

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



Departments and Boards

Board of Selectmen

New Member

In May, two members were elected to the Board of Selectmen, one for a three-year term then-held by Paul McLatchy III, and the other a two-year term as a result of Geoff Bagley's resignation in January 2010. Paul McLatchy III was re-elected to a full three-year term, and Jennifer Wood was elected for the two-year term. Jenn was welcomed to the Board, which, with two members under the age of 30, could have the lowest average age in the State.

The Board did not organize until June, as Bill was in recovery from open heart surgery in May. Bill was welcomed back from medical leave and is doing well. At the first meeting of a full board in almost two years, Paul McLatchy III was elected chairman.

Appointments

Over the course of the year, the Board of Selectmen makes a large number of appointments. If added up, the Board appoints over 100 people to various boards, committees, and positions.

FY 2011 Budget

The Board worked very closely with the Finance Committee to produce a budget for the townspeople to vote on in May 2010. Though manpower was in short supply (for a while, it was only two selectmen and one Finance Committee member), a budget pulled through and for the first time in several years, money was put into our Stabilization Account, rather than being taken out.

Capital Stabilization Fund

The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is used to help plan for the replacement of items that have a useful life of five years or more. This prevents departments that have large items (such as a new fire engine or DPW vehicle) from overwhelming the annual budget. Every year the Selectboard is presented with the option to continue an override so that money may be placed into the Capital Stabilization Fund (CSF). In March 2010 we voted to continue to fund the account for the full amount of \$161,534 for FY2011—a 2½% increase over the 2010 appropriation).

In 2010, items that were planned to be paid for out of the CSF included painting of the town buildings, a new police cruiser, equipment for the DPW, and a new copier for the school. (For a full listing, see the results of the 2010 Annual Town Meeting).

Energy Improvements

The two major energy projects were undertaken in 2010 and both were nearly complete by year end.

- The Siemens Energy Savings Contract (ESCO), which is guaranteed to pay for itself over the course of 20 years, was 98% finished. Upgrades included insulation, motion-sensor lighting, new heating systems, etc... The town's energy savings will pay for the cost. (Note: In January 2011, the project was declared finished.)
- School Solar Project...the school solar project, which was funded through a federal ARRA (American Recovery and

Reinvestment Act) funds provided the town with an 18.4 Kw system that was installed by Sirois Electric, in conjunction with Berkshire Photovoltaic. This system will cover approximately 25% of the school's electricity needs.

Though ultimately the decision on which company to award the contract to rested with the Selectboard, the Energy Committee did the real work. We'd like to thank the Energy Committee members who spent countless hours interviewing the companies, reading the multiple 40+ page proposals, and spent over six hours in one sitting formulating a recommendation to the Selectmen: Jack Packard, Dan Miller, B.J. Roche, Dana Williams, Paul McLatchy III, Bill Loomis, and Sharon Hudson. Their dedication helped the town to begin to use renewable energy sources.

DTC Investigation Re Quality of Telephone Service

In 2007 the Town of Rowe and townspeople of Rowe began on a long journey to get improved telephone service in town. For many, many years phone service has been very poor for many residents, mainly due to antiquated equipment. The Board of Selectmen of Rowe, along with the Town of Shutesbury, petitioned the Department of Telecommunications and Cable (DTC) to open an investigation into the matter. On June 1, 2009 the DTC opened an investigation of the telephone service quality provided by Verizon New England, Inc., d/b/a Verizon Massachusetts, to its customers in Berkshire, Hampden, Hampshire and Franklin Counties ("Western Massachusetts"). On December 16, 2010, the Attorney General of Massachusetts, Verizon, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Works, and the Towns of Egremont, Hancock and Leverett filed a Joint Motion for Approval of Settlement. The DTC granted the joint motion and approved the Settlement Agreement as it "is in the public interest since it will provide benefits to consumers, in the form of improved telecommunications infrastructure and service, and requires additional reporting by Verizon MA of its service quality performance in Western Massachusetts." We hope our journey is over.

Public Safety

We'd like to thank our public safety personnel for the dedication and time they've given to this town. Whether it's in the middle of winter at 3:00 in the morning, or Saturday afternoon in the summer, they put others' needs above themselves to respond to all kinds of emergencies.

We'd like to thank our Fire Chief Jim White, Fire Department Administrative Clerk Ed May, our Fire Officers and Firefighters, First Responders, EMS Coordinator/EMT Gail May, EMT Selmi Hyytinen, Police Chief Henry Dandeneau, and Police Officers Selmi Hyytinen, Julie Shippee, and Melissa Salls for their service to the town this past year. We'd especially thank Ed May for his service as Fire Chief to the town for twenty-five years. Ed was mandated by state pension laws to retire in May 2010 upon turning 65 that month. Ed did agree to stay with the Fire Department in an administrative capacity, so is still very much involved, and continues with his other emergency management duties as well. Thank you, Ed.

Department of Public Works

A big "thank you" to Jim Taylor, Matt Crowningshield, Lance Larned, and Rick Hamilton for doing a great job keeping our roads and public areas in such great condition. They've also been a great help to our residents, doing small tasks that might otherwise be very troublesome or even undoable.

Volunteers and Public Servants

We'd like to offer our gratitude to all of our other officers (Animal Inspector, Dog Officer, Constable, Election Officials, Inspectors, Registrars and Veterans' Agent) as well as the myriad other volunteer officials who have helped the town in 2010. The Board extends our thanks for all the work that both our elected and appointed officials do. Our town could not function without your support and dedication.

Our employees — Sandy Daviau, Ellen Miller, and Julie Shippee have been enormously helpful over the past year. They are there to assist townspeople in whatever needs they have.

A special thank you goes to Ellen Miller, who serves as the Town Coordinator and Town Accountant. In her work she assists the Selectboard, other boards, and residents to accomplish their tasks. Her ability to research, make phone calls, and track down anything helps our town to operate smoothly.

Board of Health

We welcomed new board member David Cousineau, who was elected in the annual election in May 2010. Catherine Snyder was elected as Chairperson.

Board of Health Clerk

Linda Bickford accepted reappointment as the Board of Health Clerk and continued in that position until December 31, 2010, when we regretfully accepted her resignation. We will miss her and wish her the best in her future endeavors. In January of 2011 we welcomed our new clerk Marcella Stafford Gore. She comes to us from our neighboring town of Monroe where she has been the town clerk for over 15 years.

Rowe Health Agent

Lisa Danek-Burke accepted reappointment as Health Agent for the town. She conducts inspections (food establishment, bed and breakfast, children's camps, and housing), performs soil evaluations, and reviews all septic system plans. Lisa is a Registered Sanitarian, a Certified Soil Evaluator, our Title 5 Inspector and is Serv-Safe certified. Her knowledge and experience are greatly appreciated and often sought by the Board.

Title 5

The Board reviewed all building permit applications submitted for review by the Building Inspector, as required by State Title 5 regulations. Title 5 septic system and soil evaluations and perc tests were down again this year in response to the current state of the economy.

Transfer Station / Solid Waste Disposal

The Board reappointed Jim Lively and Ted Palmer as Transfer Station Attendants. The Board also appointed Julie Shippee as an Alternate Transfer Station Attendant.

We want to recognize our Attendants' efforts in helping to keep our disposal costs down. Since they began an increased surveillance of recycling and bulky waste the cost of our 2010 bulky waste disposal has decreased. This increased surveillance has also discouraged the use of our transfer station by non-residents.

The Board, recognizing an area of concern regarding the solid waste disposal, held an open meeting for town residents to discuss this issue. Jan Ameen from the Franklin County Solid Waste Management District spoke at this meeting and supported the board's effort to try to contain the costs. The meeting was attended by more than 25 residents who shared ideas and concerns.

The disposable of trash, bulky and metal waste continue to take up the majority of our annual disposal. The Board of Health is continuing to review several options to reduce this, and in the coming months there will be more information available. We welcome comments and ideas.

The Board thanks Jan Ameen and the staff at the Franklin County Solid Waste Management District (FCSWMD) for providing us with such good service. FCSWMD manages all of our solid waste, recycling and hauling contracts, the regional hazardous waste collection days, and our sharps and bio-hazard waste collections. They also compile all necessary reports and statistics throughout the year and they respond promptly to our questions and requests. (Please see their report in the regional section.)

Recycling

At the Annual Rowe Old Home Day in July, the Board of Health had a booth that displayed samples of recyclable materials, provided information about recycling, and provided direction on the disposal of mercury. Those residents who completed a survey on recycling were eligible for a free recycling bin given away every hour.

During 2010, Rowe's recycling rate increased from 24% to 25.7%. This is good news but Rowe continues to be ranked at the bottom of the FCSWD nineteen towns for recycling. Each household in town needs to make a more concerted effort to increase their recycling. Please contact the transfer station attendants for questions concerning what needs to be recycled and how to dispose of it. There are recycle bins for household items available to townspeople. Contact either the attendants or the Board to acquire them.

Earnings from recycling are held in escrow by the FCSWMD and used to purchase copy and computer paper for the town offices and to offset part of our annual assessment for membership in the FCSWMD.

Water Management

Bill Enser and Berkshire Enviro Labs of Lee MA continue to serve as our Certified Water Operator for our four (4) Public Water Supplies—the Town Hall, the Rowe Elementary School, the Avery Fountain and the well at the Pelham Lake Park. Berkshire Enviro Labs conducts weekly testing at the swimming area at Pelham Lake Park during the swimming season. In August MA DEP conducted an unannounced site inspection of the town's public water supplies. There were some deficiencies noted and corrected. As a result, the Gracy House will be connected to the Town Hall's well.

Health Services

Sheila Litchfield was reappointed as town nurse. Our town is fortunate to have such a dedicated professional providing health service. The Health Services office had an increase of patients over the past year. As a result of the increase in the use of the Town Nurse, the board has agreed with her assessment to increase the Health Service Hours from 16 to 24 each week. Sheila provides articles for the *Goal Post* and provides the Board with monthly summary reports. These are useful in assessing how

the town residents are being served. We would like to thank Sheila for her hard work and dedication to the residents she serves. Dr. Richard Warner continues to be our medical consultant.

