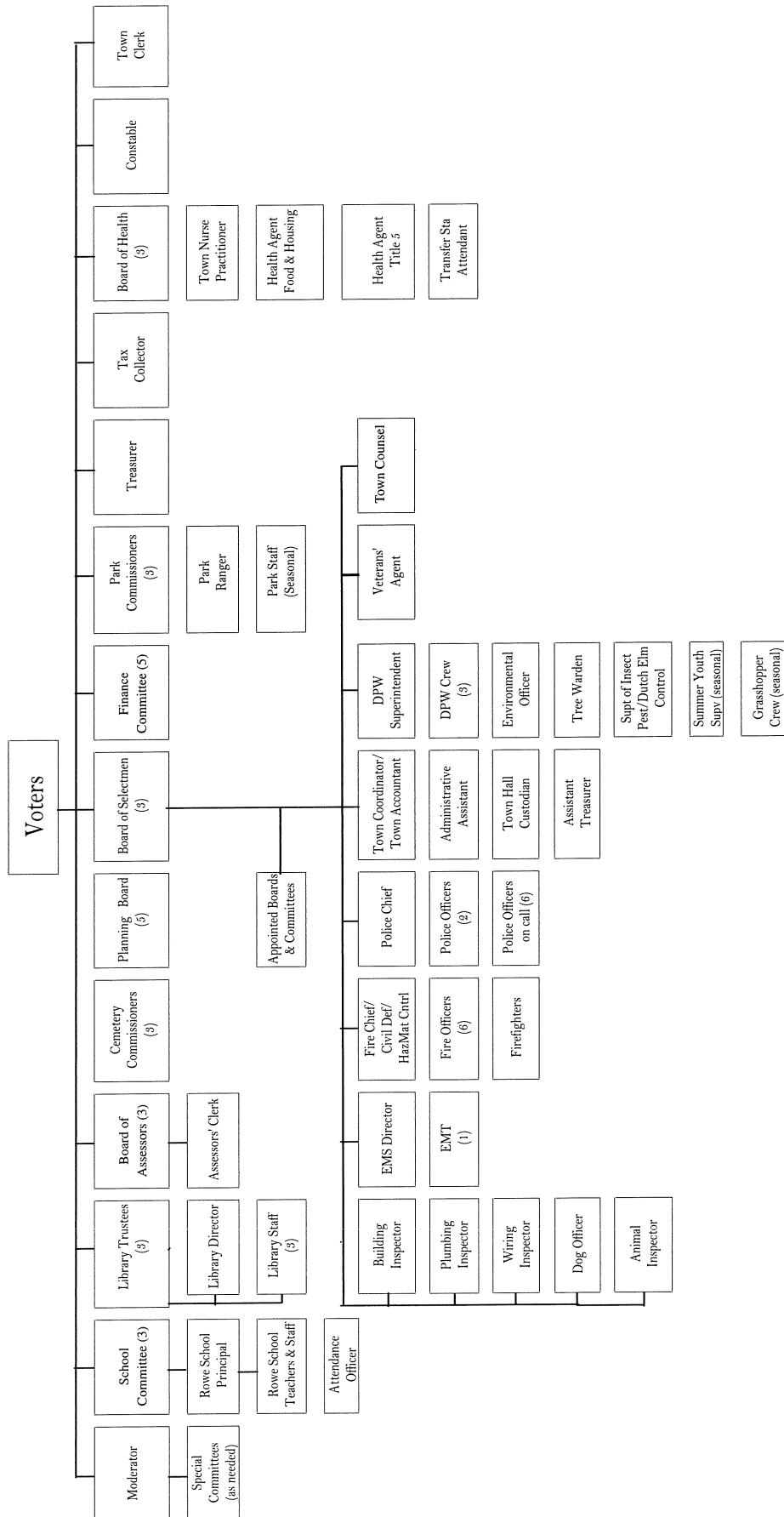

Town of Rowe Organizational Chart

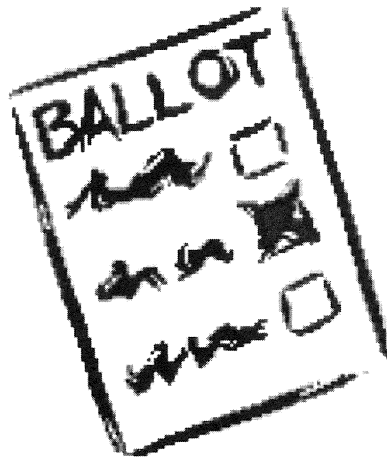

Franceschetti and Marion S. Franceschetti. Containing 8,099 square feet."

2. Engaging in projects and activities to promote farming activities and traditions and farmland protection in town, including programs and community events.
3. Reporting on its projects and activities on an annual basis within the town report.

Section 3a: Noncriminal Disposition

Any by-law of the Town of Rowe, or rule or regulation of its officers, boards, or departments, the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may, as an alternative to criminal proceedings and at the discretion of the municipal officer who is the proper enforcing person, be enforced in the manner provided in Section 21D of Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws. The non-criminal fine, if not otherwise specified by by-law or General Law, shall be \$50.00 for each offense. Each day on which a violation exists shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

"Enforcing person" as used in this by-law, shall mean any Town police officer of the Town of Rowe with respect to any offense; and the members of the Conservation Commission and its designees, the members of the Board of Health and its designees, and such other officials as the Board of Selectmen may designate, each with respect to violation of by-laws and rules and regulations within their respective jurisdictions. If more than one municipal official has jurisdiction in any given case, any such official may be an enforcement authority with respect thereto.

Amendment #1: A motion was made and seconded to include the words "after a warning" after the words "shall be \$50.00 for each offense". **The amendment passed.**

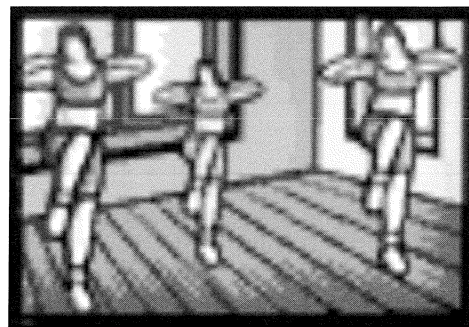

Rowe Town Library

The library collection totals 14,971 books, 386 print periodicals and 1,123 video cassettes/DVDs. Total circulation for 2005 was 4,800.

We continue to update the library collection by discarding outdated materials and adding current information. We get two local weekly newspapers and continue to upgrade historical, medical and technology books as well as the newest fiction and nonfiction. We explore computer upgrade options.

We continue to receive support with the loan of videos, audio books, and regular and large print fiction from the Western Massachusetts Regional Library System book-mobile delivery, and we fill requests with Interlibrary Loan.

The Rowe Town Library continues the custom of providing a family library number to those who want one. Anyone who wants an individual library account instead may get one by simply asking. While we have only 211 library accounts, because of the family option we figure we have 345 library borrowers, including seasonal visitors.

The Book Club continues to meet at the library every month. A preschool story hour was presented in the spring, and the children's reading program in the summer was received with enthusiasm....ending with a sleepover.

Time was spent in 2005 in bookwork for the successful application for the FY2006 State Aid to Public Libraries Grant.

The building offers the usual challenges of any aging building. It was painted this year, and we are dealing with drainage issues.

Staff consists of the Library Director for 20 hours per week for 11 months; and two assistant positions (one position shared between two people on a seasonal basis) and one custodian position for a total of 20 hours per week year round.

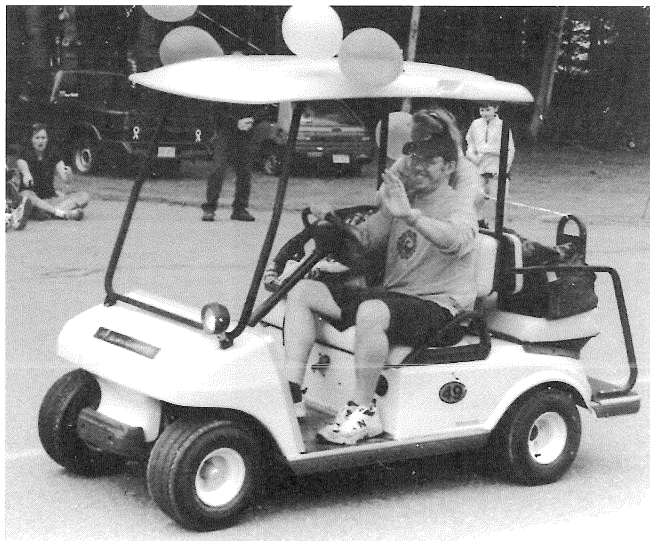

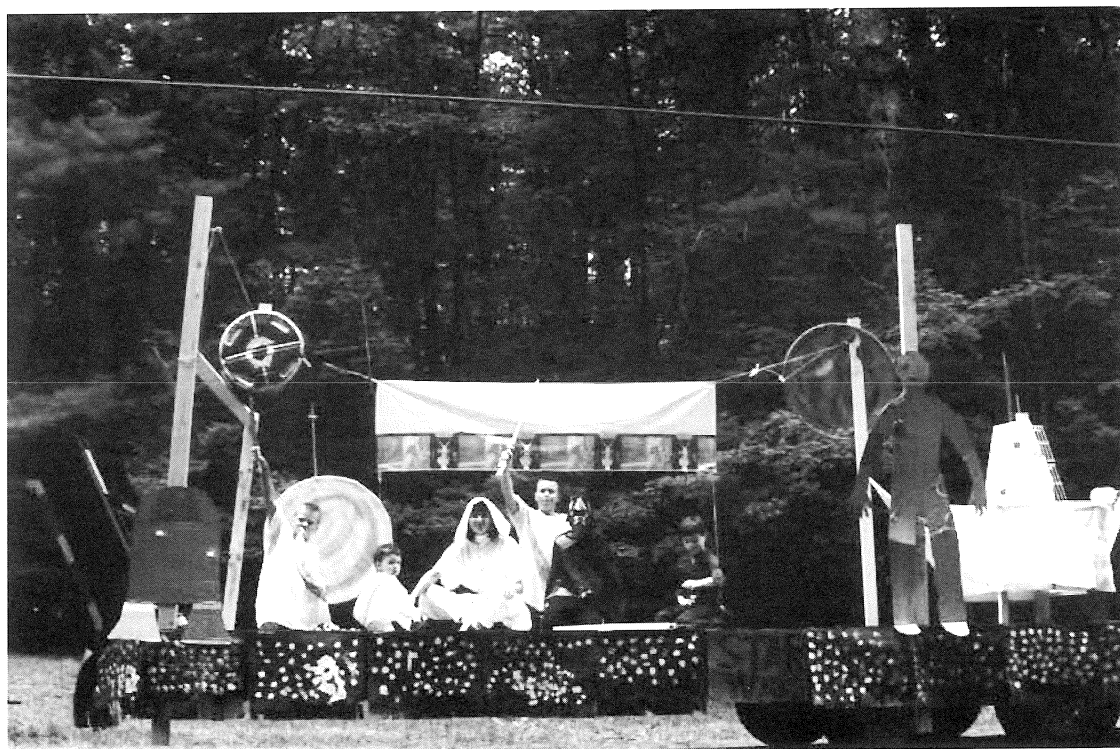

Rowe Elementary School – Principal’s Report

It is with great pleasure that I submit the 2005 Principal’s Report for the Rowe Annual Town Report. Calendar year 2005 continued the tradition of the great learning adventure for our students. I find it especially rewarding in seeing my eldest son begin his journey at the Rowe Preschool. Almost every morning the first question raised is “Daddy, is today a school day.” If we as educators are able to encourage this enthusiasm with students each of the 180 days that we are privileged to work and play with them I am much more confident of success in lives.

