BOARD OF SELECTMEN 2015

The Board of Selectmen (BOS) signed an agreement with the North Adams Ambulance Service (NAAS) this year. Although we are very grateful to the Charlemont Ambulance Service and all the volunteers for their many years of dedicated, selfless service to Rowe, the logistics meant that wait times for responses to emergencies here in Rowe were extraordinarily long.

After studying the dispatch logs, it became apparent that strokes, cardiac events, trauma, and asthmatic cases were waiting more often than not for up to and over 50 minutes for an ambulance. Then the trip to the hospital which took at least another 45 minutes where treatment could be started. The NAAS is able to get to Rowe in 25 minutes.

The NAAS is staffed 24/7 with paramedics who are able to start IV's, 12-lead EKGs, and being in contact with the ER doctors can begin certain treatments before the journey to the hospital which of course saves valuable time.

The BOS has applied for grants from the Franklin County Regional Housing and Redevelopment Authority. We are hoping to receive funds for Rowe residents which will enable home repair and rehabilitation as well as home heating assistance.

The BOS is working closely with the Finance Committee on all financial matters. Both boards are committed to fiscal responsibility and will not dip into the Town's savings accounts to fund operating expenses. The day to day town operations will be financed from taxation, in keeping with advisement from the Massachusetts Department of Revenue as being sound fiscal management. The BOS continues to put money from Free Cash into the Stabilization Fund.

The careful husbandry of our resources has meant an increase in Free Cash for the past two years, which in turn means increased savings to be used for capital projects. Big ticket items on the immediate horizon include painting the Town Hall Complex buildings and repair of the slate roof on the Town Hall.

The Gazebo has been fully repaired. It had deteriorated to such an extent that it was rotted throughout and had become unsafe. It will be painted in the Spring of 2016.

The sign over the main entrance to the Town Hall has been repainted. The overgrown trees at the same entrance have been taken down to allow light and air to circulate. Lack of that circulation had caused rotting of the window frames and ledges as well as clapboards on the front of the building.

The ceiling tiles in the exercise room on the second floor of Town Hall have been replaced. The tiles had deteriorated due to age and were falling and flaking down. The Town Hall was power-washed, and all the windows cleaned inside and out.

The sidewalk in front of Town Hall has been repaired; that also had seen great deterioration and was badly chipped and gouged. An extra walkway was put in leading from the Town Hall to the mail boxes so that people will not slip on the muddy ground.

The Town of Rowe is fully behind the Last Mile, the effort to bring high speed internet service to Western Ma. The vote for a Debt Exclusion for the purpose of funding the Town's share of this project passed unanimously at the Annual Town Meeting, and passed easily at the ballot at the Annual Town Election.

It was discovered that none of the Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) worked because the batteries were all dead. This has been rectified and the AEDs are on a maintenance schedule to ensure proper functioning at all times. Also the software for the AEDs will be continually updated.

The fire extinguishers have all been either replaced or recharged.

The Town Hall elevator passed the annual inspection: The new elevator company, hired in July 2015, renewed the elevator license with the State contingent upon repairs being performed to the elevator maintenance room. Various parts of the elevator maintenance room system were far out of code

The smoke detection system in Town Hall was likewise defective. Some detectors did not work, others were 25 years old and out of code. This came to light in Dec. 2015 and will be remedied in early 2016.

The Town Hall complex septic system is now on a regular pumping schedule.

Intensive work has been done to craft the Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan for Rowe. Working closely with Kimberly MacPhee of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments, Susan Gleason, Walter Quist, Janice Boudreau, Ed May, Selmi Hyytinen, Julie Shippee, Jenn Morse, and Lance Larned have identified hazards which could impact the community such as winter storms, hurricanes, and fire. Funding for the plan development was provided by grants from the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Approval of the plan will enable reduced flood insurance premiums for policy holders under the National Flood Insurance Program, as well as position Rowe for grants pertaining to planning for and restoration from damage.

Regrettably, several thefts occurred at the Town Hall Complex this year; a break-in at the Highway garage with the loss of equipment and tools, and thefts of fuel from the fuel pumps. Security measures have been implemented.

We would like to remind citizens that although a great effort is made to meet the needs of everyone, it is not always possible to do so. Sometimes what is desirable to one person may not be to another. All of our department heads try their very best to accommodate the many and varied requests they receive, but ultimately it is the good of the Town as a whole which must prevail, and our department heads have this goal in mind at all times.

We are very thankful and appreciative of the efforts of all the volunteers in Rowe who work in the "front" and behind the scenes on the various boards and committees.

We welcome input, questions and comments, from all citizens. We are also grateful for the civility which now prevails at Board meetings and Town Meetings. The work of the Town can best be accomplished in this atmosphere of openness and respect for each other.

Former Board member **Ellen Miller** was elected to a three-year term at the annual town elections in May 2015. The Board would like to thank Carrie for her years of service to the Board. Board members nominated and elected **Rick Williams** to serve again as Chair.

The Board would like to thank **Sandy Daviau**, Assessor's Clerk, for her handling of the day-to-day tasks in the Assessor's Office. Sandy has a good deal of contact with the public and always manages to be gracious and helpful to everyone.

The Assessors continue to utilize **Patriot Properties'** AssessPro assessing software and **Cartographic Associates'** Query Manager GIS mapping software. **Mayflower Valuations** continues to provide annual residential appraisal consulting services.

The following items were addressed at the routine monthly meetings, as needed: **building permits** received from the building inspector were reviewed and flagged for the annual field verification...**survey plans** and **deeds** recording property transfers received from the Franklin County Registry of Deeds were reviewed and compared to tax maps for verification of data and adjustments were made to affected property cards...**tax map changes** were documented and forwarded to the mapping service for update...**Form of List** (personal property declaration) returns received from taxpayers were reviewed and filed...and **real estate**, **personal property**, **and motor vehicle excise tax bill warrants and commitments and any applicable abatement applications** were reviewed and approved, as required.

Based on the **FY16** interim year update **sales analysis** for Rowe, residential property home values increased ~5% whereas building lot values and excess land values remained unchanged. The resulting **total town valuation** for **FY16** increased by ~1.6% to \$294,751,591.

The **FY16** tax rates of \$6.03 for Residential and \$13.31 for Commercial/Industrial/Personal Property (CIP) were set on October 7 at a Classification Hearing with the Board of Selectmen. This contrasts to the previous fiscal year tax rates of \$5.90 for Residential and \$13.01 for CIP.