In Closing

The Board of Health strives to make the best decisions possible to serve the residents of Rowe. We would not be able to accomplish all that we do without the help of those who support us. We thank our families for their patience and understanding of the time we spend doing the board's work. We thank Linda,

Marcella, Sheila, Lisa, Dick, Ted, and Jim for their hard work and service. To Ellen and Sandy, thank you for your help and wealth of knowledge.

Broadband and Telecommunications Committee

We lost one member, Greg Poehlein, and gained two: David Lenth and more recently, Noel Abbott. We thank Greg for his service. Noel recently moved to Rowe and has shown much enthusiasm. He brings organizational skills to the committee.

The fixed wireless system we contracted is now in place, though improvements are ongoing. The main obstacle to getting service providers to bring broadband to rural areas is the initial capital costs that cannot be recovered by a small number of subscribers. The goal of this project was to pay for some initial infrastructure. specifically 5 wireless transceivers to be strategically placed to reach as many unserved residents as possible. The actual service must be purchased by the individual subscribers. Wireless systems cannot go around corners, so hills and forest pose problems. In order to have a clear line of sight to receive the signal beamed in from out of Town and then relayed where service is needed, AccessPlus determined the key locations necessary to mount the equipment. We are grateful to Art Corarito, James Williams, Becky Bradley, Joe Thane, and Rowe Camp for offering the use of their rooftops and property for this project. The primary target area is the Davenport / Davis Mine Rd area and secondarily, the upper Zoar Road area. DSL is not available in these areas. The project got off to a shaky start due to challenges of the terrain and the illness of a key worker, but the basic system is up and several people have now subscribed to the wireless service. Subscriptions are being handled by a subsidiary of AccessPlus, Country Road Networks - call (978) 499-9164 to see if service is available at your house. Due to terrain, not all houses in covered areas are reachable. In some cases, installing a tall antenna can help. AccessPlus is continuing to work on improving and possibly expanding the network to reach more unserved residents.

The Mass Broadband Institute, MBI, asked for help on two regional projects. One is a mapping project to show where Broadband is needed. We supplied them with information from our previous survey. The other was a grant proposal to get matching Federal and State funds for building out Middle Mile Fiber to all Towns that can then be used by service providers and Towns to reach end users. Upon their request, we supplied them with information and testimonials to support their grant proposal. They were refused on the initial round of grants, but did finally get a grant. Over the next couple of years they will be building out this high bandwidth fiber grid with drop points in every Town.

The MBI effort does not actually reach any end users. Wired-West is a regional effort to make use of the fiber grid MBI is building and bring fiber to the end users in participating Towns. WiredWest is set up as a non-profit municipal utility. In order to participate in their plans, Towns must create a "Lighting Plant Utility." The name derives from the original use of this provision of Mass Law which was for street lighting many years ago. The same legal provisions were later used to set up the initial electric service and later telephone service to our area. It requires two separate 2/3 votes to create the Lighting Plant. The first vote passed at the special town meeting on February 1, 2011. The second vote is expected to take place at the annual town meeting on May 9th. There are no costs or obligations, but in order to have the option to join WiredWest, we must pass the Lighting Plant

vote. If and when WiredWest's plans come to fruition, then they will build and operate the necessary infrastructure and provide service to all residents who wish to subscribe. The plans call for the initial costs to be paid with grants and venture capital. Noel Abbott is attending regular meetings as our primary delegate with WiredWest as they organize and work toward the goal. WiredWest is the best hope for our area to keep up with the digital age.

Finally, a couple of years ago, Rowe filed a complaint with the Mass DTC about the poor telephone service that many of our residents receive from Verizon. Unlike Broadband internet, POTS (Plain Old Telephone Service) is mandated by law, so Verizon is obligated to provide a basic level of service. Other Communities also had complaints, so the DTC consolidated these into a class and held a series of hearings. The case was recently resolved with Verizon agreeing to make necessary repairs and improvements. It remains to be seen how well the settlement is enforced, but there is hope for improved service.

Trash removal was also available to our immobile seniors, thanks again, to Presley Veber who answered the call for those seniors in need.

Emergency Medical Services [EMS]

Once again our EMS personnel have done an outstanding job responding to all EMS emergencies. Your dedication is admirable. I appreciate all you do and the time you take out of your personal lives for training and responding to calls. Our families play an important role in the work we do because of the support they give our team throughout the year. In order to meet the requirements of a FIRST RESPONDER one must complete an 80-hour course and pass a written and practical exam. Recertification is required every three years. EMT certification requires completion of a 110-hour course and successfully passing a state exam, which also includes a written and practical exam. Recertification is required every two years and consists of a 24-hour refresher course and an additional 28 hours of continuing education classes.

We currently have 2 certified EMTs and 9 first responders.

Last year our EMTs and first responders responded to 29 medical emergencies. Our EMTs and first responders continue to respond in a timely manner to any situation and deliver the highest quality of care.

If you have an emergency it is extremely important to dial 911 immediately. Calling a knowledgeable friend or an EMT/first responder will delay the initiation of EMS. For our new residents in town—and those that may not have ever utilized the 911 system—I would like to explain the sequence of events once a 911 call has been made. When 9-1-1 has been dialed a dispatcher from Shelburne Control will answer your call. He or she will ask the nature of your emergency and at that time determine the level of care needed for your emergency. The dispatcher will then notify Charlemont Ambulance and Rowe EMTs and first responders. If your emergency requires Advanced Life Support a paramedic unit will be dispatched from Greenfield at the same time. Considering the rural area in which we live, this response system has worked well in the past. If 911 is activated and you then decide you do not want or need the ambulance, or if you have dialed 911 by mistake, please stay on the line and explain the situation. Otherwise, you can expect a visit from the police department who must be dispatched to verify that an emergency situation does not exist.

Rowe EMS personnel will respond to your emergency with both the knowledge and equipment necessary to help stabilize a patient before and during transport to the hospital by ambulance. As rural as the town of Rowe is, our first responders play a critical role in the outcome of your emergency and thus are an important part of the chain of survival. Rowe EMS works closely with Rowe Fire Department. Most of our members are crossed-trained as medical, fire and/or police personnel. We respond to both fire and police scenes to aid and support these departments.

Due to the aging of EMT personnel associated with both the Charlemont Ambulance and Rowe EMS it is important to recruit new or certified EMTs. To ensure ambulance service to both our town and neighboring towns in the future, there must be enough EMTs to adequately staff the ambulance. If there is anyone who is currently EMT-certified, or would be interested in becoming an EMT and would like to join our department please contact me at 339-5761.

Energy Committee

This was a year of accomplishments:

- The two years in the making <u>Guaranteed Energy Savings</u> <u>Performance Contract with Siemens</u> was finally completed on January 1, 2011.
- The Town applied for and was awarded a federal stimulus grant to install a 19.6 kW ground mounted solar PV array at Rowe Elementary School that was fully installed and interconnected with the grid by January 28, 2011.
- The Town enacted the <u>"Stretch Code"</u> for its official building code (effective July 1, 2011) which met Criterion 5 of Green Communities.
- A <u>"Rowe Energy Future Forum"</u> was held at which <u>Green Communities Criteria</u> were presented by representatives from the Franklin Regional Council of Governments.
- During the forum and at a booth at the July 2010 Old Home Day celebration, home energy improvement programs (emphasizing the MassSave free audit process) were promoted; many Rowe residents took advantage of free MassSave audits of their homes this year.
- Rowe voters were surveyed about their level of support for Rowe to become a Massachusetts Green Community. Attitudes toward wind, solar, and biomass facilities, the Stretch Code, clean energy R&D or manufacturing facilities, and other aspects of energy improvements in the town were measured and tabulated. All comments were included in the full survey results that were mailed to all voters.

After two years of installation, with several design improvements (including the addition of a heat-recovery system at the Elementary School), the Guaranteed Energy Savings Perfor-

mance Contract with Siemens Building Technologies was finally completed. Measurement and Verification was begun for the period January 1, 2011, to December 31, 2011, of the number of gallons of heating fuel oil and the number of kWh's of electricity that are actually saved throughout the five town buildings. Among the comprehensive energy conservation measures installed by Siemens in the school, town hall, library, DPW garage, and fire station, were heating system updates, insulation and sealing improvements, weatherization of all doors, and thermostats that set back heating and cooling during unoccupied hours. At the Rowe Elementary School an Energy Management System has replaced all the old pneumatic and electric heating controls with a digitized system of over 100 points of measurement, including oxygen level sensors that refresh the air in classrooms whenever the carbon dioxide levels read too high. All remaining incandescent lamps in Town were replaced with compact fluorescents. Occupation sensors now control virtually all lighting circuits in our buildings. The Siemens work is projected to reduce by over one-third the total utility consumption (combined fuel oil and electricity) in our municipal buildings.

In late December of 2009, the town applied for an American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) federal grant for a 19.6 kW ground-mounted solar PV installation at the Rowe Elementary School. On February 14, 2010, the Town was notified of its award of an EECBG (Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant through ARRA) of \$148,176 for the project. On July 29, 2010, the Selectmen announced the selection of Berkshire Photovoltaic Services of Adams, MA as the solar installer, and Sirois Electric of Burlington, MA, as the electrical installer. Construction began in late August and the project was completed

in December, 2010. Final interconnection with National Grid was made on January 28, 2011. The 18.4 kW array (the rating of the finished project) will continue to supply an estimated 20% or more of the electricity demands of the Rowe School for at least the next 30 years (or perhaps decades longer).

The town made significant progress toward qualification by the Mass Department of Energy (DOER) as a Green Community. A grant was awarded Rowe in 2009 for Technical Assistance in creating a Green Communities Action Plan to schedule the implementation of measures to meet all five Criteria during 2010 and 2011. The Town has so far qualified for two of the five: Criterion 4 (an agreement to replace any non-exempt vehicles with energy-efficient models—not hard for us as only two pickup trucks were not exempt), and Criterion 5 (a Stretch [higher level of energy conservation] Building Code) that was enacted at a Special Town Meeting on November 16, 2010 (following a public hearing held on November 9th). This new code will take effect on July 1, 2011. This leaves three criteria to be addressed in 2011:

Criterion 3, to create a formal plan to reduce municipal energy consumption by 20 % over five years, (to meet this, a modest plan to reduce streetlight and vehicle fuel use is the only uncompleted part [the Siemens work already represents the bulk of the Criteria 3 conservation plan]), and Criteria 1 and 2 which would be met if the town enacts an as-of-right zoning overlay bylaw for an energy generation facility (solar or wind), or a clean energy R&D facility or manufacturing facility. The Action Plan projects to complete these remaining three (3) Green Community Criteria by fall or winter of 2011, if Rowe voters accept the proposed bylaws.