Similar to the New England Association of Schools and Colleges’ visit to Rowe in 2004, the State Department of Education made inspection visits to the Rowe, Hawlemont, and Mohawk Schools. For four days in January a team of six inspectors poured through seemingly every file related to twenty standards—from assessment, curriculum, instruction, student participation, budget and finance, professional development, and student support, to policies and leadership, facilities and more. The team interviewed everyone from support staff and teachers, to principals, the superintendent, town finance people, and students. The results of the visit came back in November...Rowe, Hawlemont, and Mohawk do a good job. Something we already knew. The report did go on to specifically note that the Rowe School did most everything very well. One of the inspectors commented during a walk-through that if he had younger children today he would want them to attend the Rowe School. Again, something we knew and are proud of—but it is always great to hear the words spoken.

Other highlights for 2005 included our third group of students with high proficiency in Spanish to be sent on to the Mohawk Middle School, with a teacher paid for by the Rowe District Budget for grades seven and eight. It was also the fifth year of Rowe providing for a combined position of technical support and technology instruction at Mohawk; something that benefits Rowe students and others in the combined district.

Improvements to our curriculum included a new Language Arts series for the Primary Classroom that is quite strong in the five areas of reading: comprehension, phonics, phoneme awareness, fluency, and vocabulary. Plans are in the works for adding this program into grades three and four next year and possibly a new preschool language arts program. We also added a new Social Studies textbook in the fourth grade and are looking at possible changes in the third grade book. Technology also took another leap forward as we were able to purchase a mobile computer lab of 20 wireless Apple® laptops courtesy of a Federal Grant. The lab on wheels is able to move into classrooms, and we were able to change the computer lab into an annex for the Primary Classroom for additional language arts instruction.

The school-wide Cultural Studies Unit in 2005 was China that ended with a spectacular evening performance. Our artist in residence, Mau-Mau, from Mainland China now living in Cambridge, Massachusetts, worked with students on the culture and history of China. They sang, painted, and danced—yielding a greater understanding of another great culture. A Community Lunch with a large selection of food with Chinese origins was a treat for everyone attending. The China unit mini-courses included fine arts, dance, cuisine, and some meditation.

In May our fifth and sixth grade students spent five days in Washington D.C. During the extended field trip our students visited with our Congressional Representative John Olver, and were able to view some of the ongoing debate on gun control in the House of Representatives. The Smithsonian Museums, a play at the Kennedy Center, a visit to Arlington National Cemetery and a good many of our national memorials were also visited.

Massachusetts Comprehensive Testing (MCAS) scores for Rowe students remain high with our students still scoring well above all the State averages. I am pleased that these results come at not “teaching to the test,” but continuing instruction with rich thematic units. 2006 will bring additional testing so that grades three through six will all test in mathematics and language arts.

Our professional staff continues ongoing professional development in all areas of instruction in order to maintain proficiency as well as to meet many of the new criteria of highly qualified teachers from the *No Child Left Behind* Federal legislation.

The after school program was greatly expanded again in 2005. After-school offerings—which had already included baseball, basketball, and soccer for seasonal sports—now include a Monday through Thursday daily program that begins with a snack and homework help followed by an activity that might be a nature walk, snow shoe adventure or other outdoor activity. There are weekly piano lessons and the Girl Scouts and Brownies also meet regularly in the school. The building continues to be used after school just about every school day.

We had one staff change in 2005. Colleen King left Rowe School for the Peace Corps and an assignment in Gambia, West Africa, after eight years of great service as our librarian and Spanish teacher. By way of a curriculum designed by Colleen our students got a great start in a second language, Spanish. Students not only had fun learning Spanish, they assessed well. The first visiting team from the high school to assess how our students were doing was amazed at their skill level, and this is why the Middle School now has a Spanish program to further their skills. Thank you again to the

Town of Rowe for your generosity in funding this program. Colleen's replacement is Carolina Gomez-Kramer who, originally from Columbia, now lives in Greenfield with her husband and infant daughter. Carolina comes to us from Wellesley Public Schools.

The new well was dug in June and connections were completed at the end of this year. Near future plans include the repair of the soccer field (that includes the baseball field) which entails fixing the poor drainage that has precluded the Rowe School from hosting home games. Other hopeful plans include a feasibility study to look at the entire infrastructure, including the boiler, windows and doors, in order to tighten up the building in these days of rising energy costs.

The entire staff and I continue to thank the Town of Rowe for its generous support of its elementary school and the Mohawk Trail Regional Middle/High School where our students move along on their educational journey.

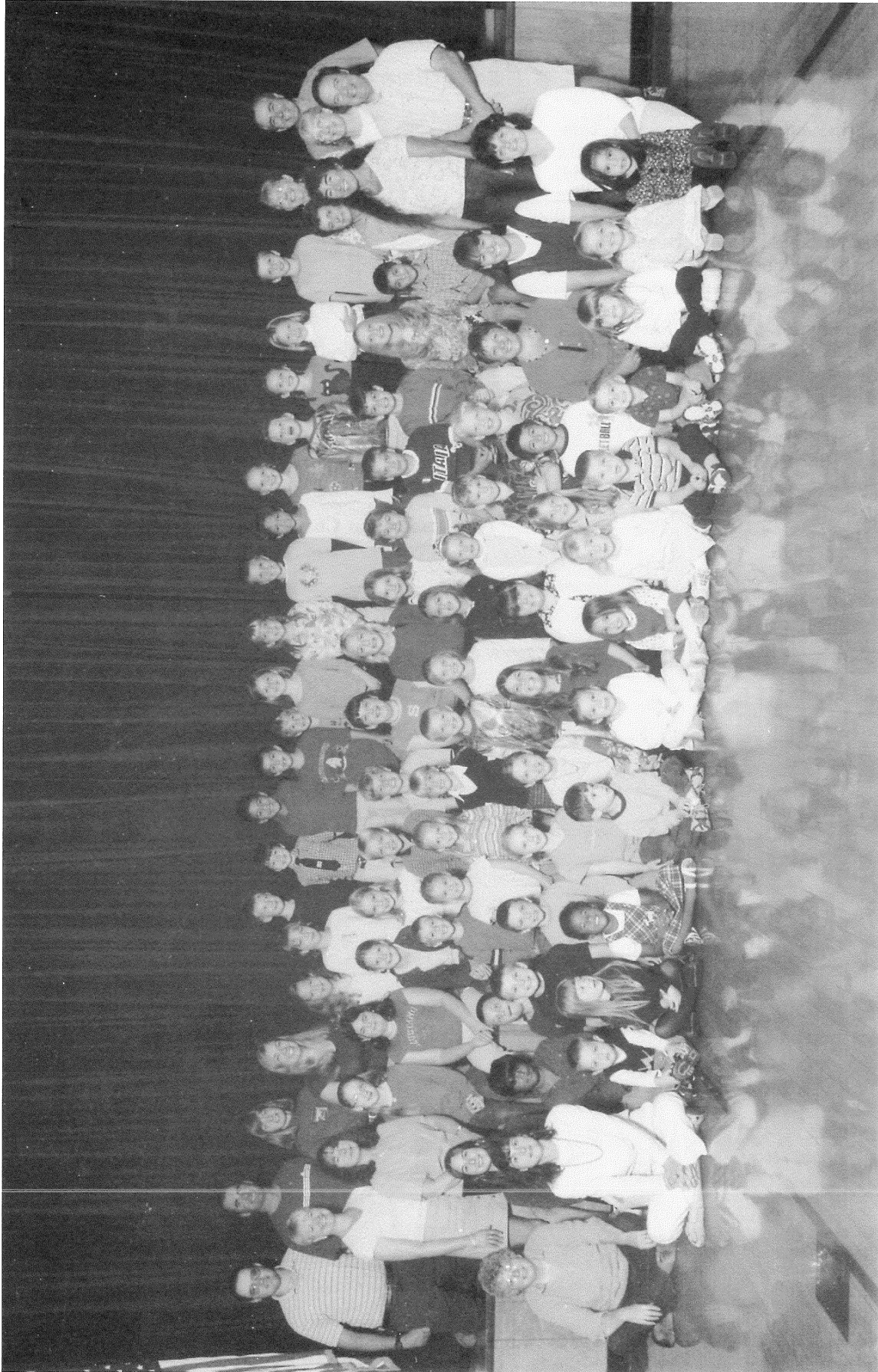

Mohawk Trail Regional School – Principal's Report

It is an honor to again submit my annual report as Principal of Mohawk Trail Regional School. As this year approaches its midpoint, there are many accomplishments to report that are a source of pride to our community.

Our student population has declined recently and stands at 734. This number includes 70 school choice students from neighboring communities who have chosen Mohawk and another 21 students who are tuitioned into our collaboratively run Walnut Hill program for students with special needs. Both programs provide us with important sources of revenue.

The school community has initiated a review of our curriculum in grades 7-12 that we believe will result in a clearer written curriculum based upon high expectations for all students. Staff is using the "Understanding by Design" methodology to continue work on this multi-year process. We have introduced an Advanced Placement U.S. History course this year that brings our number of AP offerings to 6. The school has made Annual Yearly Progress on the MCAS in the aggregate and in all subgroups during the past year. Student's scores in all areas continue to rise.