According to Mass Department of Revenue (DOR) municipal databank records for **FY16**, Rowe had the 8th lowest residential tax rate and the 3rd lowest average single family tax bill in the state (\$1,256).

Reminder...the so-called **Proposition 2½ Levy Limit** restricts the amount of money that Rowe can appropriate each year from taxation. By law this limit increases only 2.5% each year (**\$81,080** for Rowe for **FY16**). Despite our relatively low tax rate and enviable low tax bills, the Town has been bumping up against its Prop 2½ Levy Limit for many years now and has had to make cuts, defer projects, or utilize other "available funds" from Free Cash and the Stabilization Fund to balance the regular operating budget and to pay for special projects.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION 2015

The five-member Conservation Commission met monthly and as needed to address matters brought before it during the calendar year 2015. In June Ramon Sanchez was elected Co-chair to serve with Myra Carlow. In January 2016 Myra resigned as Co-chair and Ramon was elected unanimously to be Chairman of the Commission.

The following paragraphs describe the activities of the Conservation Commission during the calendar year 2015.

Issued Enforcement Order and Emergency Certificate

- 07/03/15 The Commission issued an *Enforcement Order* to Lisa Bryant regarding logging activities being performed in a Riverfront area. Work at the site was immediately suspended and all equipment was removed a day or two later.
- 10/01/15 The Commission issued an *Emergency Certificate* which allowed the Department of Public Works to perform work to replace the old stone culvert which collapsed on Davis Mine Road, causing a significant road hazard.
- 10/30/15 The repair work was completed.

Receipt of Request for Determination of Applicability (RDA, WPA Form 1)

- 07/10/15 64 Dell Road, James and Deborah Lively, proposed foundation for a new 24' by 36' cape house.
- 07/17/15 Conservation Commission issued a *Negative Determination* (**WPA Form 2**) with conditions allowing the work to proceed.
- 10/18/15 Sibley Road, Rowe Energy Committee, proposed 11' by 11' concrete pad adjacent to DPW garage.
- 10/28/15 Conservation Commission issued a *Negative Determination* (WPA Form 2) with conditions allowing the work to proceed.

Receipt of Notice of Intent (NOI, WPA Form 3)

- 02/06/15 BSC Group submitted a *NOI* on behalf of TransCanada for a remediation project on the Deerfield River bank at Dam Number 5, south of the Depot St. Bridge.
- 05/06/15 Commission issued the *Order Of Conditions* **(WPA Form 5)** allowing the work to proceed with conditions. Work proceeded during the remainder of 2015 and is expected to be completed in early 2016.
- 08/06/15 New England Environmental submitted a *NOI* on behalf of Bear Swamp Power Company/Brookfield Renewable Energy to create the Bear Swamp Hiking Trail from Monroe Bridge to Zoar Gap.
- 09/04/15 Commission issued the *Order of Conditions* (**WPA Form 5**) allowing the work to proceed with conditions. Work was completed and a *Request for Certificate of Completion* was submitted to the Commission in early 2016.

In late 2015 BSC Group, on behalf of New England Power Co/National Grid, contacted the Commission regarding a proposed project to decommission a well in the Right of Way 20 feet off Potter Road. The *NOI* was received in January 0f 2016.

Request from Franklin County Cooperative Inspectional Program (FCCIP) to Review Applications for Building Permits

At the request of the FCCIP, the Conservation Commission reviewed the Building Permit Applications and made site visits to five separate locations to determine if the proposed construction would violate Massachusetts Wetland protection laws. Four applications were approved and the other one required the submission of a Request for Determinability for Applicability (RDA).

Other Meetings with Property Owners

The Conservation Commission held conversations and/or meetings with two property owners regarding questions of compliance with Wetlands Protection Act. All matters were resolved to the Commission's satisfaction.

Training and Education

Members of the Commission participated in educational and training activities during the course of the year. These courses were provided by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissioners (MACC), and private consultants. The formats have included classroom instruction, on-line classes and fieldwork.

ENERGY COMMITTEE 2015

In 2015 the Rowe Energy Committee's focus shifted from residential energy usage enhancement to town building improvement. This was because the Green Communities Grant application changed its project qualifications.

At the May, 2015 STM the town voted to commit \$28,000 in expectation of receiving \$154,776 from Green Communities. The grant was awarded in the full amount. The following projects have been undertaken:

- In December, Sandri Energy of Greenfield replaced the oil-fired boiler in the DPW Garage with an industrial wood pellet boiler. This will reduce the Town's dependence on foreign oil and utilized wood pellets, a regional resource.
 - In early 2016, Sandri Energy is also expected to complete the installation of a Mini-Split Heat Pumps (one primary unit and three area Project completed extensions of the unit) in the Town Library. This effort will offset the current oil-fired burner and as an indirect benefit provide air conditioning and humidity control.
- Insulation and air sealing upgrades to Town Hall, Library, & DPW Garage are also underway and are expected to be completed by late March. These efforts will help reduce heat loss and ice buildup.

All contracts were bid and completed according to Mass Municipal Guidelines under the direction of FRCOG (Franklin Country Regional Council of Governments).

Insulation and air sealing upgrades were planned for the Public Safety Building but will be postponed because of higher than expected wage costs made it impossible to complete all four municipal buildings at this time.

Evaluations of these expected energy savings will be compiled in 2016. We fully expect the qualifications for being a Green Community will be met by these improvements.

Residential enhancements continue to be a priority for the Energy Committee. We strongly encourage residents to contact Coop Power of Hatfield for free efficiency evaluations.

The following persons deserve our town's thanks for their contributions: Sue Wood (service completed in 2015), Michael Phillips and Kelle Quist (began committee work in 2015), Andrea Woods (FRCOG advisor), and Walt Quist, interim chair. Walt was the primary organizational force in completion of the above projects. His work will save our town energy costs and carbon emissions. Additional thanks goes to the: Rowe Conservation Commission; Lance Learned, DPW Superintendent: and Molly Lane, Library Director: for their patience and cooperation during the installation process.

PLANNING BOARD 2015

PLANNING BOARD ORGANIZATION

In the election in May, Robin Reed was re-elected to a five-year term. The board elected David Roberson to serve as Chairman and as representative to the Franklin Regional Planning Board. Doug Wilson was elected as Scribe (legally, the Secretary or Clerk). The board was advised and represented by Greenfield attorney Donna MacNicol, who is also Town Counsel.