Fire & Emergency Management Departments

During the last report period the Fire Department responded to 47 calls:

- 30 Medical Emergencies
- 2 Chimney Fire
- 2 Brush Fires
- 5 Mutual Aid Calls
- 5 Fire Detection Alarms
- 1 Power Lines Down
- 1 County Radio System Down
- 1 Wire on Tree

At the July meeting/training the members of the fire department decided that they will no longer clean chimneys. The decision was primarily based on the potential of litigation. As in the past town residents may use the chimney cleaning equipment upon request. Rowe was the last town in the area to discontinue the program.

In the event of an emergency – fire, police, or medical—call 9-1-1 immediately. Do not waste precious time trying to contact a friend, neighbor or member of the Department directly. Enhanced 9-1-1 has been a highly effective and beneficial service to the town; any call to 9-1-1 automatically provides the dispatcher with the telephone number and the name and address listed for that number. If you have special needs or concerns, please contact me directly and I will provide the necessary information to the Dispatch Center.

On February 28, 2003, President Bush issued Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 (HSPD-5), which directed the Secretary of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System (NIMS). NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template to enable all government, private-sector and nongovernmental organizations to work together during domestic incidents. HSPD-5 required federal departments and agencies to make the adoption of NIMS by state and local organizations a condition for federal preparedness assistance (grants, contracts and other activities) by fiscal year 2005.

The Town complied by adopting the Incident Command System (ICS) and NIMS. The ICS was developed in the 1970s and was adopted by most fire departments. The ICS is a standardized, on-scene, all-hazard incident management concept which allows its users to adopt an integrated organizational structure to match the complexities and demands of single or multiple incidents without being hindered by jurisdictional boundaries. ICS has considerable internal flexibility. It can grow or shrink to meet different needs. This flexibility makes it a very cost-effective and efficient management approach for both small and large situations.

Members of the Highway, Police, and Fire Departments, elected officials and Town administration staff received NIMS 700, ICS 100, and ICS 200 level training to comply with both HSPD-5 and Governor Mitt Romney Executive Order No. 469.

The Franklin County Regional Emergency Planning Committee (REPC) has completed revision of the Hazardous Materials

Emergency Plan for the county. This original plan was approved by all towns in Franklin County. The submitted plan was reapproved by the State.

The Franklin County REPC was formed to enhance cooperative regional emergency planning and to address Federal SARA Title III, which states that all communities must have active Local Emergency Planning Committees, procedures to deal with hazardous materials emergencies, meet right-to-know requirements, and encourage community awareness. With the leadership and administrative support of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG), all 26 Franklin County towns opted into a regional effort beginning in the year 2000.

The Committee elected an "all hazards" approach to emergency planning, underscoring our responsibility for aiding towns in planning for hazardous material emergencies as well as other natural, technological, and man-made events that call for a similar inter-town, inter-disciplinary response.

During the open burning season for 2010 there were a total of 114 permits issued. Article 310 CMR 7.07 contains the Massachusetts regulation defining allowable open burning: the disposal of brush, cane, driftwood and forestry debris, excluding grass, hay and leaves, during the period from January 15 to (and including) May 1 at 4:00 PM, provided a valid permit from the local fire department or fire warden has been obtained. The burning is allowed on the land proximate to the place of generation, at a location greater than 75 feet from any dwelling, between the hours of 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM, except during periods of adverse meteorological conditions. This regulation does not apply to: open burning for the purpose of combating or backfiring an existing fire by persons affiliated with an official fire fighting agency; open burning conducted primarily for cooking purposes; open burning related to the operation of devices such as blowtorches and welding torches, for which no alternative source of heat can be used, provided that such devices do not cause a condition of air pollution.

Burning for agricultural purposes is controlled by a separate section of this regulation. Agricultural practices involve the cultivation of soil for the purpose of crop production and/or the raising of livestock, when such crops are produced primarily for commercial food, and such livestock are raised primarily for commercial foodstuff or for work purposes. Agricultural operations as defined as those operations which raise commercial foodstuffs and/or livestock on an area larger than one acre.

Christmas Tree Disposal: Any person may burn Christmas trees during the period from December 26 to January 7, provided a permit is obtained from the head of the fire department where such burning shall take place, and further provided that such burning is under the supervision and control of the fire department per 527 CMR 10:23:3.

The Bureau of Forest Fire Control as part of the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) provides five classes of wildfire danger conditions to help in determining whether open burning permits should be issued.

They are as follows:

1 (Low)

Fuels do not ignite readily from small firebrands although a more intense heat source, such as lightning, may start in duff or punky wood. Weather and fuel conditions will lead to slow fire spread, low intensity and relatively easy control. Controlled burns can usually be executed with reasonable safety.

2 (Moderate)

Fires can start from most accidental causes, but with the exception of lightning fires in some areas, the number of starts is generally low. Fires are not likely to become serious and control is relatively easy. Although controlled burning can be done without creating a hazard, routine caution should be taken.

3 (High)

All fine dead fuels ignite readily and fires start easily from most causes. Unattended brush and camp fires are likely to escape. Fires spread rapidly and may become serious and difficult to control if not attacked while small. Outdoor burning should be restricted to early morning.

4 (Very High)

Fires start easily from all causes and immediately after ignition, spread rapidly and increase quickly in intensity. Fires burning in light fuels may quickly develop high intensity. Both suppression and control will require an extended and thorough effort. Outdoor burning is not recommended.

5 (Extreme)

Fires start quickly, spread furiously, and burn intensely. All fires are potentially serious. Every fire start has the potential to become large. No outdoor burning should be allowed to take place.

The Fire Department is made up completely of volunteers from town. The effectiveness of this organization is determined by the number of individuals it can train and maintain in a state of readiness, and by the condition of its equipment. This year we were fortunate to gain Iulie Shippee as an active volunteer, and would welcome anyone else interested in protecting lives and property from the devastating effects of fire. Not all of the activities required to prepare for and combat a fire involve hands-on fire fighting. There is plenty of other work with which we could use help. Our program of regular monthly training/meetings is conducted the first Monday of the month. These sessions are approximately one to two hours in length – a small investment of your time when weighed against the benefit that may be derived from your membership. The officers of the Department would like to thank all members who participate in our activities regularly, and ask other members of the town to become involved.

Fire Chief Ed May retired this year. Ed was Fire Chief for 25 years and active member of the department for 35 years. Massachusetts General Law requires all uniformed public safety personnel (police officers and firefighters, including officers) to retire by the end of the month they turn age 65. Chief May successfully completed NIMS 700 and ICS 100, 200, 300, and 400 (the highest level) training, in accordance with state and federal requirements. He completed the 32-hour Rapid Intervention Team Train the Trainer course in March 2010. Ed continues to perform administrative functions, training and other non-fire fighting responsibilities.

Historical Commission

As in most every endeavor of municipal government, the Rowe Historical Commission has been severely handicapped in 2010 by the lack of funding and support from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The effects of the 3-year recession in our state and nation have effectively brought to a standstill most of the ongoing preservation projects at the local level.

We had expected, by this time, to be in the midst of an ambitious Landscape Preservation Program, which would have been substantially funded by the Mass. Historical Commission. The project began with a State funded photography project of every residence and other structure in Rowe in 2009. The photographer spent a week taking digital photos throughout the town, but the funding and the photographer disappeared, and no such photos have been located at the Mass. Historical Commission.

We have explored the potential for various grants to assist in the preservation and adaptive-reuse of the Gracy House Community Center. Again, in this recession such funding has virtually dried up. As the nation and state recovers over the next several years, we will continue to pursue potential grants for the resumption of improvements to the Gracy House, including an elevator (or lift) to allow public use of the second floor.


Although we recently applied for a 2011 MHC Preservation Award (Adaptive Reuse) for the community's efforts so far, we learned such projects must be "completed" to be considered. At some time in the future, we will again apply for such recognition.

We heartily commend the selectmen and others, especially the noble volunteers who have given so much time and effort to achieve the current status of the project. The town has spent about \$28,000 on the current code (and other) improvements. It is now in use by the Council on Aging for Senior Citizen gatherings, but only for the first floor. It is also available for other community organizations and citizens for private gatherings. We, along with many townspeople, look forward to the day when the second floor becomes available for full utilization of that space and Rowe will have a full-service Community Center.

We also congratulate the trustees and members of the Rowe Historical Society, for their renewed efforts to make the Society a major part of the Rowe community. Their recent "Christmas" and "St. Valentine's" parties were spectacular successes and should create renewed community interest – with many new members and meaningful financial support. GO ROWE HISTORICAL SOCIETY!

Library Trustees

2010 was a year of struggle for our library as it was an intense time trying to get our items entered in the CWMars database with our intermittent and slow Internet connection. The year ended with significant progress in the project and a plan for a T-1 connection.

Our antiquated circulation system ended the year valiantly operating in its last days with the server computer connections reinforced with shims and wire.

The bright side of this time was the hundreds of hours of volunteer time provided by the staff and community people in placing bar codes on books, entering data (and re-entering data when the connection was lost), decorating the library for the holidays, tending the flowers in the summer, etc.

The Library more than met state certification requirements by being open 24 hours per week to provide adult and children's services. While we feel the loss of the Regional Bookmobile Service, we continue to purchase new materials and discard worn and outdated ones. We own 12,396 items for loan or use in the library, including books, magazines, DVDs, videos, audiocassettes and CDs.

On May 1st Tim Van Egmond performed at the library in a program to celebrate "Turn off the TV Week." The summer reading program had 13 registered readers. Children who completed the program received prizes of water bottles, lunch boxes, banks, books, and a grand prize of two tickets to the Big E. Although bad weather caused the cancellation of the final program at the lake, it was held at the Rowe school and many more children were able to enjoy Roger Ticknell's musical performance.