The middle school musical, "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" was a resounding success this fall and the all school musical, "Oklahoma" is presently in production for a spring presentation. It promises to delight many community audiences. In the area of extra-curriculars, Mohawk joined the "As Schools Match Wits Program" and the Model United Nations programs. Many school groups sponsored events to benefit "Katrina victims."

Students have begun to receive college acceptances and a very high percentage will be attending schools of their first choice. Sixteen students are involved in science fair projects that we hope will bring them all to statewide competition. Twenty-four students received state scholarships that recognize high MCAS performance.

Sports programs continue to flourish. Many programs have brought repeated honors to the school and our expectation is that both basketball programs and the skiing teams will have highly productive seasons this winter.

We are profoundly grateful for community support of all our endeavors. As I complete this report, it marks my last year prior to retirement. I thank everyone for their support.

Mohawk Trail Regional School – Superintendent's Report

Mohawk Trail Regional School District Hawlemont Regional School District Rowe Elementary School District

Since I am new to the districts, please allow me to share a bit about myself. My wife, Barbara, and I have been married for sixteen years and have two young children. Our son, Robbie, is ten, and our daughter, Danielle, is three. In addition to being a great wife and mother, Barbara is a registered nurse specializing in geriatric care. For those of you who are sports fans, we are big Red Sox and Patriots supporters!

Having my own school-age children, I am keenly aware of the importance of the superintendent's responsibilities. My life away from work is child-centered; my life at work is student-centered. Just as I am with my own children, I am intensely dedicated to the safety and education of the students of the Mohawk Trail Regional School System. Although I report to school committees, I consider the students to be my boss.

These are certainly exciting times. In addition to the normal hustle and bustle of school activity, the school system is facing a significant fiscal challenge from its steadily declining student enrollment. The district's enrollment has declined 20% over the past five years from 1,605 to 1,291; this decline is projected to continue over the next several years. Bottom line-fewer and fewer students has resulted in fewer and fewer state dollars for the school system, which has placed increasingly greater fiscal burden on the towns. This trend is a serious problem, which needs to be remedied. It is time for creative problem solving- Mohawk Schools 2010.

Mohawk Schools 2010 is a multi-year, strategic plan which we are implementing to face the growing fiscal challenge. One, we are streamlining expenses across school operations. Two, we are exploring business development of underutilized classroom space to generate new revenues; vocational programming and day care are two possibilities. We are also pursuing revenue growth through greater focus on grant writing. Three, we are developing a contingency plan should efforts one and two prove insufficient; possible school closures must be considered. Please note that Hawlemont Regional Elementary and Rowe Elementary are legally excluded from this potential school closure process as a result of their structure as separate school districts.

Keep in mind that contained within crisis is opportunity. My view is that, as long as we have an intelligent plan and work together, the school system will emerge stronger than ever, supported by a sustainable financial infrastructure. I have every confidence that we are in the process of doing just that. I am thrilled to be a part of the Mohawk team and am looking forward to great things for the students of the Mohawk Trail Regional School System, which will include my children beginning next fall.

Mohawk Trail Regional School System – Dept. of Special Education

The December 1, 2005, Child Count figures indicate that there are 284 students receiving special education services in the Mohawk Trail Regional School District, which is 19.8% of the total school population. There are 10 preschool students on IEPs. There are 30 students receiving special education services in the Hawlemont Regional School District, which is 21.9% of the total school population. There are 7 students on IEPs. There are 10 students receiving special education services in the Rowe Elementary School, which is 16.1% of the total school population. There is 1 preschool student on an IEP. The State average for K-12 is 15.9%. Although the general population in the three districts is on the decline, that is not true of the special education numbers. It is also true that like most other districts, the severity of the student needs seems to be increasing.

Although the IDEA 2004 Federal Law was completed over a year ago, we still do not have the new Massachusetts Regulations. We still expect them this spring.

We were informed recently that we are scheduled for a full Coordinated Program Review of Special Education, Title One, and various associated Title programs during the 2006-2007 academic year.

The Mohawk Trail, Hawlemont, and Rowe Districts provide special education services to pre-school students ages 3-5 within the Districts' integrated preschools. We also provide services to some students who attend private preschools or stay at home. Screening and evaluation is offered to students who are referred by pediatricians, parents, and the REACH program. Children who qualify for special education receive services. The Early Childhood Special Education Coordinator provides the screening to all pre-school and kindergarten children, coordinates programs for eligible children, and serves as a liaison to other service agencies. She also coordinates the transition into kindergarten, and monitors their program until they enter first grade.

*System-wide services are provided throughout the three districts. These services include specialized instruction, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language therapy, assistive technology, counseling, and psychological evaluations. We also have integration specialists, who assist with planning for children at high risk for out of district placement.

Most of the special education students in all three districts receive their basic education in the general classroom, only going to the resource room for specific instruction. Some children do receive all of their basic instruction in the resource room. Each of our schools has at least one resource room. The Mohawk Trail Regional Middle School and High School have separate programs in which the students spend most of their day. We have a Language Based Program in both the middle school and the high school. We have an Alternative Learning Program for students with behavioral issues who are partially integrated in the mainstream. We have two severe needs with a Vocational Integration Program attached to the high school program. The vocational program is in its fourth year and provides job coaching in local places of employment. Additionally, we have three classrooms that are entirely separate serving the needs of behaviorally impaired students. One is located in the Buckland-Shelburne Elementary School for elementary aged students and two at Mohawk Trail Middle and High School for those age groups. These programs are called Walnut Hill at Mohawk. We have contracted clinical services integrated into these programs.

All of our special education staff members work together with teams of people in each building to provide preventative support to students who are having difficulty in the classroom. This includes both 504 students and those in need of Student Success Plans. They also provide evaluations for students who are referred for special education consideration and provide services once found eligible. Annual events include a district-wide spelling bee, a summertime Children's Literature Festival and tennis lessons coordinated by Toni Wilcox and Judy McWilliams respectively, special education and psychology conferences for school district staff, and a gala spring Lyonnaise fundraiser/fundraiser generously sponsored this past year by the Warfield House in Charlemont. A few examples of ongoing programs and services are the West County Classroom courses, publication of an annual Gift Catalog of classroom needs, mini-grants for teachers and staff, a Student Assistance Fund, Community Resource Catalog and several scholarships for Mohawk graduates.

Carl H. Nilman Scholarship Fund

The fund was established under the provisions of the will of Carl H. Nilman for the purpose of providing scholarships. Recipients shall reside in the school district and be graduates of the Mohawk Trail Regional High School who desire and are deemed worthy of post high school education or training and who are in need of financial assistance.

This year the Awards subcommittee read 103 applications. 37 were from seniors and 66 from previous graduates of Mohawk. \$31,000 was to be awarded using 30% for seniors and 70% for graduates. The committee feels that seniors have multiple scholarship opportunities from other sources, while graduates have far fewer resources. 23 scholarships totaling \$10,500 were awarded to seniors (62% of applicants). 31 scholarships totaling \$20,500 were given to graduates (47% of applicants). The awards committee was Pauline Mills (Buckland), Marion Scott (Buckland), Marge Porrevecchio (Charlemont), Alicia Tripp (Heath), and Michelle Hillman (Colrain).

From 1991 – 2003 a total of \$173,375 has been awarded to Mohawk Seniors. \$381,775 has been awarded to Mohawk graduates for total scholarship amount of \$555,050.

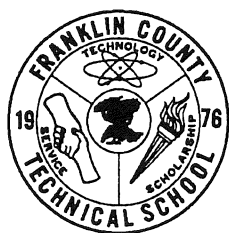

Franklin County Technical School



We submit this annual report for 2005 on behalf of the Franklin County Technical School District and its administration, faculty, staff and students.

Total enrollment as of October 1, 2005 was 543 students with town breakouts as follows:

Franklin County Technical School awarded 105 diplomas to our seniors in June of 2005. This marked the third year that Massachusetts students were required to pass the MCAS in order to receive a high school diploma. Once again our students were very successful in meeting this high academic standard. The graduates also earned their vocational certificate along with their diploma. 39% of our graduates planned on going to college, 59% joined the area work force and 2% entered the military. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Class of 2005.

During the 2005 school year, the students from various vocational programs performed an estimated \$48,000 worth of service projects benefiting the various towns and city of Franklin County.

We were re-accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges for the next 10 year cycle. This attests to the hard work and dedication of our faculty, staff and administration and the quality programs we offer with

the support of our member towns. We used the School's Building Feasibility Study of 2002 to point out the need for a school building renovation project. Because we were able to show the NEAS&C Visiting Committee that we were already working on plans to address the problems of our aging school facility, we were able to get through this evaluation. The School Committee continues to work on a building renovation and expansion plan. We are waiting until the new Massachusetts School Building Authority produces their new regulations in July of 2007 to continue the formal process for applying for building assistance money. Once we know the percentage of cost sharing we will be working with each of our towns to finalize our planning process for a new or renovated school facility.

We continue to work with Greenfield Community College to offer evening courses at Franklin County Technical School, as well as a new program that offers college credit courses after school to our students.

We also continue to work with Franklin County businesses, the Regional Employment Board and the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce to make sure that our graduates are part of the Economic Development for Franklin County.

We thank each and every citizen of Franklin County for your continued support.

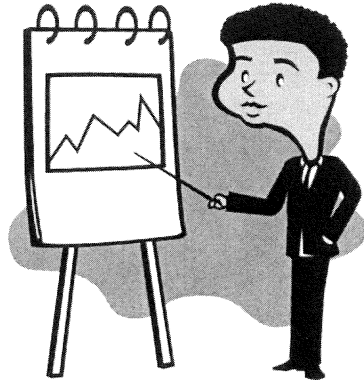

FINANCIAL REPORTS

Board of Assessors

Membership of the Board remained the same for this year as **Rick Williams** was re-elected at the annual town election in May 2005. Rick was again nominated and elected Chairman by fellow Board members **Heidi Cousineau** and **Ellen Babcock**.

As always, the Board would again like to thank **Sandy Daviau**, Assessors' Clerk, for her handling of the day-to-day tasks in the Assessors Office. Sandy has a good deal of contact with the public and always manages to be gracious and helpful to everyone.

The Assessors Office continues to use the assessing software *Assess Pro* and the consulting services of **Patriot Properties** from Lynn MA.