PERMITTING

In May, the board held a joint public hearing with Highway Superintendent and Tree Warden Lance Larned concerning extensive tree removal on Monroe Hill Road and several nearby roads in town ("Monroe Hill Reconductoring/Feeder Tie Project"). The cutting operation was permitted, subject to conditions including that any pole or wire installations necessitating tree removal must have previously been permitted by the Board of Selectmen.

The Planning Board held a public hearing in August on a request by David Gregory Poehlein for a Special Permit for short-term rental of a portion of his home on Zoar Road. There were no objections by abutters or other members of the public. After deliberation, the board found that the proposed use would not have adverse effects which would outweigh the beneficial effects, and the Special Permit was granted by unanimous affirmative vote. Later in the year, the board became aware that some other property owners in Rowe were marketing their properties as short-term rentals without having been granted permits, and efforts were made to contact these parties to inform them of the town's bylaws and ensure they are being fairly applied.

SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAIC PLANT APPEAL DISMISSED

In 2013, the Planning Board held hearings on a request by applicant Seaboard Solar for Special Permit and Site Plan Review for a large solar photovoltaic installation on land belonging to Planning Board member Bob Dykeman and his wife Mary Ann on Tunnel Road. In 2014, after deliberation, the board was evenly split on the proposal and eligible members voted 2-2, thus denying approval for the project. Seaboard Solar then appealed the Planning Board's decision in Franklin Superior Court. All four eligible members were named in the lawsuit, but the appellants also alleged malfeasance by David Roberson and Robin Reed, who had voted against the proposal. David and Robin were subsequently deposed and questioned under oath by Seaboard's attorneys, and later engaged in mediation presided over by a retired judge. In June 2015, Seaboard withdrew their complaint, waiving all rights of appeal and bringing an end to the lawsuit.

GOAL POST

Planning Board has published the *Goal Post* for forty years, striving to create a town newsletter that is, foremost, informative on the affairs of town government as well as an enjoyable source of community news and entertainment. Editorial guidelines have been adopted in an effort to ensure that the *Goal Post*, being a town publication, serves to inform but not persuade voters on political or religious issues, as well as addressing other concerns such as protecting the privacy of minors. To free up space, it was decided to publish these guidelines in the newsletter only once a year. They have been posted to the town website and are available by request from the Planning Board.

In mid-June, *Goal Post* editor Paul McLatchy III announced that he was resigning upon publication of the July issue. With such short notice there was no feasible way to produce an August issue, and the Planning Board advertised for the position and interviewed three applicants who were deemed to be potentially suitable candidates. As one of these applicants was Doug Wilson, a member of the Planning Board, legal advice was sought to ensure that he was not disqualified from applying by virtue of his position and to avoid conflict of interest should he be selected as the board's choice. After deliberation, the four eligible Planning Board members voted to make editorship of the *Goal* Post a specified duty of the Secretary (Clerk), with compensation set at \$500 for each completed issue. Doug was informed of the board's decision and accepted the appointment.

PLANNING AND ZONING

The board continued reviewing Rowe's bylaws, although the level of workload as well as the pending litigation slowed our efforts somewhat. Sections that were relevant to the photovoltaic application were tabled until it was clear that the lawsuit was over. Nevertheless, the board made significant progress in drafting the proposed protective zoning bylaws that we hope will be endorsed by a super-majority of voters. Our work on this issue continues in 2016.

BOARD OF HEALTH 2015

Jennifer Morse was re-elected this year and once again voted in as Chair by her fellow board members. David Cousineau will be up for re-election in 2016. Marcella Stafford Gore was re-appointed as Clerk.

In April the board voted to adopt the State and Department of Environmental Protection Regulations and Guidelines for burials on private property. If you would like a copy of these regulations, please contact the BOH office.

On Rowe's behalf, Jennifer and Marcella participated in the annual Hawlemont EDS clinic at the Hawlemont School in Charlemont. In addition to influenza vaccine, tetanus, Tdap and pneumonia vaccine are available at this clinic. An updated version of the Emergency Dispensing Site (EDS) Action Plan was handed out to all member towns.

This year a rabies clinic was set up on the school grounds. Veterinarian Amy Tuominen was on site to vaccinate all animals. The rabies clinic was quite successful and they are planning to hold it again next year.

Board of Health Agent

It was with great regret that we accepted the resignation of our long time Health Agent, Lisa Danek Burke. The board often relied on her professionalism, knowledge and experience. Lisa has agreed to work with the board when she is available on an as need basis, we thank her for her continued dedication. We have also hired Mike Freelander R.S. (Colrain) on occasion this year.

Title V

The board reviewed all building permit applications submitted for review by the FCCIP as required by state Title 5 regulations. Title 5 system soil evaluations and percolation tests were done again in response to residents' requests.

Transfer Station/Solid Waste Disposal

The board re-appointed James Lively and Edwin Palmer as Transfer Station Attendants. Julie Shippee was re-appointed as alternate attendant. Vehicle stickers will be mailed in December for the new year. All

residents/property owners are required to visibly display the sticker on/in their vehicle so that they will be easily identified by the attendants. The entrance gate has been repaired this year; further repairs are needed and will be completed in 2016. The steps of the Swap Shop were also repaired.

We would like to stress the importance of using caution when backing out at the Refuse Garden. Please be mindful of other vehicles especially if you are there during a busy time.

The board thanks Jan Ameen, Amy Donovan and the staff at the Franklin County Solid Waste Management District for providing us with excellent service which includes all of the recycling and bulky waste hauling contracts, the regional hazardous waste collection days and our sharps bio-hazard collections. Ms. Ameen is also instrumental in obtaining the DEP Small-Scale Initiative grant and performing the mandated inspection each year.

Recycling

We have continued our efforts to encourage all residents to recycle and it is paying off. The latest FCSWMD report shows Rowe's recycling tonnage for containers (cans, bottles etc.) has increased, saving Rowe \$338.64 in disposal costs. Thank you all so much for your continued efforts to recycle.

Earnings from recycling are added to the Revolving Account and we deposited approximately \$1,835.00 in 2015. We expended \$768.84 for Rowe's share of roll-off containers and we donated \$645.00 to Pelham Lake for the purchase of a Bear Saver recyclables bin.

Amy Donovan, Program Director at Franklin County Solid Waste Management District visited the Rowe school in June. She spoke to the children about the importance of recycling and engaged them in a composting lesson. Parents were also invited to this event.