The trustees meet monthly at the library, and citizens are always welcome to attend. Meetings are posted at the Town Hall and at the Library.



Park Commission

The Park Commissioners were very pleased with the smooth operations of the Park during the 2010 season.

In the spring we commissioners—Russell Jolly, MaryJo Phelps and Mike Laffond—continued to work on plans for a replacement bathroom facility. With the untiring efforts of Park Ranger Sean Loomis we developed the idea of a new building which would utilize a composting system. Russell drafted working plans for the 14' x 16' structure, Clivus® composting toilets were selected, a local builder—Mike Freeman of Heath—was hired, the Highway Department broke ground and site work began. Special thanks should be acknowledged to the Board of Health and Conservation Commission for their site visits and aid in getting the project under way. The coordinating for the project was carried out by our Park Ranger, all the while attending to the needs of the townspeople and his staff during the busy summer months.

In May Russ Jolly left our board as he did not seek reelection and new member Bruce Cowie was elected. Thank you for all of your work Russ, and welcome to the commission Bruce.

Our summer Park employees were: Rangers Ken Bradley, Nancy Phelps, Joshua Taylor, Will Booth and Mark Buck; Lifeguards Chris Wilkins, Jacob Smead, Sarah Burke and Susanna Branch; Summer Recreation Program workers Brittani Sprague, Dana Williams, Paul McLatchy III, Alex Rice, Sophie Taylor and Ashton Morse; and Sports Program workers Charles Garbiel and Alex Rice. Thank you all for the great jobs you did.

The YMCA's two-week swim lesson program and Zoar Outdoor kayak lessons with Janet Cowie provided structured instruction for all age groups. Botanical Survey of Pelham Lake

Botanical Survey of Pelham Lake Rowe, Massachusetts

Described herein is a report of botanical surveys for the rare Farwell's Water-Milfoil (Myriophyllum farwellii) within Pelham Lake, Franklin Co., Massachusetts. This species is imperiled in Massachusetts and currently listed as "endangered". This survey was mandated by MA Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program to help minimize any rare species impacts during proposed lake management activities.

Method

In compliance with MA Natural Heritage survey protocol, all suitable habitats (i.e., shallow pond margins) of the target species were assessed during the current growing season, over an appropriate period for diagnostic material (Fig. 1). An effort was made to inventory all the vascular plants encountered in the lake and to describe the plant communities.

The lake was surveyed by canoe on two occasions, initially on 16 Jul 2010 and subsequently on 17 Aug 2010. Prior to the surveys, I examined the *Myriophyllum farwellii* collections of the Hodgedon Herbarium (Univ. New Hampshire), Olney Herbarium (Brown University), and Bridgewater State University to aid my preparation and proper identification. During all site visits I was assisted by Jeff Carboni.

When species were difficult to diagnose in the field, fragments were collected and later identified or confirmed. All determinations were made using Crow & Hellquist (Aquatic and Wetland Plants of Northeastern North America), Gleason & Cronquist (Manual of Vascular Plants of Northeastern United States and Adjacent Canada), and/or Magee & Ahles (Flora of the Northeast) as references. All nomenclature is that adopted by Sorrie & Somers (The Vascular Plants of Massachusetts: A County Checklist). For Myriophyllum specimens, Hellquist and Crow (Aquatic Vascular Plants of New England, Part 6) was also consulted.

Findings

Pelham Lake is a moderate-sized (71 acres) freshwater lake with a small section of shore that serves as a public bathing beach (Fig. 1). The northwestern bank directly borders Pond Road and a northeastern portion is developed with a few homes and cottages, while the beach portion of the pond is a managed sandy shore and picnic area. The remaining (majority) shoreline and surrounding area is wooded and undeveloped. The open water is used for recreational purposes.




Figure 2. Open water of Pelham Lake (17 Aug 2010). Photo facing northwest.

Most of the water body is open (Fig. 2), but the surrounding shores, particularly the shallow coves, support a dense floating-leaf community and submerged plant community. Floating-leaved species identified in the survey area include *Brasenia schreberi*, *Sparganium fluctuans*, *Potamogeton epihydrus*, *Nuphar variegata* and *Nymphaea odorata* (Fig 3). Populations of *Brasenia schreberi* were particularly dense within areas of the large southeastern cove (south of Tuttle Brook) of the lake (Fig 4).




Figure 7. Emergent shoreline in small eastern cove (north of Tuttle Brook) of Pelham Lake (16 Jul 2010). Photo facing north.

A submersed plant community was present more or less throughout the survey area (Figs. 56). Submersed species include Potamogeton epihydrus, P. bicupulatus, Utricularia purpurea, U. radiata, Najas gracillima, and Scirpus subterminalis. The most common species, and most abundant, was Utricularia purpurea. A few emergent species were observed along the shores and included Typha latifolia, Dulichium arundinaceum, Lythrum salicaria, Sagittaria latifolia, Carex sp. and Eleocharis sp. (Fig 7). The wooded transitional edge around most of the survey area included Spiraea alba, Acer rubrum, Alnus rugosa, Osmunda regalis, and Triadenum purpurea.





Figure 9. Documentation of *Myriophyllum farwellii* in Pelham Lake (16 Jul 2010). Plants covered in a fine organic material.

<u>Target species:</u> Consistent with earlier records, Myriophyllum farwellii was observed in the lake. This species was confirmed at four separate areas—all within west-facing protected coves (Fig. 8). Water depths at plant locations ranged from 15 cm to 60 cm. Every colony had plants with abundant fruits and individuals appeared to be healthy. All colonies were considered dense (Fig 9).

All four confirmed occurrences of Myriophyllum farwellii were diagnosed by their submerged scattered-alternate leaves, lack of emersed foliage, and axillary fruits with distinct tuberculate ridges (Fig. 10). Only the shallow, protected coves of the lake appear to be suitable habitat for this species. Species associated with Myriophyllum farwellii included Brasenia schreberi, Sparganium fluctuans, Utricularia purpurea, U. radiata, Potamogeton epihydrus, Nuphar variegata, and Nymphaea odorata.

Conservation recommendations: Immediate threats to Myriophyllum farwellii in Pelham Lake are not obvious other than inadvertent damage by recreational activities. Potential threats would include lake eutrophication, sedimentation/accretion, and/or competition from other aquatic plants. Individuals on the eastern side of the lake, i.e., flanking Tuttle Brook to the north and south, were noticeably covered with fine organic material (see Fig 9). Beaver activity in and around Tuttle Brook purportedly results in a sediment discharge into the lake. A noticeable broad "sand bar" exists where the brook enters the lake. As for competition, Brasenia schreberi provided a very dense floating-leaf cover at places near the colonies and Utricularia pupurea & U. radiata were very dense throughout the shallow coves. Fortunately, no invasive aquatic species were identified anywhere in the lake and only a few individuals of Lythrum salicaria were observed along the shoreline. Lake management strategies (e.g., mechanical harvesting or herbicide use) should avoid the protected coves of the lake if possible.

Conclusions

Individuals of Farwell's Water-milfoil (*Myriophyllum farwellii*) were observed at four localities during comprehensive surveys of Pelham Lake in July-August 2010. These populations appeared to be healthy and reproductive. An effort should be made to protect these populations of an otherwise rare species.

Yankee Land Committee

During the past year the Yankee Land Committee has continued to investigate the possibility of the Town acquiring the 1,735 acres owned by the Yankee Atomic Electric Company. However, before the committee felt it could move forward in its next phase of discussion with the plant owners, their contractors, and those agencies and organizations that could assist the Town, the committee needed to gauge the support of the Town residents. In July 2010, a questionnaire was sent to town voters to seek their comments. Of the 306 questionnaires sent out, 135 were returned by the deadline of August 13 for a return rate of 44%.

Of those who responded, an overwhelming number felt that the Town should be involved in the property's eventual disposition while approximately half of the respondents agreed that the Town should be the eventual owner of the property. The majority of respondents agreed that since the property as currently zoned represents the Town's industrial base, The Town should control future industrial use through acquisition. A clear majority supported the committee's effort to work with a coalition of conservation partners to explore acquisition approaches with the landowner.

Based on these responses the Committee has established a partnership with The Franklin Land Trust to investigate land protection options. The Committee is currently partnering with the Franklin Regional Council of Governments to secure grant funds to develop a re-use plan for the property. Hopefully this particular effort could be completed before the summer of 2011.

Rowe residents can be assured that any recommendations requiring a commitment by the Town will be brought to the attention of the appropriate town boards and committees and the Board of Selectmen prior to Town-wide discussion and approval.

The Yankee Land Committee welcomes members of the public at our meetings that are usually held (as needed) on the first and third Thursdays of every month.





It is once again my pleasure to submit the calendar year principal's report for Rowe Elementary School. 2010 for Rowe School students and staff was a great year of continued success.

- Rowe School students had the best MCAS testing assessment results in Franklin County.
- Rowe School teachers began working with a great new language arts assessment that gives the most meaningful information about a students' reading ability available and a new addition to our reading instruction program called Guided Reading.
- The final ESCO building improvements were completed thanks to the Rowe Energy Committee. The energy management system is helping us to save more of our energy dollars every day.
- Another thank you to the Rowe Energy Committee, and a Federal Stimulus Grant, as we now have a beautiful new solar array that will take care of close to a third of our electrical demands.
- Kindergarten through grade six students visited Hancock Shaker Village as part of an early American unit of study.
- Enrichment activities during and after school including sports offerings, hikes, drama, Science Club, music at Mohawk, and an increase in our use of Pelham Lake Park.
- The Rowe Parent Teacher Partnership held their 11th Holly Berry Craft Fair; an event looked forward to by many in and out of town.
- We had our largest and most successful spaghetti supper fundraiser for the 5th and 6th grade field trip to Nature's Classroom.

- Volunteerism remains high as students worked for local, national, and international relief efforts. Locally students collected food for the "Good Neighbors" pantry, money for "Adopt-A-Family," "Warm the Children," Haiti relief efforts, and "UNICEF." Students' also cleaned the Zoar picnic area for the 10th year in a row, worked in school flower and vegetable beds and continue to be good citizens locally while thinking globally.
- SCA/AmeriCorps volunteers worked with students' 2-days a week for 4-months with projects in environmental science, an after-school outdoor club and building cardboard sleds for the Berkshire East cardboard classic.
- Fifth and sixth grade students visited Nature's Classroom on Cape Cod. While there they participated in ocean studies about the science vessel "Oceanquest" out of Woods Hole and went on a whale watch out of Provincetown.
- Students continue to learn and speak Spanish in the preschool classroom and up through the sixth grade entering Mohawk with solid world language skills.