At the routine monthly meetings, the following items were addressed, as needed:

- **building permits** received from the building inspector were reviewed and field inspections were conducted as necessary to make any adjustments to property cards
- **deeds** recording property transfers received from the Franklin County Registry of Deeds were reviewed and compared to tax maps for verification of data; adjustments to property cards were made as needed
- **tax map changes** were documented and forwarded to the mapping service for update
- **real estate, personal property and motor vehicle excise tax commitments and abatements** were reviewed and approved as required

The year 2005 was busy and challenging as it was the state-mandated year for our **Triennial Revaluation**. **Patriot Properties** was engaged to assist with the residential revaluations. Due to the particularly hot real estate market over the past few years, residential property values increased significantly...approximately 25% for dwellings and 60% for land.

Patriot Properties was also utilized to conduct an appraisal of the **Yankee Atomic Electric Company** Independent Spent Fuel Storage Installation or ISFSI. After years of signing "gentlemen's agreements" over the value of the Yankee property during decommissioning (1992 to present), the Assessors notified YAEC that the time had come to determine, as best we could, a realistic, defensible value for all of their property, including the ISFSI. The Assessors sought out information related to the determination of values at other similar ISFSI facilities in Maine and Connecticut. Yankee Atomic's new value for FY06 is \$15,469,800—a \$5 million increase over FY05.

In the interest of saving money—and as a way to ensure consistent values—the Rowe, Monroe and Florida Assessors jointly hired the consulting firm **Mainstream Associates** of North Hampton NH to appraise the **hydroelectric facilities** co-located in each of the three towns. The former

owner of these hydro facilities (USGen New England) had previously declared bankruptcy and its facilities were sold at auction. TransCanada (headquartered in Calgary, Alberta) bought the Sherman and No. 5 stations, while a joint venture between BRASCAN (headquartered in Toronto, Ontario) and EMERA (headquartered in Halifax, Nova Scotia) bought the Bear Swamp/Fife Brook facilities. The entire process was protracted as it was necessary to coordinate between the three towns, the appraisal consultant, the previous owner and the two new owners. The state then needed the requisite time to complete their review. Final approval came from the DOR in late December. The overall result...the hydro facilities in Rowe decreased \$135 million to a new total valuation of \$239,027,809.

The net effect of the FY06 Triennial Revaluation was a \$121,603,824 reduction in total town valuation from \$425,476,101 for FY05 to **\$303,872,277** for FY06. In early February 2006 the Board of Selectmen voted to accept the recommendation of the Assessors to adopt a residential factor of .5082 percent, resulting in tax rates of **\$4.10/Residential** and **\$8.71/CIP** (Commercial/Industrial/Personal Property) for FY06. This contrasts to FY05 tax rates of **\$3.59/Residential** and **\$5.79/CIP**. With these changes, Rowe not only has the **4th lowest residential tax rate in the state**, but still continues in the enviable position of having the **lowest average single family tax bill at \$705.**

Despite the relatively low tax rate and tax bills, the so-called **Proposition 2½ Levy Limit** continues to restrict the amount that Rowe can raise from taxation in any given year. By law this limit only increases by 2½% (or about \$65,000) in each subsequent year. The Town has been bumping up against its Prop 2½ Levy Limit for the past 6 years. Consequently, the Town has had to make cuts or utilize other "available funds" from Stabilization and Free Cash to pay for special projects—and even some regular operating budget items. In the absence of a **Prop 2½ Override**, this Levy Limit will continue to constrain the Town's ability to raise money from taxation in future years.

A decision was made to hold off implementing the new **Geographic Information System (GIS) tax map system** developed by **Cartographics Associates** from Littleton NH until after the triennial revaluation process was completed. The new tax map system, consisting of digital maps combined with aerial photography, will be linked to our existing Assessors software to provide a fully integrated information system. Our goal is to have the new GIS tax map system in place sometime during 2006.

Finance Committee

The year 2005 saw significant changes to the Finance Committee membership. Bill Baker, Dave Cousineau and Bill Loomis joined existing members Carlos Heiligmann and Jean Atwood. Bill Loomis was elected as Chair and Carlos Heiligmann agreed to serve as committee secretary.

The committee met each month with the primary focus being: 1) the status of the ongoing budgets and 2) preparation for the FY2007 budget which begins on July 1, 2006. The committee worked closely with all departments, especially the Selectmen and Assessors relative to town financial matters.

This annual report covers the last half of FY2005 (1/1/05-6/30/05) and the first half of FY2006 (7/1/05-12/31/05). Some important figures for the two subject fiscal years are: (figures are rounded)

The following observations can be made from the above data:

1. The town's total valuation decreased by approximately 29% in FY2006. The main reason was the devaluation of Bear Swamp.
2. The residential valuation increased by approximately 25% in FY2006. Prior to FY2006, homes in Rowe were selling at a much higher price than their assessed value. The FY2006 residential assessments are now more in line with the residential selling prices. Even after these adjustments, the residential taxpayer still only pays about 14% of the total taxes for FY2006.
3. The residential tax rate increased from \$3.59 in FY05 to \$4.10 in FY06. This new tax rate—in conjunction with the higher residential assessments—results in the average homeowner's tax bill increasing by approximately 40%. In September of 2005 the Mass. Division of Local Services published an article, which listed the single-family dwelling average tax bills for FY05 for 332 towns in the state. The town of Weston ranked #1 at \$11,767...Rowe ranked #332 at \$512. The state average was \$3,589. Rowe's nearest competitor for the lowest ranking in the state was Erving with \$908. Even if we were to use the estimated FY2006 average tax bill of \$717 (\$512 + 40%) we still would be the lowest in the state.

4. FY2006 Total Appropriations were less than FY2005. Appropriations were down in FY2006 because more special projects were deferred and no money was appropriated from taxation or transferred to Stabilization.
5. In FY2006, appropriations from taxation increased by approximately 2.6%.
6. In FY2005 and FY2006, we withdrew \$418,000 from our savings accounts—Stabilization and Free Cash—to balance our budgets or fund special projects. For both fiscal years we appropriated \$0 for savings. We did transfer \$127,000 from one savings account—Free Cash—to our other savings account—Stabilization.
7. Levy is the amount raised by taxation, \$2,451,000 for FY2006. Levy Limit is the maximum figure, by law, that can be appropriated from taxation, \$2,455,000 for FY2006. The Levy Limit automatically increases by 2.5% each year, plus a small percentage generated by new growth each year. For the past five years, our Levy has been at or near our Levy Limit. This restricts us each year of only being able to increase taxation by approximately 2.5% (FY2006 saw a 2.6% increase). Our operating budget, along with most other towns in the state, often increases by more than 2.5% each year. Usually line items are the cause and we have little control over these. Retirement funding and health insurance are two examples.

In FY2002, we appropriated \$150,000 for health insurance. In FY2006, we appropriated \$270,000, which is an average annual increase of 16% for health insurance. Because of these large increases, over which we have little control, and the fact that our taxes can only go up approximately 2.5%, it is very difficult to generate a good balanced budget each year. For the last 5 years, we have continually requested departments to limit budget increases and defer special projects. Even after these sacrifices each year, we still needed to appropriate funds from Free Cash and/or Stabilization to balance the budget.

Relative to savings in the last five years:

1. We have withdrawn from Free Cash and Stabilization \$1,428,000.
2. We have appropriated from taxation only \$432,000 to Stabilization. By law we could have appropriated approximately \$240,000 each fiscal year for an approximate total of \$1,200,000.
3. We have transferred from Free Cash to Stabilization, savings to savings, \$231,564.
4. Our total savings—instead of increasing—has decreased from \$3,079,000 to \$2,259,000.

If we do not change our budget philosophy, we will soon deplete our town savings to zero. With sufficient savings we do not have to borrow and pay interest for large expenditures. When tax bills are late we use our Stabilization to fund our Operating budget, until the tax monies start com-

ing in. Other towns are forced to borrow money while waiting for tax dollars. Wiscasset Maine, which also had a nuclear power facility, uses the interest from its large, \$15,000,000, savings fund to offset taxes once paid by the utility. If we plan ahead, we could do the same when the day comes that Bear Swamp closes. Residents only pay about 7% of our total taxes required to keep the town running.

A few issues that the Finance Committee will be working on in the second half of FY2006 and FY2007 are:

1. Presenting to the town different scenarios in hopes of stopping the depletion of our savings,
2. Reviewing the town health costs and seeing if alternative solutions can be found,

3. Working with the selectmen in creating a Capital Asset Inventory, and
4. Developing a five year Special Project List for all departments.

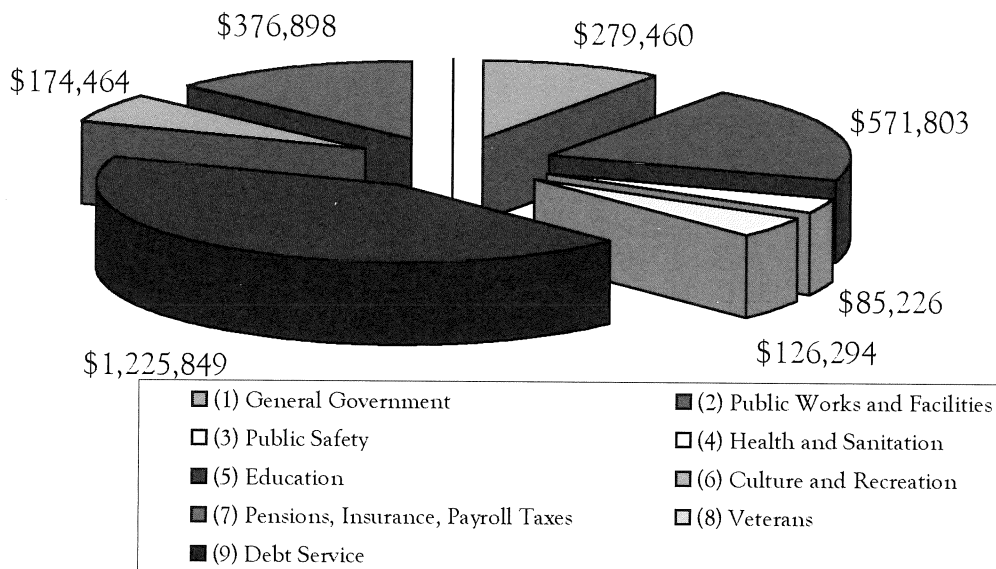

HUMAN SERVICES



Board of Health

At the beginning of the year the current members of the Board, **Richard Alix**, **Angela Foshay** and **Danette Reynolds-Gallagher** had been in office only six months. In that time we experienced percolation tests, soil evaluations, Title 5 septic reviews, black fly bites, final system inspections, the influenza vaccine crisis, more black fly bites, food establishment and children's camp inspections, and being slobbered on by Archie. All in all, a good half year.