Public Water System

Housatonic Basin Sampling and Testing in Lee, MA. has provided all water testing in 2015. Monthly testing is performed for our three (3) public water supplies; the Town Hall, Rowe Elementary School and Avery Fountain. Weekly testing is performed at the Pelham Lake swimming area and the Ranger Station tap during the swimming season. The board also receives reports on the water sampled at Rowe Camp and Conference Center as well as Maple House Bed and Breakfast.

Health Services

Sheila Litchfield was reappointed as town nurse. Our town is most fortunate to have such a dedicated professional who goes above and beyond to provide health services to Rowe residents. The office is open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday every week. Sheila writes articles for the Goal Post and provides the board with monthly summary reports. She also participates in and helps to organize the yearly EDS clinic. We thank Sheila for the professional performance of her services. Dr. Richard Warner continues to be our medical consultant.

In Conclusion

Currently the board meets on Thursday evenings at 6:00pm. Please check the town bulletin board for meeting agendas which will be posted at least 48 hours in advance of our meeting. If you have questions or need a permit application, our clerk is in the office for several hours before our meeting begins or you can call the office anytime and we will get back to you.

BOARD OF HEALTH - TOWN NURSE 2015

2015 has been another busy year for the Rowe Health Services Office. A total of 1,370 patient encounters occurred, representing an average of 114 contacts each month. In addition to office visits, house calls, and telephone consultations, Rowe Health Services continues to offer wellness checks, health counseling, nursing assessment, emergency consultation and referral for clients of all ages.

Rowe Health Services continues to offer blood testing for cholesterol, blood sugar, A1C (3-month blood sugar impact test) and INR (blood clotting factor), quantitative dipstick urinalysis testing, hearing and vision testing, monitoring of blood pressure and assistance with weight and fitness management, and much more. Test results are reported to clients' primary care practitioners for improved client care. All of the testing services are augmented with health education, encouragement and follow-up.

This year the Massachusetts Department of Public Health was only able to provide influenza vaccine for children, however with thanks to the Finance Committee and Select Board we were still able to offer influenza immunizations to town residents. Immunization data is recorded as required by the state's online Immunization Registry, which is intended to enable you or your primary care provider to have ready access to your immunization history.

The Rowe Health Services and the Board of Health continues to participate in emergency preparedness activities with other area towns through the Hawlemont Emergency Dispensing Site (EDS). The EDS is the structure through which Rowe residents would receive emergency medications or antidotes when they were issued by the U.S. Centers for Disease and Control (CDC) from the National Stockpile in response to large public health threats. This emergency network is tested annually by a community-wide influenza clinic. This year the clinic was held at Hawlemont Elementary School on October 31st. Participating this year were representatives from the Boards of Health, Emergency Management and other volunteers from Rowe, Hawley, Heath, Monroe and Charlemont.

It has been a pleasure to have been able to provide another year of early intervention, illness prevention, health education and awareness, and support to the residents of Rowe. The Health Services Office is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. I look forward to seeing you.

FIRE DEPARTMENT 2015

In 2015 the Rowe Volunteer Fire Department and First Responders were called to:

- 23 Medical Calls

In January, three members of the Department attended the Fire Officers Symposium at Greenfield Community College. This two day workshop was offered by the Franklin County Chief's Association and the Tri State Fire Services. In attendance for Rowe were Interim Chief Sprague, Firefighters "Buster" Reed and Tom Houghtaling.

In February, Joe Marucca, Chief of the West Barnstable Fire Department and Legal Consultant for the Massachusetts Volunteer Call Fire Association, presented his full report on the Rowe Volunteer Fire Department. Chief Marucca examined past and current practices of the fire department and made several recommendations for the future. The report has been very useful in that it has helped Department personnel plan for future needs and assisted in budget planning. The full report can be obtained by contacting the fire department administrator.

In April Interim Chief Sprague was appointed by the Board of Selectmen to serve as the Rowe Fire Chief. He represents Rowe at the monthly Franklin County Fire Chief and Forest Wardens meetings. The RVFD meets three Tuesday's each month to train and complete inspections of all equipment.

In 2015 the Department represented Rowe at several local celebrations: the Readsboro 4th of July Parade; the Ashfield 25th Parade; Charlemont Yankee Doodle Day 250th Parade; Shelburne Falls 4th of July Parade; the Heath Fair Parade; and the Rowe Old Home Day Parade.

The Rowe Volunteer Fire Department has taken advantage of many opportunities to train with other towns including Ashfield, Charlemont, Shelburne Falls, Hawley, Florida, Colrain, Buckland and North Adams. The members of the department participated in the Annual Yankee and Bear Swamp drills. In 2015 the Rowe Volunteer Fire Department held two first responder courses, which were taught by Matt Wolkenbreit of Community 911 in Greenfield, MA. These courses went above and beyond the state mandated classes and were attended by First Responders from both Rowe and Heath.

In 2015 the Rowe Volunteer Fire Department purchased a trash-water supply pump, three chainsaws, turnout gear, and a computer. All of the SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus) Packs and cylinders were tested. The Chief tested and/or replace all of the fire extinguishers in the town buildings. Lots of radio work happens behind the scenes and in coordination with dispatch the radios are being re-programmed and brought up to date. The Rowe Volunteer Fire Department and EMS visited the Rowe Elementary School during National Fire Prevention Week with the message "Hear the Bleep, Where you Sleep". The Town of Rowe entered into a contract with North Adams Ambulance Service to provide medical services to all townspeople in the fall and they brought an Ambulance for the students to see during National Fire Prevention Week.

The Rowe Volunteer Fire Department continues to offer smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector inspections to all senior households. With the support of Fire Department Fire Administrator Jennifer Morse the RVFD was granted a DCR grant in the amount of \$1860 to purchase Wild Fire turnout equipment and gear.

FRANKLIN REGIONAL COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENT'S FRANKLIN COUNTY COOPERATIVE BUILDING INSPECTION PROGRAM 2015

Dear Residents of Rowe:

As you know, your town receives building, plumbing, gas, and wiring inspection and zoning enforcement services through the Franklin County Cooperative Inspection Program (FCCIP), a thirty-nine year old shared service housed at the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG). We thank your town for your continued participation in the FCCIP, which allows small towns to have access to professional staff and state-of-the-art technology.

2015 was a busy year, permit wise, for the program. We issued 2,741 permits, including a significant number of insulation upgrade, solar array and wood/pellet stove permits. The number of permits was higher in 2015 than in the previous year, the fees collected were also slightly higher. A total of 24 new dwelling units were constructed in our 15 member towns.