Once again the learning adventure remains solid thanks to the continued support of our Rowe School families and the citizens of Rowe. I thank the Town of Rowe for its continued support of its students at the Rowe Elementary School, the Mohawk Trail Regional Middle/High School, and the Franklin County Technical High School.

Mohawk Trail Regional School Districts Superintendent's Report

Introduction

Focused on student learning, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts concentrated on the implementation of their district improvement plans. Each of these improvement plans is guided by five educational goals, which were adopted by the school committees of each district. This annual report is structured according to these five overarching educational goals, which are fairly consistent across the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts.

Student Safety

In May of 2010, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts enacted an anti-bullying law touted as the strictest in the United States. The new law required all public school districts to develop a Bullying Prevention and Intervention Plan by December 31, 2010. With student safety as their number one educational goal, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe districts met this requirement in spirited fashion. Each of the three districts developed and implemented anti-bullying plans that exceeded the Commonwealth's requirements. As part of this effort, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts researched and purchased an anti-bullying program for grades 3-6. The Mohawk district also began researching social skills programs for middle school and high school students. Each of the districts' plans will be reviewed and revised annually with the goal of cultivating positive school cultures that promote academic achievement.

Diverse Learning Opportunities

Related arts and grade level teachers from across the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts established a joint committee to find ways to sustain, grow and integrate related arts programming at all grade levels. As a result of the initiative and dedication of this three district committee, dubbed the Arts Integration Model (AIM) group, a plan was developed for a colonial fair involving 5th grade students from Mohawk, Hawlemont and Rowe. Tied to common social studies learning standards, the three district event will take place at the Wilder Homestead in Buckland on June 1, 2011. Beyond the anticipated success of this colonial fair, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts will continue to explore opportunities to integrate the fine arts into the core academic curriculums.

Quality Instruction

Because student learning is highly impacted by quality teaching, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts provided extensive professional development for the teachers and paraprofessionals of the three districts. In particular during 2010, the Mohawk and Hawlemont staffs received training for a new mathematics program shared by the two districts. Additionally, all three district instructional staffs were provided a copy of the book entitled Teach Like a Champion at the start of the 2010-2011 school year. This book is being used as a professional development resource to spur and share best instructional practices. Looking

ahead, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts began to prepare a professional development plan and calendar for the 2011-2012 school year that would expand and deepen the quality of training for the instructional staffs of the three districts.

High Standards

In 2010, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts continued the implementation of the standards-based elementary report cards that began during the prior year. These standards are mapped to state learning standards, which are assessed annually by the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS). As part of an ongoing effort to strengthen and expand the use of differentiated instruction, tiered instructional training was provided to all staff in the three districts at the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year. Additionally, the Mohawk and Hawlemont districts researched and selected a new math program for grades K-5, which is mapped to state standards- Houghton Mifflin's Math Expressions. The Mohawk and Hawlemont districts also researched and selected a new math program for grade 6, similarly mapped to state standards- MacDougal-Littel Math I. This new 6th grade math program will align with the current middle school math program and help facilitate more consistent student transition from elementary to middle school.

Community Building

In the preparation of the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe Bullying Prevention and Intervention Plans, the three districts gathered survey data from 645 students, 447 parents and 239 staff members. This community input was a key contributor to the adopted antibullying plans. The school districts developed a parent anti-bullying brochure intended to help parents support their children in the event of a bullying concern. The districts also developed an anonymous anti-bullying report tool to facilitate communications between the school districts and the wider community in the event of bullying concerns. Additionally, in order to help build community relations, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts established annual schedules for providing regular district improvement planning progress reports in public meetings.

The Year Ahead

While it appears that the Commonwealth's funding of public education will likely decrease substantially in the 2011-2012 school year, the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts are committed to providing the best education possible for the students. Whatever the funding level turns out to be, student learning will continue to be the guiding beacon of the Mohawk-Hawlemont-Rowe school districts in 2011.

Principal's Report - Mohawk Trail Regional High School

This year saw some visible changes at Mohawk with the appointment of a new principal, Lynn R. Dole, and the installation of a dramatic work of art in the front foyer. Mohawk became the nation's first high school to feature an original design by artist Sol LeWitt, whose Wall Drawing #905 now graces a wall in the school's entrance. The project developed after Mohawk student Lindsay Smith was inspired to contact the LeWitt estate after seeing the artist's work during a school field trip to Mass MoCA in North Adams. Teacher Scott Whitney coordinated the effort to bring the artist's work to Mohawk and the wall drawing was made possible through the generosity of many in the community, including gifts from the Class of 2010 and the Class of 2011.

At the midpoint of the 2010-2011 school year enrollment in grades 7-12 is 579 students. The seventh grade has 117 students and the eighth grade has 106. There are 95 students in the ninth grade, 94 in the tenth grade, 92 students in the junior class, and 75 students in the senior class.

Student athletes continue to distinguish themselves on the playing fields and in the classroom. This year marked significant milestones in the accomplishments of long-standing Mohawk coaches. Coach Lynn Hoeppner achieved her 100th career win with the field hockey team this fall. Coach Joe Chadwick celebrated his 1000th career victory, coaching athletes in cross-country, winter track, and track and field. The dedicated commitment of the adults who support our student athletes, including parents, coaches, and the generous support of the Mohawk Athletic Association, has made it possible for Mohawk athletics to flourish.

Mohawk students are engaged in the community, making connections between what they learn in the classroom and their role as citizens locally and globally. To cite a few examples: middle school students volunteered with the Shelburne Falls Senior Center's Day of Service in the fall and students in the TV Studio course have been collaborating with the Falls Cable Corporation on a variety of projects, including hosting a televised debate among the candidates for the seat in the Massachusetts House of Representatives, Second Berkshire District. Students in Roxanne Trombly's Peer Leadership course have organized workshops for middle school students focused on respect and preventing bullying behaviors and have done outreach in some of the elementary schools. This year marked the second time Mohawk students have participated in an exchange with a sister school in the Netherlands.

There are increasing opportunities for students to be involved with creative expression. Music director DoraThea Kastanas organized an all-district musical in the fall, involving elementary and high school students in all aspects of the production, and we are preparing for the spring all-school musical. The Mohawk Music Association provides valuable support for music programming. The Mohawk Arts and Education Council (MAEC) recently staged a production of Edward Albee's "The Zoo Story" and will be performing Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman" in the spring. The Mohawk Writers Society organizes workshops for students in the middle school and the high school, bringing local authors in to share their work and guide students in writing exercises.

MTRSD - Library/Media Services

In 2010, 36,771 books and other materials were checked out from the libraries of the Mohawk Trail Regional School System. This is a 10% increase from 2005. This increase in library circulation happened as enrollment in our school system dropped by more than 10%.

In December, 2010 a \$3,000 anonymous donation was made to Hawlemont Regional School, making it possible for Hawlemont to acquire the Destiny Online Catalog. Destiny is a very user-friendly and engaging library online catalog. Once Hawlemont's Destiny is up and running, all seven school libraries in the Mohawk School System will be using this powerful technology.

Four of our Library Managers have received special recognition from the Massachusetts Library Association (MLA) for their excellent work. In 2010 Toni Wilcox, Library Manager at BSE, received the Paralibrarian Recognition Award from the MLA. In the last five years the Library Managers have received on average about 20 hours of training per year. That training has paid great dividends in the wonderful work our Library Managers do. Examples from each school follow.

Buckland Shelburne Elementary – In the fall almost 200 books received from the Western Massachusetts Regional Library System collection were cataloged and added to the BSE collection. These added books filled many holes in BSE's curriculum/content areas. A very successful Scholastic Book Fair was held in October resulting in \$1400 worth of new books from Scholastic Publishing. Pre-K through 3rd grade classes received a story time period once a week. Students in grades 3-6 received instruction in library skills and selected books once a week. In August the Children's Literature Festival provided a great reading experience for all the students who attended.

Colrain Central Elementary – Students explored and made a list of REASONS TO READ! They came up with 27 reasons including: To learn about other places and people, to know where to go (such as road signs), to be entertained and to learn how to make something (directions or a recipe.) Two very successful book fairs were held in March and November. Read Across America was celebrated with guest readers and skits of some of our favorite Dr. Seuss stories. The library at Colrain Central continues to be a great meeting place for our staff, senior citizens, and other groups from town.

Hawlemont Elementary – Students from preschool to 6th grade took walking field trips in the fall and the spring to the Tyler Memorial Library. These trips help foster a community of readers and they teach students how to use the town library. The Hawlemont Library was fortunate to receive a Mary Lyon Mini Grant which funded a Preschool Reading P.J. Party. The party was hosted by the Library and the preschoolers, with parents and 4th grade reading buddies also attending. Upper grade library classes participated in an online class through the Smithsonian called Prehistoric Climate Change. Students and the librarian were able to be part of a global classroom, asking questions to experts in the field of climate change.

Heath Elementary – Students learned the Dewey Decimal System through a series of training games taken from a book entitled *Funbrarian*. The games involve matching book titles with Dewey numbers. The sixth graders have become proficient in the Dewey Decimal System.

Mohawk Trail Regional School 7-12 – The 20 students in the Fantasy Book Club continued to read books in the *Blue Bloods* series by Melissa de la Cruz and *Marked*: A *House of Night Novel* by P.C. and Kristin Cast. During Reading Celebration Day on April 12th students created posters and teachers gave short book talks about books they enjoyed. From April 12th through April 15th, there was a very successful Scholastic Book Fair. The \$537 profit from the book fair was donated to the Gertrude Streeter Fund. This fund was set up by the relatives of former Colrain teacher, Gertrude Streeter, to provide funds for library books for middle school students. In September a \$10,000 grant was received from the Verizon Foundation. New laptop computers, library books and tech training for staff were obtained. Also, this grant made possible a visit from prominent local author Jane Yolen.