At the annual election in May 2005 **Danette Reynolds-Gallagher** was elected to a three-year term. (Her previous term had been for one year.) When the Board convened following the town election, **Dick Alix** was, once again, elected chairman.

Food and Housing Inspections

As has been the case for the past eight years, FRCOG Health Agent **Sharon White** was appointed to conduct the inspections of food establishments, housing, and children's recreational camps. Besides insuring that codes and regulations are being followed, Sharon also works educating people on proper kitchen, food handling and storage practices. She is always available to answer questions from the Board and we are lucky to have her services.

Title 5 Matters

Lisa Danek Burke was reappointed as the Town's Health Agent for Title 5. Lisa is our soils evaluator at percolation tests, reviews all septic system plans submitted to the Board and answers countless questions. It is a stroke of luck to have someone so well versed in Title 5 matters and civil engineering here in town.

The Board reviewed all building applications as required by state Title 5 regulations.

Water Management

Bill Enzer and **Berkshire-Enviro Labs** of Lee, MA continues to serve as our Certified Water Operator for our four (4) Public Water Supplies – the Town Hall well, the Rowe Elementary School well, the Avery Fountain and the well at Pelham Lake Park. Berkshire-Enviro Labs conducts monthly testing on these four water supplies as well as weekly testing at the swimming area at Pelham Lake Park during the swimming season.

Transfer Station/Solid Waste Disposal

Junkyard dog, **Archie**, approached the Board requesting that we reappoint his meal ticket, **Dick Tower** as Transfer Station Attendant. After much discussion (and the appropriate payoff to us) the Board agreed to reappoint Dick. Dick does an excellent job at the Refuse Gardens making sure items are properly sorted, the grounds kept neat, snow shoveled, grass mowed, coffee made (hey – who knew?!), swap shed kept presentable and probably a hundred other things we don't even know about.

The Board would like to thank **Jan Ameen** and staff at the FCSWMD. They manage all of our solid waste, recycling and hauling contracts; the regional hazardous waste collection days; and our sharps and bio-hazard waste collection. FCSWMD also compiles all necessary reports and

statistics throughout the year. [Please see their separate report in the Regional section of this town report.]

Recycling

Our recycling rate for paper, glass and plastic for 2005 was 22%, down from the 26.1% in 2004. While it takes each of us a little extra time to sort our wastes, the effort helps the environment and also in keeping our disposal costs down. This year's recycling resulted in the following:

- conservation of enough energy to power 8 average houses for one year
- reduction of greenhouse gases equivalent to pulling 30 cars off the road in 2005
- savings in paper equivalent to 360 trees from being cut

Paper, glass and plastics recycling earned the town \$1,362 and scrap metal recycling earned \$1,389. These earnings are held in escrow by the Franklin County Solid Waste Management District (FCSWMD) and used to purchase copy paper for the town offices and offset our annual assessment from FCSWMD.

Thank you to **all townspeople** for continuing to make recycling a very important daily task. Your efforts really pay off.

Handler of all other manner of forms, snafus, complaints, letters, requests, etc.

And the winner is... **Ellen Babcock**, Board of Health Clerk. As a past Board of Health member, Ellen is a veritable wealth of information. We aren't sure how we were able to talk her into accepting the reappointment as clerk considering she is involved in so many other committees and boards. No matter how many times we have interrupted her work, she's never thrown anything at us and has always helped.

Health Services

Nurse Practitioner **Ruth Loomis** kept the town free of plague and pestilence for yet another year. The Board appreciates the extra time, work and care Ruth puts into her job. Many of our town residents have benefited from her expertise and her dogged determination to work through the medical and insurance bureaucracies on their behalf. Ruth has also saved many people the time and expense of traveling out of town for medical care or advice.

In Closing...

As 2005 ends, the Board is swirling in controversy, rumors and even, sometimes, appreciation. It appears nothing ever changes with life in a small town. The Board of Health operates under two principals:

1. that all persons be treated fairly and equally when enforcing State and local regulations
2. that the Board help find solutions to residents' problems

For all of their help and guidance we thank Lisa, Ellen, Dick, Ruth and Sharon. To the townspeople . . . we will continue to try our best in serving you.

Health Services

Health Services has now completed its seventh year serving the residents of Rowe. The separation of the Select Board and Board of Health continues to be a positive change for this office, allowing more time for the issues of Health Services to be addressed. This year additional policies were put in place to guide future Board of Health members and to clarify some of the ambiguous concerns of the office. This Board of Health has worked diligently to insure that every patient and situation be handled in an equitable manner. I am grateful for the many hours they have given our community. Collaboration with Dr. Richard Warner continues to be one of the most important assets to Health Services. Thank you, Richard!

One of the most gratifying aspects of the position has been advocating for the residents in our complex medical system. Whether it is difficulties arranging homecare, sorting out insurance problems, or tapping into the many state and federally funded programs, I can often be of service. Health Services acts as an adjunct to the area primary care providers by assessing and alerting providers to new problems, monitoring chronic conditions, and educating patients about their diagnosis, treatment, and care. In this way health problems are addressed sooner before a condition worsens. This office is committed to preventative medicine and encouraging residents to make healthy lifestyle choices. Along with the fitness center and trainer, our town is privileged to have one of the finest support systems for health maintenance. Not all residents take advantage of these offerings, however, I would hope that everyone would continue to support such a valuable asset in our community. In uncertain times, with growing numbers of uninsured and underinsured people, I believe Rowe's unique health, fitness, and medical programs to be some of our most vital community services.

Nine flu vaccination clinics were held in October and early November. The clinics went much smoother this year with plenty of vaccine. The Town of Rowe again participated in the state roster billing program netting approximately \$1600 for our revolving account to purchase next year's vaccine.

At times this is a difficult job. Each year we lose one or more of our beloved neighbors. Letting go is always hard to do. I feel privileged to be a part of people's lives. Please remember that Health Services is available for you Mon. 8 am -12 noon and 1 - 3 pm, Tues. 4 - 8 pm, Wed. 8 am - 12 noon, and Thurs. 8 am -12 noon and 1 - 3 pm. House calls are available by arrangement for homebound residents, new mothers, and those freshly discharged from the hospital. Your neighbors have donated many medical assistive devices which you are welcome to borrow. A wealth of educational materials are available for residents and students. Services are on a walk-in basis, so please take advantage of the convenient, free care. Thank you all again for a wonderful year.

All Veteran's graves were flagged for the Memorial Day Weekend. New flag holders were installed where needed.

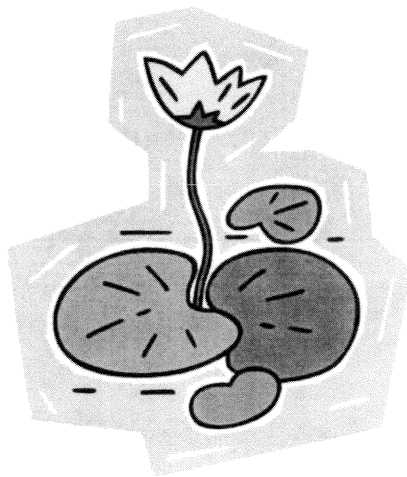

Items the committee is working on:

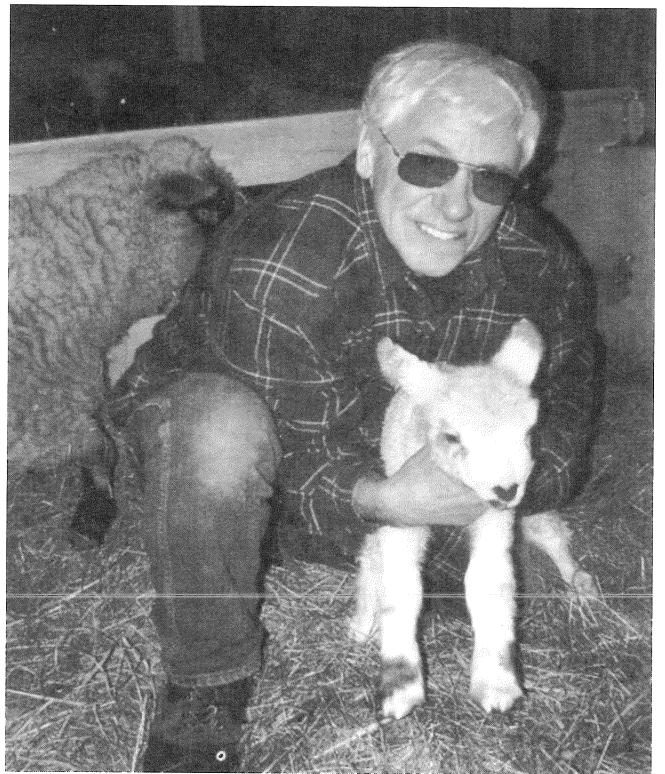
1. Presenting a *Right to Farm Bylaw* to the townspeople.
2. Administering an in-town survey about what types of agricultural products/practices are currently available in town.
3. Helping farmers obtain resources and possibly grant money to help them in their endeavors.
4. Possibly using Old Home Day as a vehicle to promote what the commission is working on.

The Committee's work is ongoing. We will present a progress report at the Annual Town Meeting in May of 2006.

Conservation Commission

The Rowe Conservation Commission meets on an as needed basis. The bulk of the business in 2005 involved monitoring decommissioning activities at the **Yankee Atomic Nuclear Power Station**. Ellen Babcock was designated Compliance Monitor on behalf of the commission. She received and reviewed weekly compliance monitoring reports from Yankee, and performed site visits as needed. She thanks Yankee team members **Ken Dow, Michael Thompson, Todd Chadwell, and Gregg Demers** for providing thorough and informative reports concerning site closure activities.

A public hearing was held February 17, 2005, regarding a **WPA Form 1 – Determination of Applicability** filed by **USGen New England** for planned activities to construct a FERC-required filter drain on the left embankment (Rowe side) of Sherman Dam. The Commission issued a **negative determination**, as the work to be performed—though normally subject to the Wetlands Protection Act—met the requirements of the exemption allowed for the maintenance of an existing, lawfully located structure of a facility used in the service of the public and used to provide electric services.