Our new online permitting program went live on July 1, 2011 and has issued 10,735 building, electrical & plumbing/gas permits since then. The program allows you to apply, pay for, and track the progress of any permit online, saving you time and visits to our office in Greenfield. The program has 3,573 registered users. You can find it at www.frcog.org under the Franklin County Cooperative Inspection Program. Our website also includes helpful information on inspection requirements, permit costs, and contractor licensing.

We submit this annual report for 2015 on behalf of the Franklin County Technical School District and its administration, faculty, staff and students.

Total enrollment as of October 1, 2015 was 507 students with town breakouts as follows:

Franklin County Technical School awarded 117 diplomas to our seniors in June of 2015. Massachusetts students are required to pass the MCAS in order to receive a high school diploma and once again our students were very successful in meeting this high academic standard. FCTS has maintained Level 2 Accountability status for the last three years. Our overall Progress and Performance Index (PPI) moved from 17% in 2012 (Level III) to 21% in 2013 (Level II), 31% in 2014 and 30% in 2015 (Level II). Additionally, the district met the goals set by the Department of Education for passing rates of students at risk and with disabilities.

Having earned their vocational certificate, 38% of our graduates plan to go on to either a two or four year college, 37% joined the regional work force, 5% planned to join the military, 9% went on to a post-secondary trade/technical school, and 11% were unsure as to which of the above options they would pursue. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Class of 2015.

Franklin County Technical School's technical programs have been busy with community-based projects that are used as learning opportunities. This year, as in the past, students embrace the authentic work that is done in the communities and truly engage in building their skills while out on work sites. As learning activities, these projects are not treated as production work that would be done by commercial entities. Project work is treated as an immersive activity, with guidance and professional direction by instructors. Alternating weeks of shop time increase the duration of a project but costs associated with a project are less than those conducted by a commercial company; this service-learning work is coupled with a benefit to our towns. Within the walls of FCTS, students from Electrical, Plumbing, Carpentry, Landscaping/Horticulture, Auto Technology, Welding and Collision Repair are involved in repair and upgrading activities that save the school costs associated with hiring contractors.

What follows are some examples of the ways in which we serve our communities: Electrical students and instructors have been involved in the Shelburne Trolley Museum's car barn; the retrofitting of LED units

throughout the Greenfield Community College campus; rewiring of the South Deerfield Town Common; work on the library in the Town of Bernardston; continued work on the Hawlemont School barn; on-going work at the Colrain Fire Department; and work on the Warwick Police Department. Landscaping students and instructors have helped with the reconstruction of Greenfield's Minor League fields; grading and sod installation at the Veteran's Memorial field; trimming and pruning of plants and trees on the South Deerfield Common; prepping of the baseball fields at Pratt Field in Bernardston for the upcoming year; construction of raised beds along the Nature Trail in Charlemont; tree and brush chipping for the Hawlemont school; and involvement is underway in the Town of Montague's tree planting program. Carpentry instructors and students will be involved in the building of a new cabin at Camp Keewanee in the spring, as well as the planned building of the Greenfield High School Field House; construction of the South Deerfield Town Common structure; installation of a roof over the handicap ramp at the Bernardston Veterans building; construction of a new addition to the Athol regional animal shelter with ground pipes installed by the Plumbing department. Our Health Technology program has been involved in clinical work throughout the county and Cosmetology students have provided personal care to elders throughout the area, as well. The Culinary Arts program continues to host the annual Chamber of Commerce breakfast; donates food and labor to community non-profit organizations, and hosts nursing homes and senior groups from throughout Franklin County. The Franklin County Technical School's Pre-Employment Program continues to contribute pet supplies and money to area animal shelters, as well as contributions to the Ronald McDonald House. The FCTS drum line members and chaperones volunteer their time to participate in many parades throughout the county. School-wide faculty, staff and student involvement have resulted in the collection of food and winter clothing for area needs; fundraising for cancer awareness; set-up and serving of meals at the annual Triad dinner put on by the Franklin County Sheriff's Department; and participation in a 24 hour relay to raise money for the food pantry. The school continues to provide its track, facilities and personnel support of the annual Franklin County Home Care Meals on Wheels Walk-a-Thon.

There are numerous pending projects in many communities that are in discussion or in a queue for scheduling. FCTS programs consider projects based on their curriculum alignment, timing and appropriateness for students. Our partnerships with our communities are important for our programs, and we thank those who allow our students the opportunity to practice their trades out in the field.

On June 23, 2015 Franklin County Technical School held a district wide election to allow FCTS the authority to borrow monies to upgrade our infrastructure for three distinct facility projects. FCTS received approval for a \$2.1 million project from the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) for new exterior windows and doors at a reimbursement rate of 73.89%. This project is on schedule to begin in the spring of 2016 and conclude in the summer. Our second project for a new roof coating system was approved for \$975,000. We are on schedule to begin this project late spring into early summer of 2016. The final facilities project approved for \$925,000 is for new paving of our parking lot and track areas, which are original to the school in 1976. We are in the process of receiving bids and setting up a construction schedule to start this project in the summer of 2016.

PRINCIPAL - MOHAWK TRAIL REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL 2015

Of the 83 members of the Class of 2015, 60% went on to a four-year college and 25% went on to a two-year college. Collaboration, creative problem-solving, and community-building are important to the classroom and extracurricular learning experiences students have at Mohawk.

Reflecting our commitment to enhancing Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) learning opportunities, our middle school Project-Based Learning (PBL) courses are now STEM courses, with a continued emphasis on project-based, cooperative, and interdisciplinary learning but with increased focus on problem-solving and collaboration with science, technology, engineering, and math applications. These middle school courses provide students with hands-on learning experiences with local and global connections, as 7th grade students produced maple syrup from over 30 gallons of sap harvested from trees on campus, and 8th grade students created 3-dimensional playhouses designed to fold to fit into a 9" x 12" mailing envelope that was delivered to children in Haiti, for instance. In the high school we introduced a Robotics course this year, where students develop computer programming skills through robotics applications. Many of our math teachers are using Inquiry-Based Learning approaches to math instruction, where students are engaged in problem-solving inquiry facilitated by their teachers.

Our school has embraced the use of community-building circles and restorative practices. Restorative Justice, often referred to as Restorative Practices, allows students to resolve conflicts and repair harm that has occurred within a community, through communication, reflection, and making changes in practice. Schools in this area and across the country have been transitioning to this evidence-based approach over the past few years. This year we established the Restorative Justice Classroom (RJC) to support students with this process and our faculty have begun using community-building circles in various settings.