Rowe Elementary — This fall a project was done on a book called *The Colors of India*. Students worked in groups on projects related to India. In the spring students did a "Moons Calendar" where they named each of the months based on what was happening seasonally and/or in the school calendar. This was based on a Native American book called *Thirteen Moons on Turtle's Back*. The students made one large calendar and smaller versions for each child to take home. They wrote haikus and prose about each month. In the fall the Primary class did a transportation unit, reading books during library time and singing songs about transportation.

Sanderson Academy Elementary – The Scholastic Book Fair in November resulted in \$751 in new books for the library. Students have been learning the Dewey Decimal System through a series of training games taken from a book entitled *Funbrarian*. The games involve matching book titles with Dewey numbers. The sixth graders have become so proficient in the Dewey Decimal System that they have taken over book shelving responsibilities.

Eligibility for Special Education services is determined by a three step process. Initially, the student has to have a specific, identified disability. The student then needs to fail to make effective progress in appropriate curriculum after general education interventions have been delivered. Lastly, the student must demonstrate the need for specialized instruction or related services to access the curriculum. The Mohawk Trail Regional School System has continued to provide education programs of specialized and individualized instruction and classroom support for qualifying students in all grades. Related services, including speech and language therapy, occupational and physical therapy, assistive technology, and counseling, are also provided in each of the three districts.

Student Body Profile:

The percentage of special education students in the Districts has declined steadily over the last few years. The percentage of enrollment on Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) in the Mohawk District has dropped from 21% in 2007 to 19% in the current year. In Hawlemont Regional the percentage has moved from a high in 2008 of 32% to 26%; and, in Rowe, from 21% to 14%. The State average of students on IEPs is 17% of the enrollment. A combination of factors has influenced the number of students who participate in these specialized service programs.

Collaboration:

Professional development of special and general education staff has lead to better understanding of the eligibility process and continues to support educators in their efforts to provide relevant services to all students. General education interventions have reduced the number of students referred for special education evaluation. The Districts' support of a tiered intervention system allows the truly disabled child to be included in the mainstream setting as fully as possible while providing all students the extra attention they may need from time to time with learning new skills and concepts. This system of instruction relies on frequent skill assessment that can inform instructional choices made by teachers and lead to quick responses when a student is falling behind.

Looking Ahead:

As the Districts move forward in designing and delivering the best educational opportunity to students with a variety of needs, the path remains defined by the state standards, twenty-first century living skills, and assistive technology. Our understanding of Special Education laws and regulations, as well individual student needs, continues to make the Mohawk Trail Regional School System a good place for students to achieve their best.

For twenty years the Mary Lyon Foundation has been providing innovative support for local education to schools and communities in West County. We are grateful for the incredible generosity which makes it possible for us to not only sustain a myriad of programs and services, but expand and strengthen them. We especially appreciate the continuing financial support from the Cleveland Dodge Foundation, the Myrtle Atkinson Foundation, local cultural councils, the Xeric Foundation and the generous payroll deductions for the Student Assistance Fund from the staff in all our schools. Philanthropy is alive and well in West County as evidenced by such unsolicited, generous donations as \$3,000 for the Hawlemont School Library to purchase the online Destiny cataloging and circulation program and \$1,000 for the Heath Elementary School to be used for the Drama Club's all school production of Fiddler on the Roof.

The 5th annual community spelling bee in November raised over \$7,000 for the Mini-Grant program which provides competitive grants for school district staff for educational, replicable projects. The Queen Bee sponsor of the event was the Franklin First Credit Union. It is a tribute to community spirit that teams from private and public educational, religious, political and civic organizations come together for this amazing fundraiser.

The annual spring Lyonnaise held at the Shelburne-Buckland Community Center featured a farewell tribute to beloved art teacher Polly Anderson for her 35 years of service to the school district. An extensive exhibit of work created by her former students was on display. Dr. Sarah Kemble received the first annual Pat Kerrins Award; Judge William Mazanec was the Outstanding Mohawk Graduate; Karen Blom and Bruce Lessels received the Jim Boulger Spirit of Adventure Award sponsored by The Textile Company and Elmer's Store was the business award recipient.

In addition to distributing backpacks filled with school supplies to local elementary school children again this year, the Mary Lyon Foundation sent school supplies to needy children in Baja. A generous donation of hundreds of books from a publishing company in Scotia, New York is providing books for students and adults in the 9 town community. These are in the process of being distributed through libraries and classrooms.

During the summer our annual tennis lessons, Children's Literature Festival and Discovery Days, respectively coordinated by Judy McWilliams, Toni Wilcox and a college intern, provided educational fun for local children grades K-6. Through the Harper Gerry Student Assistance Fund we purchased warm clothing, eyeglasses, food and other basic necessities for many families. One of our major endeavors this year was the 20th annual 2 day special education conference held at Deerfield Academy in March for over 500 western Massachusetts educators. Carl H. Nilman Scholarship Fund

The fund was established under the provisions of the will of Carl H. Nilman for the purpose of providing scholarships. Recipients shall reside in the school district and be graduates of the Mohawk Trail Regional High School who desire and are deemed worthy of post high school education or training and who are in need of financial assistance.

This year the Awards subcommittee read 96 applications, 35 were from seniors and 61 from previous graduates of Mohawk. \$34,600 is to be awarded using 30% for seniors and 70% for graduates. The committee feels that seniors have multiple scholarship opportunities from other sources, while graduates have far fewer resources. 26 scholarships totaling \$10,100 were awarded to seniors (80% of applicants). 45 scholarships totaling \$24,500 were given to graduates (74% of applicants). The awards committee is Sheila Graves, Marion Scott, Marge Porrovecchio, Eric Sumner, and Michelle Hillman.

From 1991-2010 a total of \$723,375 has been awarded in scholarships. Mohawk seniors have received \$223,525 and \$499,850 has been awarded to Mohawk graduates.

Co-chairs of the committee are Marge Porrovecchio and Robin Hartnett.

The Finance Committee is composed of David Engle, Marion Taylor and Jim Pilgrim. Judy Hoyt is continuing her role as our financial advisor.

Other members of the committee are: David Purington, Ellen Purinton and Rebecca Bradley.

We welcome Marion Taylor, member at large, to our committee. She will join the Finance Committee, filling the vacancy left by Nancy Dole who chose to leave the committee. We are grateful for Nancy's years of service.

The Mohawk community owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Nilman for his foresight in supporting higher education for the students of Mohawk Trail Regional High School. The committee members are honored to bring the wishes of his will to fruition.

We submit this annual report for 2010 on behalf of the Franklin County Technical School District and its administration, faculty, staff and students.

Total enrollment as of October 1, 2010 was 504 students with town breakouts as follows:

Franklin County Technical School awarded 114 diplomas to our seniors in June of 2010. Massachusetts students are required to pass the MCAS in order to receive a high school diploma and once again our students were very successful in meeting this high academic standard. The graduates also earned their vocational certificate along with their diploma. 46% of our graduates planned to go on to either a two or four year college, 32% joined the area work force, 4% planned to join the military, 6% went on to a post secondary trade/technical school, and 14% were unsure as to which of the above options they would pursue. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Class of 2010.

All schools in the Commonwealth are required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) to meet or exceed specific student performance standards in English/language arts, mathematics and science. The Franklin County Technical School is proud to note that, both in the aggregate and for all subgroups, it met these adequate yearly progress determinations for the 2009–2010 school year.

During 2009-2010, the students from various vocational programs performed a variety of service projects benefiting many of our member towns and the city of Greenfield. We plan to continue supplying our constituent towns with these services as they offer both the ideal learning laboratory for our students as well as an opportunity to contribute back to the communities that have supported us so well over the years. A small sample of recent projects include a timber framed pavilion for the town of Northfield Council on Aging, a water tank project for the town of Montague, a sign project for the town of Bernardston, a house building project in conjunction with Habitat for Humanity and the installation of numerous interactive whiteboards and projectors for Whately Elementary School. Students from many shop areas also continue to routinely assist our building maintenance department, supplying services that would otherwise be contracted to outside agencies.

Articulation agreements are contracts that guarantee college credit for work performed at the high school level as long as very

specific requirements are met. In some circumstances, seniors at F.C.T.S. are able to earn more than half a semester of college credit prior to graduation. F.C.T.S. currently has articulation agreements in place with Greenfield Community College, Mt. Wachusett Community College, Springfield Technical Community College, Vermont Technical College and other post secondary institutions who have agreed to award college credit for work completed in our business department, CAD/CAM department, Information Technology program and Business Technology program. We are working to develop further agreements that will benefit our students in other program areas as we begin to look at discussing agreements with the labor unions that would translate into shorter probationary periods and higher starting pay for our graduates. We continue to strive to provide our graduates with multiple options for career paths along with the technical skills that allow them to "earn as they learn" at a pay rate that is well above entry level rates.

We were fortunate to have the opportunity to work closely with Greenfield Community College as they offered a pioneering Weatherization Installer Course. Franklin County Technical School provided the space necessary for the laboratory and classroom instruction. The curriculum was developed by both Springfield Technical Community College and the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center and is the first of its kind in the nation. Designed to prepare students for a career as a residential weatherization installer capable of cost effectively air sealing and insulating single family and small multi-family dwellings using current best practices, we had a carpentry instructor and a student from our plumbing and heating program complete the course. Select portions of the curriculum will be integrated into our existing programs using the state-of-the-art training mock-ups located on our property. F.C.T.S will continue to work to expand our collaboration with GCC in the area of renewable energy and sustainable energy for the mutual benefit of both institutions.

F.C.T.S. introduced a Robotics elective in the 2010-2011 school year. Students in this program design, build and learn to program their own robots. As they gain new skills, they are presented with increasingly more difficult challenges. Students work in teams to find solutions to specific situations and eventually have the opportunity to compete against robotics teams from other schools. The study of robotics, by its very nature, captures all four legs of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) very well while a competitive environment increases motivation and desire to succeed, thus creating classroom environments where both knowledge and skill development can flourish without having to compromise one for the other.