The Commission received only one **Forest Cutting Plan** in 2005 for the following:

Planning Board

The Board has continued to review Rowe's zoning by-laws and has drafted several updates. This work is nearing completion and when complete will be incorporated into the work of the By-law Review Committee. The zoning updates are intended to:

- Align Rowe's By-laws with Mass. General Laws
- Improve readability
- Clarify procedures for special permits
- Close gaps in our current Zoning By-laws

Copies of the proposed changes are available from Planning Board or By-law Review Committee members. Two Board members are also serving on the By-law Review Committee. Public information sessions and public hearings are planned before any recommended changes will be included on the Town Meeting warrant.

The first sections of an Open Space Plan have been completed by Bill Labich of the Franklin Regional Council of Govts (FRCOG). The remaining sections are planned for completion in FY07.

In the course of the past year, the Board has been asked to review several subdivision plans for properties in town. All of the plans reviewed have met applicable requirements.

The Board has also considered and granted Special Permits where they have been required and requested, and is working to clarify relevant By-Law sections to remove ambiguity and align with current Massachusetts General Law. In order to uphold the Board's responsibilities and maintain its authority, the Board is investigating how to address situations where the special permitting process has or may have been bypassed.

David Scrivens resigned from the Planning Board in May to focus on his Selectman's role. The Board extends its thanks to David for his service. The Selectmen and the Planning Board unsuccessfully sought an appointee to take David's seat and consequently the Board has been operating with four members since May.

The Board once again wishes to thank Margaret Woodside for her editorial stewardship of the *Goal Post*. She continues to produce an informative and professional organ for communicating about activities in Rowe.

Rowe Energy Committee

The Rowe Energy Committee was created two years ago, and tries to help improve awareness of the environmental and economic impacts of municipal and residential energy use. This year we were able to apply for and complete the "80/20 Prism Program"—an energy conservation program offered by National Grid. National Grid replaced some existing lamps, ballasts and fixtures in the Town Hall, Town Garage, Library and Rowe School with higher efficiency types. The utility paid 80% of the cost for updating the lighting. The town's 20% portion of the cost will probably be covered by the first year's energy savings on the bills for those four facilities.

Also, the committee proposed that the Town of Rowe participate in a program to purchase electricity from the Hampshire Council of Governments, in which HCOG will do daily spot trading for the best electrical generation cost. At the end of the year, half of savings they make compared to the National Grid rate for our power cost will be paid to the Town of Rowe. If they make no savings—or if they incur losses—the town will not be required to pay any part. The Selectmen, who have voted to enter into this program, should sign the contract in early 2006, providing some details are ironed out.

In 2006 we plan to explore other conservation programs for both the Town and Rowe residents.

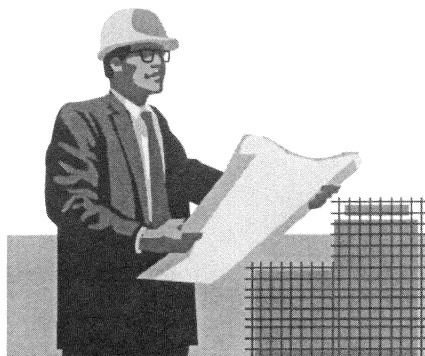

Emergency Medical Services

Once again our EMS personnel have done an outstanding job responding to all EMS calls this year. I am proud to be part of such a caring group of individuals. Their families play an important role in the work we do because of the support they give our team throughout the year. Your dedication is admirable. I appreciate all you do and the time you take out of your personal lives for training and responding to calls. In order to meet the requirements of a first responder one must complete an 80 hour course and pass a written and practical exam. Recertification is required every three years. EMT certification requires completion of a 110 hour course and successfully passing a state exam which also includes a written and practical exam. Recertification is required every two years and consists of a 24 hour refresher course and an additional 28 hours of continuing education classes.

We currently have 2 certified EMTs and 11 first responders. Last year our EMTs and first responders responded to 29 emergencies. Rowe EMS responded to 28 medical emergencies and 1 motor vehicle accident. Our EMTs and first responders continue to respond in a timely manner to any situation and deliver the highest quality of care.

If you have an emergency it is extremely important to dial 911 immediately. Calling a knowledgeable friend or an EMT/first responder will delay the initiation of EMS. For our new residents in town and those that may not have ever utilized the 911 system, I would like to explain the sequence of events once a 911 call has been made. When 911 has been dialed a dispatcher from Shelburne Control will answer your call. He or she will ask the nature of your emergency and at that time determine the level of care needed

for your emergency. The dispatcher will then notify Charlemont Ambulance and Rowe EMTs and first responders. If your emergency requires Advanced Life Support, a paramedic unit will be dispatched from Greenfield at the same time. Considering the rural area in which we live, this response system has worked well in the past. If 911 is activated and you then decide you do not want or need the ambulance, or if you have dialed 911 by mistake, please stay on the line and explain the situation. Otherwise, you can expect a visit from the police department who will be dispatched to verify that an emergency situation does not exist.

Rowe EMS personnel will respond to your emergency with both the knowledge and equipment necessary to help stabilize a patient before and during transport to the hospital by ambulance. As rural as the town of Rowe is, our first responders play a critical role in the outcome of your emergency and thus are an important part of the chain of survival. Rowe EMS works closely with Rowe Fire Department. Most of our members are crossed-trained as medical, fire and /or police personnel. We respond to both fire and police scenes to aid and support those departments. If there is anyone who is EMT certified, or would be interested in becoming an EMT, or is currently a first responder and would like to join our department, please notify me at 339-5761.

Fire Department

During the last report period the Fire Department responded to forty-five (45) calls:

- 3 Motor Vehicle Accident with hazardous material release
- 28 Medical Emergencies
- 4 Fire Calls
- 8 Mutual Aid Calls
- 4 Fire Detection alarms
- 2 Utility Pole Arcing
- 3 Suspected Harmful Atmospheric Condition

As a result of the Department's chimney cleaning program, fourteen homes' chimneys were inspected and/or cleaned this year. In the coming year, as in the past, we will clean the chimneys of the elderly and will assist able-bodied residents. We will attempt to conduct the cleaning in August and September, before the heating season, so names should be submitted early.

In the event of an emergency – fire, police, or medical—**call 9-1-1 immediately**. Do not waste precious time trying to contact a friend, neighbor or member of the Department directly. Enhanced 9-1-1 has been a highly effective and beneficial service to the town for more than a decade; any call to 9-1-1 automatically provides the dispatcher with the telephone number and the name and address listed for that number. If you have special needs or concerns, please contact me directly and I will provide the necessary information to the Dispatch Center.

The Fire Department received a \$15,000 Firefighting Equipment Grant from the State to purchase approved firefighter safety equipment. The Department purchased a thermal imaging camera, a gas monitor which checks oxygen, carbon monoxide, flammable gases and hydrogen sulfide levels in the atmosphere, and additional Personal Alarm Safety System (PASS) devices. The new thermal imaging camera and gas monitor were installed in their chargers in 30-E-1. The Town applied for and was awarded a \$12,000 Local Preparedness Grant to procure additional 450 MHz radio equipment. The new equipment was added to that procured from a previous \$12,820 grant. Tri-State's Interoperable Communications Committee is working to finalize implementation issues related to the infrastructure proposal. After finalization of the infrastructure work the Franklin Regional Council of Governments has coordinated the group purchase of radios by all 26 towns in the county. When activated the new radio system will allow fire, police, medical and other emergency personnel throughout the four counties in Western Massachusetts to communicate with each other as the situation requires.

On February 28, 2003, President Bush issued Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 (HSPD-5), which directed the Secretary of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System (NIMS). NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template to enable all government, private-sector, and nongovernmental orga-

nizations to work together during domestic incidents. HSPD-5 requires Federal departments and agencies to make the adoption of NIMS by State and local organizations a condition for Federal preparedness assistance (grants, contracts and other activities) by fiscal year 2005.

Jurisdictions can comply in the short term by adopting the Incident Command System (ICS). The ICS was developed in the 1970s and was adopted by most fire departments. The ICS is a standardized, on-scene, all-hazard incident management concept which allows its users to adopt an integrated organizational structure to match the complexities and demands of single or multiple incidents without being hindered by jurisdictional boundaries. ICS has considerable internal flexibility. It can grow or shrink to meet different needs. This flexibility makes it a very cost effective and efficient management approach for both small and large situations.

Members of the Highway, Police and Fire Departments, elected officials and Town administration staff received NIMS 700, ICS 100 and ICS 200 level training to comply with HSPD-5 and Governor Mitt Romney Executive Order No. 469.

The Selectboard approved the finalized *Local Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan* for the Town. The purpose of this plan is to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to people and property from natural hazards such as flooding, storms, high winds, hurricanes, wildfires, earthquakes, etc. Preparing a Local Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan before a disaster occurs can save the community money and will facilitate post-disaster funding. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) require that a community adopt a pre-disaster mitigation plan as a condition for both mitigation funding and disaster relief funding. Our plan was prepared through the cooperation of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments staff, Henry J. Dandeneau, Police Chief, James W. Taylor, Highway Superintendent, and myself. On behalf of the Town, I would like to express appreciation to William Labich, FRCOG Land Use Program Manager, for his guidance in the development of our plan.

The Franklin County Local Emergency Planning Committee is preparing a *Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan*. The plan has been drafted and a tabletop exercise was successfully conducted in Shelburne. The plan is currently being reformatted to conform to the most recent state recommendations. Once complete it will be forwarded to the Town for comments and acceptance before being submitted to the state for final approval.

Steve Crowningshield provided a house on Tunnel Road for Fire Department structural fire fighting training/practice. The Department utilized the building for hands-on training for one day with members from the Colrain Fire Department. Upon completion of the interior fire suppression training, the building was used to practice exterior at-

tacks and exposure control. The Fire Departments of Rowe and Colrain would like to thank Steve and Deb Crowningshield for allowing us to use their structure for fire training.

310 CMR 7.07 contains the Massachusetts regulation defining allowable open burning in the State. The regulation allows the disposal of brush, cane, driftwood, and forestry debris, excluding grass, hay and leaves, during the period from January 15 to (and including) May 1 at 4:00 PM, provided a valid permit from the local fire department or fire warden has been obtained. The burning is allowed on the land proximate to the place of generation, at a location greater than 75 feet from any dwelling between the hours of 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM, except during periods of adverse meteorological conditions. This regulation does not apply to open burning for the purpose of combating or backfiring an existing fire by persons affiliated with an official fire fighting agency; open burning conducted primarily for cooking purposes; or open burning related to the operation of devices such as blowtorches and welding torches, for which no alternative source of heat can be used, provided that such devices do not cause a condition of air pollution.