Alumni connections continue to enrich the Mohawk experience. Recent graduates returned to school to share their experience with the transition to college and alumni have participated in an occasional speaker series to discuss their career paths.

Mohawk's Student Council has taken on an increasing role in promoting an inclusive and supportive learning environment for all students. This year's Booster Week activities and Bullying Prevention Week events reflected student initiative and commitment to creating a caring and compassionate school culture.

The role of our faculty and staff in school-wide leadership initiatives has grown as we have expanded the use of Professional Learning Communities and established an Instructional Leadership Team composed of staff, both teachers and paraprofessionals, who work with the Principal, Assistant Principal, and Curriculum Director to plan professional development and facilitate school-wide planning. Mohawk Arts Education Council, comprised of educators dedicated to enhancing the role of the arts at Mohawk, has taken on an increasing role, with vibrant programming evident in the visual arts displays within our school, diverse music programs with many public performances, and a wide variety of theatrical productions, including a student-directed adaptation of "The Breakfast Club" in addition to the annual musical and fall and late spring dramatic performances.

At the midpoint of the 2015-2016 school year, enrollment in grades 7-12 is 450. The seventh grade has 95 students and the eighth grade has 68. There are 75 students in the ninth grade, 71 in the tenth grade, 60 students in the junior class, and 81 students in the senior class. Four students are enrolled in our post-graduate program.

It is our pleasure to submit the 2015 Principal's Report for Rowe Elementary School. It has been over a year and a half since we moved into our new school, and we have found the new building to be everything we'd hoped it would be, allowing the staff to better educate our students.

Here are some highlights from the year:

- Rowe School students achieved high PARCC test scores in both English Language Arts and Math, and Rowe is once again a level one school, with one being the highest level a school can attain.
- Three times during the school year, Rowe School teachers evaluated reading abilities of all students with the Benchmark Assessment System. This assessment provides meaningful information about both instructional and independent reading levels and supports Guided Reading program.
- Students continue to learn and speak Spanish from the preschool classroom through the sixth grade.
- The Guided Reading program that is employed at the school allows the teachers to target reading instruction directly at a student's instructional reading level. For those students who test below grade level, we have a reading intervention program for grades K-5, Leveled Literacy Intervention, that allows teachers to work with small groups of students to help them progress toward reading at grade level.
- In October, Kindergarten through grade six students hiked Berkshire East, learning much about local flora and fauna, as well as Berkshire East's windmill and solar array, while enjoying a chilly but beautiful day together. The Preschool visited Pine Hill Orchard.
- Enrichment activities during and after school included sports, hikes, skiing, a visit to the Kemp McCarthy Museum, Rowe Town Library and the use of Pelham Lake Park.
- The Rowe Parent Teacher Partnership continued their fundraising efforts for the school, including selling Rowe School branded coffee and mugs, t-shirts and sweatshirts, as well as pizza through Hillside Organic Pizza.
- In March, the annual Spaghetti Supper fundraiser for the 5th and 6th grade field was held. It was a terrific success, raising money to support the 5th and 6th grade trips to Washington, D.C. and Nature's Classroom.
- Volunteerism remains high as students worked for local, national, and international relief
 efforts. Locally, students collected food for the "Good Neighbors" pantry and money for "Adopt-AFamily," "Warm the Children", and "UNICEF."
- SCA/AmeriCorps volunteers worked with students two days a week for 4-months with projects in environmental science.
- Fifth and sixth grade students visited Washington D.C. in April and Nature's Classroom in September for days of intensive academic and social learning.

Once again the learning adventure remains continues thanks to the support of our Rowe School families, the Rowe School Committee, the Rowe Select Board and the citizens of Rowe. Thank you to the Town of Rowe for its continued support of your students at the Rowe Elementary School, the Mohawk Trail Regional Middle/High School, and the Franklin County Technical High School.

The students and staff expressed their gratitude for a well-designed building, playground, and classrooms that support learning in positive ways. The School Committee continued to oversee the completion of the punch list and warranty items with DEW Construction.

The Committee also continued to develop its new relationship with Northern Berkshire Union Schools under direction of Superintendent Jon Lev with budget planning for FY16, new policy development, and implementation of the computer based PARCC test.

In May, Lisa Danek Burke completed her final term as School Committee Member and Chair. We are grateful for her many years of fine service and leadership to Rowe School and the community. Gail May was elected to a three-year seat on the Committee. Gail retired as an employee of Rowe School after 29 years of service and we are pleased to have her expertise continue as a committee member. Susan Zavotka was elected Chair. Also in May, purchase of a new tractor for school lawn mowing and snow blowing was approved at Rowe's Annual Town Meeting.

Over the summer the Committee identified goals for the school year. The following have been completed to date:

SPECIAL EDUCATION AND PUPIL SERVICES - MTRSD 2015

The districts continue to support and provide students with an identified disability an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or a Section 504 Plan. An IEP provides direct service with accommodations and modifications. A 504 Plan provides accommodations that allow a student access to the general curriculum. The district continues to increase the use of Response to Intervention (RTI). This model enables schools to provide support to students based on regular assessment and data aimed at targeting more specific areas of concern or need. A student does not require an IEP or a 504 to benefit from RTI. The most recent MCAS data indicated that our students in the high needs population showed growth in their progress this year. This is a direct result of the support and direct instruction via an IEP, 504 and tiered instruction.

For many years the district has supported several substantially separate programs for students requiring a higher level of instruction and support. Historically, a student requiring this level of education may be placed in an out of district school at a high cost to the district. Research suggests that each time a student is placed outside of their home district, it decreases their investment in their education. Out of district placements are made only when all other options have been explored and assessed. The district currently has the following programs:

MSC (Mohawk Supported Classrooms): Classrooms are located in the Middle School and in the High School. Each class has a special education teacher providing direct instruction for core academic courses. The program provides academic and emotional support to students with a social emotional disability and has one Clinician providing group and individual therapy as well as on going case management. Both programs are staffed with additional paraprofessionals as needed.

MVP (Mohawk Vocational Program): Program supports students with severe special needs. The program has a special education teacher a vocational coordinator and additional para professionals as required. The program runs a self-sustaining daily coffee shop for school staff.

The Middle School has a similar program for students with severe special needs, supported by a special educator and paraprofessionals.

Starting with the 2015 School Year, we added a program at BSE for students ages Pre-School -2nd grade. The program is run by a behaviorist with support from special education teachers and paraprofessionals. This program has enabled students on the autism spectrum and with behavioral challenges to access their general education classroom with varying levels of support.