F.C.T.S. is preparing to introduce a new program, PROJECT LEAD THE WAY (PLTW), scheduled to be ready for September 2011. PLTW is a national non-profit organization that partners with high schools to implement a curriculum that emphasizes hands-on experiences in STEM. The overall goal is to encourage a more diverse group of students to consider careers as scientists, technology experts, engineers, healthcare providers and researchers in an effort to enable the United States to remain competitive in the global economy. PLTW teachers must pass

a pre-core assessment and receive intensive two week training before they can teach under this program. Students who are selected to participate will experience five rigorous courses over their four years at F.C.T.S., designed to prepare them for entry into the fields of engineering, science or other related areas. Students will develop problem-solving skills and apply their knowledge of research and design as they create solutions to various challenges. Courses such as Introduction to Engineering Design, Digital Electronics, Principles of Engineering, and Computer Integrated Manufacturing prepare students for post secondary success in a wide variety of STEM based careers. We are very excited about the opportunities that PLTW and our new Robotics electives will provide for our students.

In closing, we will continue to work diligently to ensure that our graduates are an integral part of the economic development for the region and we thank each and every citizen of Franklin County for your continued support.



QUESTION 2 – LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 4, 2010?

SUMMARY: This proposed law would repeal an existing state law that allows a qualified organization wishing to build government subsidized housing that includes low or moderate income units to apply for a single comprehensive permit from a city or town's zoning board of appeals, instead of separate permits from each local agency or official having jurisdiction over any aspect of the proposed housing. The repeal would take effect on January 1, 2011, but would not stop or otherwise affect any proposed housing that had already received both a comprehensive permit and a building permit for at least one under.

Under the existing law, the ZBA holds a public hearing on the application and considers the recommendations of local agencies and officials. The ZBA may grant a comprehensive permit that may include condition or requirements concerning the height, site plan, size, shape or building materials of the housing. Persons aggrieved by the ZBA's decision to grant a permit may appeal it to a court. If the ZBA denies the permit or grants it with conditions or requirements that make the housing uneconomic to build or to operate, the applicant may appeal to the state Housing Appeals Committee.

After a hearing, if the HAC rules that the ZBA's denial or comprehensive permit was unreasonable and not consistent with local needs, the HAC orders the ZBA to issue the permit. If the HAC rules that the ZBA's decision issuing comprehensive permit with conditions or requirements made the housing uneconomic to build or operate and was not consistent with local needs, the HAC orders the ZBA to modify or remove ay such condition or requirement so as to make the proposal no longer uneconomic. The HAC cannot order the ZBA to issue any permit that would allow the housing to fall below minimum safety standards or site plan requirements. If the HAC rules that the ZBA's action was consistent with local needs, the HAC must uphold it even if it made the housing uneconomic. The HAC's decision is subject to review in the courts.

A condition or requirement makes housing "uneconomic" if it would prevent a public agency or non profit organization from building if operating the housing except at a financial loss, or it would prevent a limited dividend organization from building or operating the housing without a reasonable return on its investment.

A ZBA's decision is "consistent with local needs" if it applies requirement that are reasonable in view of the regional need for

Requirement are considered "consistent with local need" if more than 10% of the city or town's housing units are low or moderate income units or if such units are on sites making up at leas 1.5% of the total private land zoned for residential, commercial, or industrial use in the city or town. Requirements are also considered "consistent with local needs" if the application would result, in any one calendar year, in the beginning construction of low or moderate housing on sites make up more than 0.3% of the total private land zoned for residential, commercial, or industrial use in the city or town, or on ten acres, whichever is larger.

The proposed law states that if any parts are declared invalid, the other parts would stay in effect.

Question 3 – LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was take by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 4, 2010?

SUMMARY: This proposed law would reduce the state sales and use tax rates (which were 6.25% as of September 2009) to 3% as of January 1, 2011. It would make the same reduction in the rate used to determine the amount to be deposited with the state Commissioner of Revenue by non resident building contractors as security for the payment of sales and use tax on tangible personal property used in carrying out their contracts.

The proposed law provided that if the 3% rates would not produce enough revenues to satisfy any lawful pledge of sales and use tax revenue in connection with any bond, note or other contractual obligation, then the rates would instead be reduced to the lowest level allowed by law.

The proposed law would not affect the collection of moneys due to the Commonwealth for sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property or services occurring before January 1, 2011.

The proposed law states that if any of its parts were declared invalid, the other parts would stay in effect.

Before any such vote, the member shall certify in writing that he has examined all evidence received at the missed session, which evidence shall include an audio or video recording of the missed session or a transcript thereof. The written certification shall be part of the record of the hearing. Nothing in this section shall change, replace, negate or otherwise supersede applicable quorum requirements.
- (b) By ordinance or by-law, a city or town may adopt minimum additional requirements for attendance at scheduled board, committee, and commission hearings under this section.

ARTICLE VIII - ENFORCEMENT

Section 2: Noncriminal Disposition

- A. Rowe Bylaw Article VII, Section 3, pertaining to dog nuisances, may be enforced in the method provided in MGL c.40, §21D.
- B. For purposes of this Bylaw, the "enforcing person" shall mean any police officer of the Town of Rowe, the Dog Officer, his or her designees, and such other officials as the Board of Selectmen may from time to time designate. If more than one official has jurisdiction in a given case, any such official may be an enforcing person with respect thereto.
- C. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this article, when enforced pursuant to the noncriminal disposition procedures of MGL c.40, \$21D, the following shall be the fines applicable to the listed offenses, unless otherwise specifically provided by by-law, rule or regulation:

First Violation	\$100.00
Second Violation	\$200.00
Third Violation	\$300.00

D. Each day a violation exists shall constitute a separate violation.

No person holding any other elective town office and no employee of the Town earning more than \$2,500 per year shall be eligible to serve on said committee.

The remainder of Section 11 is to remain intact.

[Note: The <u>original wording</u> was: "No person holding any other town office and no employee of the Town shall be eligible to serve on said committee."]

ARTICLE 28: The motion was made and seconded to adopt a new Right-to-Farm By-Law as follows:

ARTICLE III - GENERAL GOVERNMENT Section 20: ROWE RIGHT TO FARM BY-LAW

A: Legislative Purpose and Intent

The purpose and intent of this By-Law is to state with emphasis the Right to Farm accorded to all citizens of the Commonwealth under Article 97, of the Constitution, and all state statutes and regulations thereunder including but not limited to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A,

Section 3, Paragraph 1; Chapter 90, Section 9, Chapter 111, Section 125A and Chapter 128, Section 1A. We the citizens of Rowe restate and republish these rights pursuant to the Town's authority conferred by Article 89 of the Articles of Amendment of the Massachusetts Constitution, ("Home Rule Amendment").

This General By-Law encourages the pursuit of agriculture, promotes agriculture-based economic opportunities, and protects farmlands within the Town of Rowe by allowing agricultural uses and related activities to function with minimal conflict with abutters and Town agencies. This By-Law shall apply to all jurisdictional areas within the Town.

B: Definitions

The word "farm" shall include any parcel or contiguous parcels of land, or water bodies used for the primary purpose of agriculture, or related activities thereto.

The words "farming" or "agriculture" or their derivatives shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- farming in all its branches and the cultivation and tillage of the soil;
- dairying;
- production, cultivation, growing, and harvesting of any agricultural, aquacultural, floricultural, viticultural, or horticultural commodities;
- growing and harvesting of forest products upon forest land, and any other forestry or lumbering operations;
- keeping of horses as a commercial enterprise; and
- keeping and raising of domestic livestock, including horses, poultry, swine, goats, sheep, cattle, ratites (such as emus, ostriches and rheas) and camelids (such as llamas and camels), bees, fur-bearing animals, and other domesticated animals for food and other agricultural purposes.

"Farming" shall encompass activities including, but not limited to, the following:

- operation and transportation of slow-moving farm equipment over roads within the Town;
- control of pests, including, but not limited to, insects, weeds, predators and disease organism of plants and animals;
- application of manure, fertilizers and pesticides;
- conducting agriculture-related educational and farmbased recreational activities, including agri-tourism, provided that the activities are related to marketing the agricultural output or services of the farm;
- processing and packaging of the agricultural output of the farm and the operation of a farmer's market or farm stand including signage thereto;
- maintenance, repair, or storage of seasonal equipment, or apparatus owned or leased by the farm owner or manager used expressly for the purpose of propagation, processing, management, or sale of the agricultural products; and
- on-farm relocation of earth and the clearing of ground for farming operations.

C: Right To Farm Declaration

The Right to Farm is hereby recognized to exist within the Town of Rowe. The above-described agricultural activities

may occur on holidays, weekdays, and weekends, by night or day and shall include the attendant incidental noise, odors, dust, and fumes associated with normally accepted agricultural practices. It is hereby determined that whatever impact may be caused to others through the normal practice of agriculture is more than offset by the benefits of farming to the neighborhood, community, and society in general. The benefits and protections of this By-Law are intended to apply exclusively to those agricultural and farming operations and activities conducted in accordance with generally accepted agricultural practices. Moreover, nothing in this Right To Farm By-Law shall be deemed as acquiring any interest in land, or as imposing any land use regulation, which is properly the subject of state statute, regulation, or local zoning law.

D: Disclosure Notification

Within 30 days after this By-Law becomes effective, the Board of Selectmen shall prominently post in the Town Hall and make available for distribution the following disclosure:

"It is the policy of this community to conserve, protect and encourage the maintenance and improvement of agricultural land for the production of food, and other agricultural products, and also for its natural and ecological value. This disclosure notification is to inform buyers or occupants that the property they are about to acquire or occupy lies within a town where farming activities occur. Such farming activities may include, but are not limited to, activities that cause noise, dust and odors."

E: Resolution of Disputes

Any person who seeks to complain about the operation of a farm may, notwithstanding pursuing any other available remedy, file a grievance with the Board of Selectmen, the Zoning Enforcement Officer, or the Board of Health, depending upon the nature of the grievance. The filing of the grievance does not suspend the time within which to pursue any other available remedies that the aggrieved may have. The Zoning Enforcement Officer or Board of Selectmen shall forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent, which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, involving all concerned parties, and report its recommendations to the referring Town authority within an agreed upon time frame. The Board of Health, except in cases of imminent danger or public health risk, shall forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent, which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, and report its recommendations to the Board of Health within an agreed upon time frame.