Burning for agricultural purposes are controlled by a separate section of this regulation and define agriculture as those practices involved with the cultivation of soil for the purpose of crop production and/or the raising of livestock, when such crops are produced primarily for commercial food, and such livestock are raised primarily for commercial foodstuff or for work purposes. Agricultural operations as defined as those operations which raise commercial foodstuffs and/or livestock on an area larger than one acre.

The emergency generator to be installed at the Rowe Elementary School is planned for installation and testing this summer during the school vacation period. The project will include the construction of a building to provide security of the generator.

The Fire Department is made up completely of volunteers from town. The effectiveness of this organization is determined by the number of individuals it can train and maintain in a state of readiness, and by the condition of its equipment. We welcome anyone who is interested in protecting his/her own and his neighbors' lives and property from the potentially devastating effects of fire. Not all of the activities required to prepare for and combat a fire involve hands-on fire fighting. There is plenty of other work with which we could use help. Our program of regular monthly training/meetings is conducted the first Monday of the month. These sessions are approximately one to two hours in length—a small investment of your time when weighed against the potential benefit that may be derived from your membership. The officers of the Department would like to thank all members who participate in our activities regularly, and ask other members of the town to become involved.

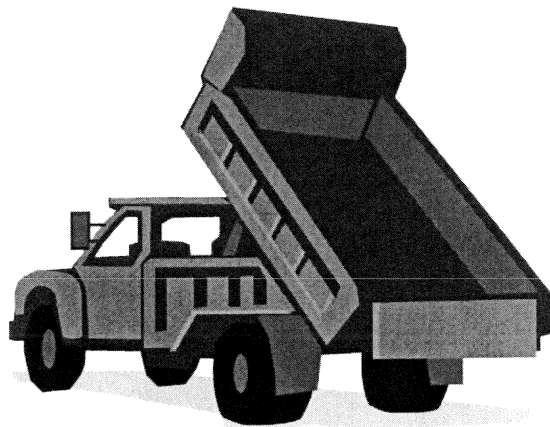

Beautification Committee

Early spring brought forth the perennial beauty of town daffodils lifting their golden trumpets around the war memorial, the library lawn, along sections of Tunnel and Hazelton Roads. Thanks to Dave & Betty Lenth, Ellen Babcock & Clay Miller, and MaryJo Phelps for this planting effort. Cindy & Lenny Laffond and Peter & Anne Besgen also donated and planted daffodils along sections of Hazelton Road.

The committee met with Stewart's Nursery after the removal of the evergreens along the town-owned Gracy property on Sibley Road. The Board of Selectmen, led by Chair David Scrivens, also participated in this project. Mr. Scrivens suggested placing some ornamental plantings in the newly reseeded lawn. A combined walkabout resulted in choosing a flowering Prairiefire Crabapple [*malus x*], an Armstrong Red Maple [*acer rubrum*], and a Miss Kim Lilac [*syringa patula*], provided and planted by Stewart's.

Stewart's also planted (per suggestion of MaryJo Phelps) a Fringe Tree [*chionanthus virginicus*], also known as Old Man's Beard, on the Town Common. Stewart's also mulched the pink roses along the Town Common's fence and the Town Hall beds. The Town Crew helped out by removing the weathered yews [*taxus media*] and the Mountain Ash [*sorbus aucuparia*]*—the one heavily pruned and stunted by the beavers several years ago—from the bed behind the Town Hall.* Stewart's replanted this area with three Burning Bush shrubs [*euonymus alatus*], and planted the annual bed by the main entryway with a long-lasting vivid array of bright yellow and lavender blue...ageratum, asters, dusty miller, petunias, and oriental marigolds.

Jodi hopes the deep purple salvia, yellow primroses and candy-cane dianthus will take, perennially, in Sarah Jane's front gardens.

MaryJo and her girls did magic with red impatiens in the window boxes of town buildings and also in the large watering trough planter near the entrance to our hamlet. Multi-colored hanging pots of blue morning glories, mini petunias and pink hanging geraniums graced the gazebo, and multi-floral pots were hung from both wishing wells.

These areas were a challenge to maintain due to an extremely dry and breezy summer—but we persevered. Credit is due to Ron & Rosie Gordon who weeded and watered while Jodi vacationed late July.

Fall saw a generous donation of cornstalks from Dick Tower and a colorful display of pumpkins and gourds in the window boxes (by the steadfast MaryJo). The pumpkins and gourds were grown and donated by her daughters **Nancy, Abby and Heidi**. Mums, cornstalks and pumpkins also adorned the wagon a Pelham Lake Park. Thank you to Jodi for her seasonal decorations around town.

At the Holiday season the Town Hall was again adorned by the magnificent wreaths and roping of MaryJo, as was the Library.

Highway Department

During this past year the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) made two emergency disaster declarations. One declaration involved the winter storm on January 22-23, 2005, and the other declaration was for the flood on October 9-10, 2005. *[Note: The Town Report cover photo was taken during the later event.]* The Town received \$8,337.20 for the January event, and is anticipating approximately \$6,100 for the October event.

Equipment maintenance is a major priority during the year. The Ford tractor had the hydraulic motor rebuilt on the mowing machine. New rear brakes were installed on Truck #3. The F-150 Ford (pickup) truck received upper and lower ball joints and a new rear-end drive shaft seal.

Routine maintenance during the year included:

- Cleaning and repair of shoulders and catch basins
- Street sweeping
- Line painting
- Waterway repaving
- Roadside mowing
- Brush clearing
- Tree maintenance
- Upkeep of the Town Common and traffic islands

The crew repaired drainage on Monroe Hill Road where some sub-drains had become clogged, and installed rip-rap

(stone) on the long ditch on Potter Road to help control severe water run-off.

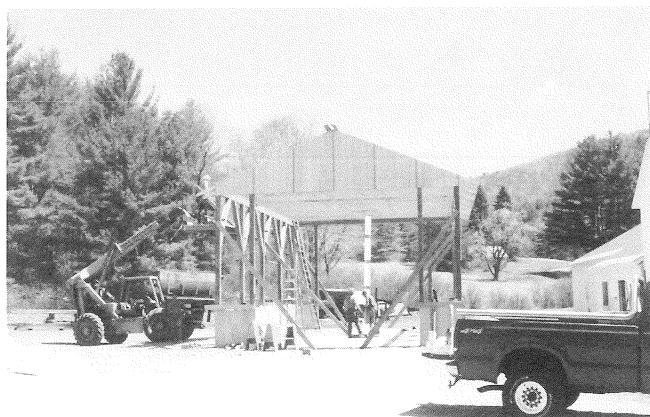
Special projects undertaken during 2005 were:

Tree Warden

During the past year a Public Hearing was held on February 22, 2005, to discuss the removal of eight town trees on Sibley Road adjacent to the town-owned Gracy property. No objections were raised at said hearing, so the trees were removed. Fortunately for the Town, National Grid used their crew to cut down these trees, as power and phone lines were running through the tops of all of them. Chipping and clean up was done by the Town Crew.

National Grid Project Manager Kenneth Finch contacted me in August to discuss the National Grid ACT (Augmented Clearance for Trees) Program. He explained that the distribution lines running through Rowe had been identified among thirty circuits in the state that are most affected by tree-related outages. This program involves trees along the following roads: Cyrus Stage, Old Cyrus Stage, Pond and Zoar Roads. The ACT Program would have National Grid certified arborists investigate the condition of each tree along the three-phase transmission lines. Trees would be marked for trimming or removal depending on condition. Hearings on this program will be held early in 2006.

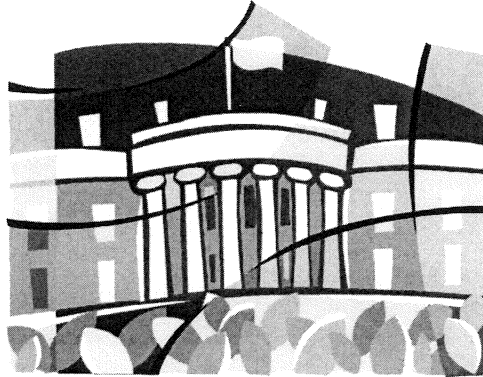

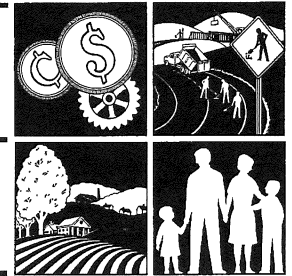
Before and after pictures of tree cutting on Sibley Road

The Franklin Regional Council of Governments is pleased to submit this annual report for calendar year 2005. As the regional planning agency and governmental membership organization serving the twenty-six towns of Franklin County, we provide a broad array of planning, advocacy, and community services, as well as fee-for-service programs serving municipal needs. The following is a brief summary of FRCOG services, programs, projects, and activities for 2005.

FRCOG **Economic Development Planning** initiatives facilitate business growth and development to improve our regional economy and provide jobs, goods, and services. We work with federal, state and local economic development agencies to assess needs and issues, identify and implement projects, and maintain eligibility for funding. Work in 2005 included: the Brownfield Site Assessment and Revolving Loan programs; the Greater Franklin County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy and Economic Development District; industrial park planning; and Pioneer Valley Connect.

A **Geographic Information System** is a computer system for mapping geographic data. GIS is incorporated into many aspects of our work and is available to towns on a fee-for-service basis. Our 2005 activities included: updating maps for the Franklin Region Long Range Transportation Plan; completing parcel mapping for all the towns; homeland security and emergency planning; support for Smart Growth Technical Assistance grants; analyzing demographic information; and updating zoning maps.

We provide assistance on a wide range of **Land Use Planning and Zoning** activities including preparation of Master Plans and Open Space and Recreation Plans and technical assistance to update Zoning Bylaws or Subdivision Regulations. In 2005 our activities included: a Regional Policy Plan; a Strategic Plan for Renewable Energy; sub-regional Open Space Plans for the Deerfield and Millers River Watersheds; a comprehensive Regional Water Supply Study for Franklin County; a Regional Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan and Local Natural Hazard Mitigation Plans for twenty-three communities.