Each of these programs is designed to maximize the amount of time in the general education classroom while at the same time provide a direct well designed individual program for each student. There is not a set amount of time in or out of the program. It is dictated by the student's level of need.

SUPERINTENDENT MOHAWK TRAIL REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT 2015

With the introduction of a half-day, district-wide preschool program, Mohawk experienced an enrollment increase of 50 students in 2015. Continuing a 3-year positive trend, the quality of education within the Mohawk Trail Regional School District (MTRSD) rose considerably. According to the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, the MTRSD is classified as a Level 2 district with all of its schools classified as Level 1 or Level 2. There are five classification levels within the Commonwealth's system with Level 1 being the highest rating. The MTRSD is striving to become one of the higher performing school districts in Massachusetts by achieving a Level 1 classification, which requires all of our schools to be Level 1. With all Mohawk schools improving significantly in 2015, the year marked another significant step toward the MTRSD realizing this ambitious goal.

Mohawk District Highlights: Level 2

The percentage of Mohawk students achieving a rating of proficient or higher in English Language Arts (ELA) improved to 76%, reflecting a 9% improvement over the past four years. Mohawk students made gains in all three major content areas. Our ELA composite performance index (CPI) improved to 91.6; our mathematics CPI improved to 82.6; and our science CPI improved to 81.1. In both ELA and math, Mohawk's student growth percentile exceeded the state median of 50.

Mohawk Middle School-High School Highlights: Level 2 (School Percentile 46)

Mohawk's graduation rate rose to 86.5%, marking an 11% increase over the past five years. Of the graduates, approximately 80% plan to attend a 4-year or a 2-year college. On the SAT college entrance exams, Mohawk students outperformed the state average in reading, writing and math.

Mohawk MS-HS achieved a school percentile ranking of 46, which is a 19-point improvement over the past three years. 90% of Mohawk 10th graders scored at the proficient or advanced level in ELA. 62% of Mohawk 10th graders scored at the advanced level in math compared to a 53% state-wide average. Mohawk 10th graders also outperformed the state-wide average in science and technology/ engineering. Mohawk's 7th graders achieved student growth percentiles of 63 in ELA and 67 in math, far higher than the state median of 50.

The Mohawk MS-HS athletic program continued to flourish during 2015 with 38 teams and 20 sports, including the introduction of wrestling. Approximately 50% of the students participated in at least one sport, and 44% participated in multiple sports. The Mohawk MS-HS music and theater programs were also vibrant with impressive levels of student participation.

Buckland-Shelburne Elementary School: Level 1 (School Percentile 56)

BSE continued to perform at a very high level in 2015, achieving a second consecutive classification as a Level 1 school. Additionally, BSE's school percentile improved a whopping fourteen points to the 56th percentile. Over the past five years, BSE has improved from a Level 3 classification to Level 1 and tripled its school percentile ranking! In tandem with this educational success, BSE's enrollment has increased 32% from 197 to 259.

Sanderson Academy. Level 2 (School Percentile 58)

Sanderson remained a very high performing school with a percentile ranking of 58. For the first time in the school's history, Sanderson offered preschool. The community response was compelling with approximately forty 3-year old and 4-year old students enrolling, which more than doubled the District's forecast. As a result, we needed to add a second preschool class to accommodate the demand, and Sanderson's enrollment increased 17% to 149 students!

Colrain Central School. Level 2 (School Percentile 35)

Colrain students performed very well for the second consecutive year, which improved the school percentile ranking five points to 35. 72% of the students scored proficient or higher in ELA, which is a 39 point improvement over the past two years. Similarly, 67% of the students scored proficient or higher in math, which is a 23 point improvement over the same time frame. Both Colrain's ELA and math proficiency rates exceeded the state-wide average.

Heath Elementary School. Level 1 (School Percentile 59)

Heath Elementary achieved its third consecutive year of Level 1 classification, which is the best in the district. 73% of the students scored proficient or higher in ELA, which is a fifteen point improvement over the prior year. 67% of the students scored proficient or higher in math. Both Heath's ELA and math proficiency rates also exceeded the state-wide average.

In 2015 the introduction of a half-day, district-wide preschool program reversed a long term trend of declining enrollment in the MTRSD. Additionally, all of our district schools improved significantly, resulting in classifications of Level 1 or Level 2 and several percentile rankings approaching 60, which is unprecedented. Our students, staff, families, administrators and school committee deserve a great deal of credit for this continued high level of educational success. Our townspeople and town officials also deserve a great deal of credit for their ongoing support of our schools, which is essential to the MTRSD's continued success.

On behalf of our students, I thank our entire school community for your dedicated support of our children's education. THANK YOU!

CARL H. NILMAN SCHOLARSHIP FUND 2015

The fund was established under the provisions of the will of Carl H. Nillman for the purpose of providing scholarships. Recipients shall reside in the School District and be graduates of the Mohawk Trail Regional High School who desire and are deemed worthy of post high school education or training and who are in need of financial assistance.

This year the Awards subcommittee read 76 applications, 38 were from seniors and 38 from previous graduates of Mohawk. \$33,200.00 is to be awarded using 30% for seniors and 70% for graduates. The Committee feels that seniors have multiple scholarship opportunities from other sources while graduates have far fewer resources. 30 scholarships totaling \$10,400.00 were awarded to seniors (79% of applicants). 32 scholarships totaling \$22,800.00 were given to graduates (84% of applicants).

From 1991 – 2015 a total of \$876,625.00 has been awarded in scholarships, Mohawk seniors have received \$270,775.00 and \$605,850.00 has been awarded to Mohawk graduates.

The application is once again available on line to the graduates. Seniors can pick their applications up at Mohawk High School.

There are 15 members on the Carl H. Nilman Scholarship Committee. One from each of the nine member towns in the district, three at large members appointed by the School Committee, plus a past School Committee member, current School Committee member and the chairman of the School Committee. Members from the nine towns are: Sheila Graves (Ashfield), Marion Scott (Buckland), Marge Porrovecchio (Charlemont), Michelle Hillman (Colrain), Jonathan Diamond (Heath), Alice Parker (Hawley), Allen Irvine (Plainfield), Marion Taylor (Shelburne), and Rowe (open).

Officers are: Marge Porrovecchio and Robin Hartnett, Co-Chair, and Marion Scott, Secretary. Subcommittees: Finance, Marion Taylor, Robin Hartnett, David Engle/Eric Sumner. Scholarship: Marge Porrovecchio, Sheila Graves, Michelle Hillman, Marion Scott and Allen Irvine.