F: Severability Clause

If any part of this By-Law is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this By-law. The Town of Rowe hereby declares the provisions of this By-Law to be severable.

Passed by Show of Hands Unanimous Affirmative Vote

ARTICLE 29: The motion was made and seconded to enter into immediate discussions with other Western Massachusetts municipalities with the intent of entering into an inter-municipal agreement, by and through the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to Chapter 40, Section 4A of the Massachusetts General Laws, for the purpose of establishing a universal, open access, financially self-sustaining communication system for the provision of broadband service, including high-speed Internet access, telephone and cable television to the residents, businesses and institutions of these municipalities.

- 1. Definitions

International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) 2009 - The International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) is a building code created by the International Code Council. It is a model code adopted by many state and municipal governments in the United States for the establishment of minimum design and construction requirements for energy efficiency. Commencing July 1, 2010, the baseline energy conservation requirements of the MA State Building Code will default to IECC 2009 and MA amendments.

Stretch Energy Code - Codified by the Board of Building Regulations and Standards as 780 CMR Appendix 120 AA, the Stretch Energy Code is the International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) 2009 with amendments contained herein.

2. Purpose

The purpose of 780 CMR 120.AA is to provide a more

energy efficient alternative to the base energy code applicable to the relevant sections of the building code for both new construction and existing buildings.

3. Applicability

This code applies to residential and commercial buildings. Buildings not included in this scope shall comply with 780 CMR 13, 34, 61, or 93, as applicable.

4. Authority

A municipality seeking to ensure that construction within its boundaries is designed and built above the energy efficiency requirements of 780 CMR may mandate adherence to this appendix.

780 CMR 120 AA may be adopted or rescinded by any municipality in the commonwealth in the manner prescribed by law.

Stretch Code

The Stretch Code, as codified by the Board of Building Regulations and Standards as 780 CMR Appendix 120 AA, including any amendments or modifications, is herein incorporated by reference into the Town of Rowe General Bylaws, Article III, General Government.

The Stretch Code is enforceable by the inspector of buildings or building commissioner.

Narrative

Rowe is a small hilltown in northwestern Massachusetts, with a population of 393. The town is one of scenic beauty, with wooded mountains, clear brooks, and the Deerfield River on its border. Rowe is close to ski areas and enjoys great hiking, fishing, hunting and canoeing. The town owns Pelham Lake Park—mostly a wilderness area—which encompasses the town's tallest mountain, Adams Mountain, Todd Mountain and Pelham Lake in a 1300+ acre park for use by town residents.

Rowe has its own elementary school and tuitions grades 7-12 to either Mohawk Trail Regional Middle/High School or Franklin County Technical School.

The Rowe Historical Society maintains an excellent small historical museum—The Kemp-McCarthy Museum—containing antiques, artifacts and numerous photographs documenting the history of the town, including the construction of the Hoosac Tunnel. The close-knit community enjoys a solid tax base provided by several hydro-electric plants located on the Deerfield River.

Board of Assessors

Membership of the Board remained the same throughout this year as **Heidi Cousineau** was re-elected to a three-year term at the annual town elections in May 2010. Heidi joined fellow Board member **Carrie Silva** in nominating and electing **Rick Williams** to serve again as Chair.

The Board would like to thank **Sandy Daviau**, Assessors' Clerk, for her handling of the day-to-day tasks in the Assessors Office. Sandy has a good deal of contact with the public and always manages to be gracious and helpful to everyone.

The Assessors Office continues to utilize **Patriot Properties'** Assess Pro assessing software and **Cartographic Associates'** Query Manager mapping software. **Mayflower Valuations** continues to provide annual residential appraisal consulting services.

The following items were addressed at the routine monthly meetings, as needed: building permits received from the building inspector were reviewed and flagged for the annual field verification...survey plans and deeds recording property transfers received from the Franklin County Registry of Deeds were reviewed and compared to tax maps for verification of data and adjustments were made to affected property cards...tax map changes were documented and forwarded to the mapping service for update... Form of List (personal property declaration) returns received from taxpayers were reviewed and filed...and real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle excise tax bill warrants and commitments and any applicable abatement applications were reviewed and approved, as required.

Based on the FY11 interim year update sales analysis for Rowe, residential home values increased 4% while land values remained unchanged. The net effect was that the total town valuation increased by 1% to \$286,231,262 for FY11. The FY11 tax rates of \$5.33 for Residential and \$11.56 for Commercial/Industrial/Personal Property (CIP) were set in mid-November of

2010 at the Classification hearing with the Board of Selectmen. This contrasts to the previous fiscal year tax rates of \$5.22 for Residential and \$11.29 for CIP.

According to Mass Department of Revenue (DOR) records for FY11, Rowe had the 8th lowest residential tax rate but enjoyed the lowest average single family tax bill in the state (\$1108).

Reminder...the so-called Proposition 2½ Levy Limit restricts the amount of money that Rowe can raise each year from taxation. By law this limit only increases by 21/2% each year (approx. \$68,500 for FY11). Despite our enviable low tax rate and low tax bills, the Town has been bumping up against its Prop 21/2 Levy Limit for a number of years and has had to make cuts, defer projects, or utilize other "available funds" from Free Cash and the Stabilization Fund to balance the regular operating budget and to pay for special projects. A significant action was taken at the FY08 Annual Town Meeting in May 2007 where a \$150,000 Proposition 21/2 Override was approved for the creation of a Municipal Capital Stabilization Fund. This decision authorized a continuing annual increase in the Levy Limit for the express purpose of setting aside money into "savings" on an annual basis for municipal capital improvement projects. This action reestablished and formalized a practice the town historically used to do on an informal basis before being artificially constrained by the Prop 21/2 Levy Limit.

Finance Committee

The Great Recession continues to cause severe financial hardship for individuals, businesses and all levels of government. Incomes are still down and budgets are still tight. Here in Rowe, we are very fortunate in that we are able to continue to employ many of our residents in the highest paying jobs in West County (excepting the city of Greenfield) and continue giving them excellent insurance at a low cost to them. Our tax rates continue to remain lower than other towns; however they have been increasing at a time when many of our taxpayers are suffering loss of income, savings, pensions and employment. The Finance Committee has kept this in mind and worked to keep the burden to a minimum, and to defer the need for a Proposition 2.5 override until absolutely needed to keep the town programs, services and buildings as they are.

The Finance Committee continues to be handicapped by a shortage of members. For most of the year we were down to only three members out of five seats, the minimum needed for a quorum. We had started with four but, sadly, lost Cara Morano by the needs of her job requiring her to be out of town. David, Anne and I welcomed Myra Carlow to the Finance Committee after the May election. Myra has previously served on the Finance Committee and as a member of the Select Board; she was particularly instrumental in establishing the Capital Improvement Stabilization Fund for the maintenance of the town buildings and replacement of large items; i.e., trucks and equipment.

We began the initial stages of the FY2012 budget process earlier than usual in 2010, recognizing that we needed time to study the quickly deteriorating economic situation and the effects on the fiscal future of Rowe. Recognizing the severity of the financial climate, we have been committed to a goal of keeping the Town budget at a 2.5% increase while maintaining the standard COLA rate set by the Social Security Administration (SSA), as has been our practice for the past few years. Items in the budget that increase more than 2.5% push us toward needing a proposition 2½ override. We sympathize with the employees who have traditionally been able to expect steady increases in their pay, but raising taxes in order to give wage increases during this time when many taxpayers have lost financial security is insensitive to the needs of the many.

We are still committed to increasing the Stabilization fund. We believe the Town needs to build up more stabilization money, in the event that the tax burden shifts from the utilities to residents, perhaps catastrophically at some point in the future.

Wages and benefits, especially health and dental insurance, continue to be the two biggest and fastest growing portions of the budget. It is difficult to ask employees to accept small, or no raises, and/or an increase in the share they pay for their own health insurance. Though our current compensation is the best in the county, employees miss the compensatory raises that have traditionally been awarded each year. Employees have excellent affordable health insurance: 85% of their health and dental insurance, which is better than our neighboring towns can afford. It is unfortunate that the insurance industry has raised their rates so high that many people have no insurance at all, and towns, as well as businesses, have been forced to reduce the percentage that can be absorbed. The rapid increases in the cost of insurance could necessitate a Proposition 2½ override in the future. Proposition 21/2 overrides are not traditionally used to cover wages and benefits; they are usually either temporary overrides that are project specific, or for permanent overrides to protect the infrastructure of a municipality. This Finance Committee has continued to juggle the style of living to which Rowe residents have become accustomed with the rising costs of solid goods and insurance with a sense of Fiscal Responsibility for all taxpayers, as well as for the Town of Rowe.

Regional Reports

Mohawk Area Public Health Coalition - MAPHCO

The Mohawk Area Public Health Coalition (MAPHCO) represents 64,671 people across Franklin and Hampshire Counties. Its work is funded primarily by grant funds distributed through the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, supplemented by training and exercise funds from the Department of Homeland Security. A steering committee of local board of health representatives provides oversight for these grant-funded activities working to enhance communities' collective capacity to share resources and respond to public health threats and emergencies, including bio-terrorism and outbreaks of infectious diseases. The Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG) is MAPHCO's fiduciary agent.

MAPHCO's catchment area is divided into sub-regional emergency dispensing sites. The Hawlemont Emergency Dispensing Site (EDS) Planning Group consists of board of health representatives and other volunteers from the towns of Charlemont, Hawley, Rowe, Monroe, and Heath, representing four percent of the region's population. The EDS held two vaccination clinics during the H1N1 pandemic of 2009-2010, using these clinics as an opportunity to exercise their emergency dispensing site plan. With evaluation and feedback from these two clinics, the EDS team revised the plan to make them better prepared in the future.

MAPHCO staff has been working with other western Massachusetts coalitions on researching and incorporating best practices in emergency planning with regard to Individuals Requiring Additional Assistance (e.g., those with disabilities, mental health issues, and language barriers). They have also been actively recruiting and training new members of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and the Medical Reserve Corps (MRC).

In the coming year MAPHCO plans to continue its progress of working with towns to get them farther along the path of preparedness. This will include a series of exercises testing the preparedness of the emergency dispensing sites and their volunteers, review and revision of written emergency plans with assistance from a professional technical writer, and advocating for the needs of local boards of health.