FRCOG **Natural Resources Planning** projects typically focus on assessing and protecting a particular resource or on innovative technologies/techniques that mitigate resource impacts. Projects in 2005 included: the Connecticut River Watershed Restoration – Phase III; the Deerfield River Watershed Non-point Pollution Assessment; the Four Mile Brook Watershed Assessment; and developing a draft

of an Aquifer Protection Overlay District Zoning Bylaw for the Town of Whately.

The FRCOG provides member towns with a variety of **Transportation Planning** services. We maintain the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), a listing of all Franklin County projects eligible for federal aid, and we assist towns with TIP project development and tracking. We also prepare a Long Range Regional Transportation Plan every three years, and facilitate public involvement in the transportation planning process in Franklin County. In 2005 our projects included: the Franklin County Bikeway; Scenic Byways for the Connecticut River, Mohawk Trail, and Route 112; hazardous intersections identification; planning for a Regional Transportation Center; Routes 2 and 116 Safety Improvements; the Route 2 West Safety Study; the Traffic Counting Program; and the Transportation Demand Management Program.

The FRCOG provides **Engineering Services** for rural roadway design, drainage design, slope stabilization, right-of-way acquisition, highway layout research, and maintenance engineering. In 2005 our projects include: the State Street Footprint Reconstruction Project in Buckland; the Green River Road at Workman Brook Slope Stabilization and Culvert Repair Project in Colrain; the Lower Road Culvert Repair Project in Deerfield; the Proposed Changes to the Intersection of Cushman Road and Shutesbury Road in Leverett; and the Public Library Parking and Accessible Access Project in Shutesbury.

Emergency Preparedness Planning initiatives include staffing the Franklin County Local Emergency Planning Committee, the Mohawk Area Public Health Coalition, and the Medical Reserve Corps and serving as fiduciary agent to the Western Regional Homeland Security Advisory Council. We also work with the Tri-State Fire Mutual Aid, local governments, and the other two regional planning agencies in Western Massachusetts to provide integrated planning and technical assistance to improve our region's ability to prepare, respond and recover from natural and man-made disasters. Our 2005 projects included: First Responder/Municipal Training; the Regional Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan; board of health communication and technology grants, high-speed internet access for boards of health, development of a regional radio communications system; and initiation of a Debris Management Plan.

The FRCOG **Community Coalition for Teens** provides services to promote the health and well-being of teens in the Franklin County and North Quabbin region. CCT

collaborates with school and community partners to: establish and support effective youth development and health-promotion programs; provide training and technical assistance for evidence-based practices; and involve and empower youth. CCT projects in 2005 included: a Region-Wide Teen Health Survey; the 14th annual Youth Conference; Communities That Care, UNITY, Student-led Social Norms Marketing, Parent Education, Safe Homes Parent Network, SMART Recovery, and the Teen Outreach Program.

The **Cooperative Inspection Program** is a community service mandated by the state and financed by member towns and inspection fees. This program was formed in 1975 and became so successful that a Plumbing and Electrical inspection services were added in 1986. Services in 2005 included: Building Inspection, Zoning Enforcement, Wiring Inspection, and Plumbing Inspection in 17 County towns.

The **Cooperative Purchasing Program** provides bidding, contracting, and other services to towns and non-profit agencies. The Program saves money by volume discount buying, and we assure that legally required bidding processes are followed. Participation in any established bidding and contracting program is fee based. Consultation on any bidding or proposal project is available on an hourly basis. Programs in 2005 included: Highway Products and Services, Fuel Products, Dog Licenses and Dog Tags.

The **Regional Health Inspection Program** is designed to respond to the code enforcement and education needs of local Boards of Health. In 2005 the Program provided regional professional health agent support to 16 towns and a monthly Board of Health Capacity-Building Workshop Series.

The **Town Accountant Program** is a fee-for-service program initiated in 2005 to respond to the needs of several Franklin County towns for professional accounting services. We currently serve four towns, and more communities are expected to join in the future. A full range of municipal accounting services is offered to participating communities.

Other **Regional Services** provided in 2005 included: advocating on behalf of our member communities at all levels to ensure that funding programs and policies respond to the rural nature, economic strengths, and human and natural resources of our region; representing Franklin County's interests on many boards and committees and at conferences; helping to facilitate Senator Rosenberg's annual Municipal Conference; producing a Regional Directory; completing a Wage and Salary Survey; and facilitating many workshops and exercises.

The Franklin Regional Council of Governments is committed to providing the best possible service to its member towns and to the region. That is all behind us now and there is no longer a fee needed to obtain a permit, until you may feel a need to charge for this service.

Franklin County Solid Waste Management District

To the Residents of the Solid Waste District:

The Solid Waste District was formed in 1989 to help Franklin County towns manage all aspects of their solid waste – recyclables, organics, hazardous waste, wastewater treatment sludge, and trash. We continue to provide assistance to the twenty-one member towns through administrative support, professional consultation, trainings, and outreach to residents and businesses. The District continues to oversee the operation of three permanent collection sites for common household hazardous wastes such as — oil-based paint and paint-related products, used motor oil, oil filters, antifreeze, fluorescent lights, ballasts, and rechargeable batteries. These sites are open year-round to all District residents. There is a small disposal fee. The sites are located in Bernardston, Colrain, and Conway. Contact the District office for operating hours for each site.

2005 was a rewarding year for the District. The National Recycling Coalition awarded the District its 2005 Outstanding Government Program award. The District was selected over other programs from throughout the United States. This national recognition reflects the innovative and sustainable waste management programs that the District provides to its member towns. We are all grateful for this award and for the continued support of member towns.

In 2005, District towns recycled approximately 2,700 tons of paper and 1,200 tons of mixed containers. By diverting a total of 3,900 tons of recyclables from landfills and incineration, District towns collectively saved over \$250,000 in disposal costs. Overall, recycling still makes good economic sense for District towns. The only disappointing aspect is that the recycling tonnage is almost identical to 2004, which means a stagnant recycling rate for the county. The District will encourage increased recycling through public education in 2006.

The District held its annual household hazardous waste collection in September. On-line registration is increasingly popular. Just over 350 residents participated at the three regional sites. Almost 1,000 gallons of motor oil was collected! The next hazardous waste collection will be held on September 9, 2006. The annual “Clean Sweep” bulky waste collection was held in October. There were 400 participants at three regional sites. We collected 55 tons of appliances, scrap metal, bulky items, electronics, tires, and propane tanks!

Some new programs for 2006 include collecting and disposing of unused prescription medication, a program for junk car removal, and public education campaigns on hazardous products and plastics recycling. District residents can now use the Greenfield Transfer Station for a small day use fee plus disposal fees for a variety of waste materials.

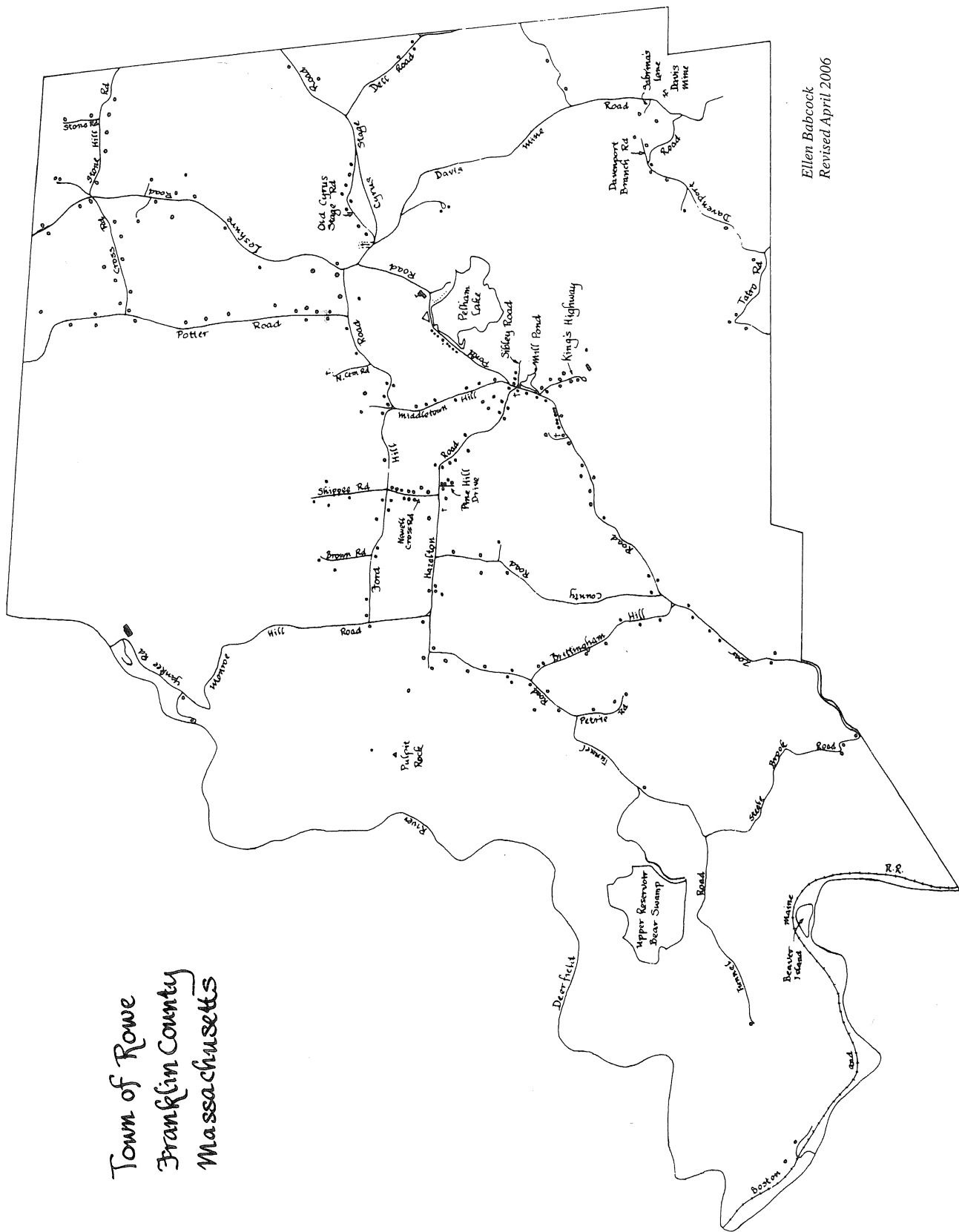