The Mohawk community owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Nilman for his foresight in supporting higher education for the students of the Mohawk Trail Regional High School. The committee members are honored to bring the wishes of his will to fruition.



FRANKLIN COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT 2015

To the Residents of the Solid Waste District:

The Solid Waste District was formed in 1989 to help Franklin County towns manage all aspects of their solid waste – recyclables, organics, hazardous waste, wastewater treatment sludge, and trash. We continue to provide assistance to twenty-two member towns through administrative support, professional consultation, trainings, and outreach to residents and businesses.

A review of recycling tonnage for 2015 shows almost an identical amount compared to 2014. District residents recycled over 1,700 tons of paper and over 1,100 tons of mixed containers, which were processed at the Springfield Materials Recycling Facility. Although market prices for recyclables remained low all year, District towns received a total of \$40,000 in revenue for their recyclables.

In 2015, the District sponsored spring and fall "Clean Sweep" collections for bulky items, electronics, tires, appliances, and anything too big to fit into a trash bag. Over 66 tons of material was recycled or disposed of from the two collections. A total of 590 households participated in these collection events.

We held our annual household hazardous waste collection in October 2015. This event allows residents to properly dispose of toxic cleaners, automotive products, pesticides, and other toxic products. A total of 347 households participated in this event. 48% of participants were using the collection for the first time.

We received a \$20,000 grant from the State to set up food waste diversion programs in area schools. We also helped member towns implement \$12,000 worth of small-scale initiative grants from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection.

We baled over 10 tons of wood pellet bags and agricultural plastic in our first year of this new recycling program. We continue to manage the recycling and composting program at the Franklin County Fair and to assist other events with waste reduction efforts. We continue to work in each school system helping with waste management bids and with fostering sustainable waste reduction programs.

FRANKLIN REGIONAL COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS - FRCOG 2015

The FRCOG is a governmental body that serves and assists the municipalities of Franklin County as effectively and efficiently as possible. We provide regional and municipal services to our member towns using a diversity of funding sources and strategies. To learn about the FRCOG and the projects, products and services that we provide to the greater Franklin County region, please go to our web site, www.frcog.org, or refer to our Annual Report which can be found on the Publications page of our website. Over the course of the year we also provide specific services to every town. In 2015, the FRCOG provided the following individualized services to your town:

Administration and Special Projects

- Individual members of several town energy committees met together informally on a bi-monthly basis to share news from their respective towns and to learn from each other and from invited guests about energy-related topics of mutual interest. FRCOG staff provided assistance facilitating meetings, presenting information, and conducting follow-up communication.
- Town staff participated in discussions for a new multi-town project to share professional human resource services. Grant funds will be used in 2016 to move the project toward implementation.
- FRCOG municipal finance expert met with local officials to discuss municipal financing of the last mile broadband project. This work included analyzing the potential cost of bond payments for the municipality; reviewing the implications of Proposition 2 1/2 and estimating tax bill impacts.
- A resident attended the MBI Broadband Expansion informational meeting on April 22 at Ashfield Town Hall, which was co-coordinated by the FRCOG.

Cooperative Bidding & Purchasing Program

- Rowe participated in the cooperative bids and contracts for Heating Oil, Diesel, and Gasoline.
- Rowe contracted with the FRCOG to receive cooperative bid pricing for up to 24 different Highway Products and Services. Total highway contracts for FY16 are \$138,744.
- The Town participated in the Dog Licenses & Tags Program.
- Procurement assistance was provided for installation of a Wood Pellet Boiler and an HVAC system (Mini-split) as part of the Town's Green Communities iniatives.
- The Town is eligible to participate in the Rental Equipment contracts and to purchase Hose and Testing Services as part of the Fire Service cooperative bids.

Cooperative Public Health Service

• Staff coordinated vaccine and supplies assisting town officials from Charlemont, Hawley, Rowe, Heath and Monroe to implement a Hawlemont Region Emergency Dispensing Site drill flu clinic and animal rabies clinic. A total of 54 area residents were served with the help of GCC nursing students and community volunteers.

Franklin County Cooperative Inspection Program

• Staff issued 24 building permits, 9 electrical permits & 12 plumbing/gas permits for Rowe in 2015. Nine (9) Certificates of Inspection were issued.

Partnership for Youth

 Staff conducted a Teen Health Survey to assess teen attitudes and behavior among middle and high school students. Staff reported to Mohawk Trail Regional School administrators on results from 172 Mohawk students, representing 72% of the 8th, 10th, and 12th graders. Survey data meets federal No

- Child Left Behind requirements for the school, enables the school to receive Safe and Drug Free Schools funding, and is valuable for grant-writing and program planning.
- One staff member from MTRHS and Middle School was trained to deliver the LifeSkills program and is currently incorporating the program into the school curriculum.

Planning and Development Department

- Staff prepared a draft Community Development Strategy for the Town.
- FRCOG municipal finance expert met with local officials in January to discuss municipal financing of the last mile broadband project.
- Staff worked with the town's Multi-Hazard Mitigation Planning Committee to prepare an updated Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan, which was submitted to MEMA for review in January 2016.
- Staff completed a Plan for the Mohawk Trail Woodlands Partnership Project for 11 West County towns including Rowe with specific recommendations and projects to support Natural Resource Based Economic Development, Forest Conservation & Municipal Financial Sustainability.
- Staff conducted one traffic count.

Regional Preparedness Program

- Staff conducted a review and an update of the *Hawlemont Emergency Dispensing Site Plan* and ran quarterly contact drills and a site notification drill to test the Plan.
- With FRCOG assistance, staff from the Rowe Board of Health, as well as officials from neighboring communities planned and executed a novel, combined rabies/flu clinic at Hawlemont Elementary School. The event also served as a drill for the *Hawlemont Emergency Dispensing Site Plan*, which guided the personnel using the Integrated Command System. A total of 54 area residents were vaccinated for influenza and 21 animals were vaccinated for rabies.
- Through a state Community Innovation Challenge grant, FRCOG provided the fire department with a mobile data terminal to improve data collection during fire responses.

Town Accounting Program

- Staff produced biweekly vendor warrants, and provided monthly budget reports to all officials and department heads through March of FY15.
- Staff-customized reports for committees and departments were developed and distributed.
- All accounting data was accessible over a secure internet connection to a server at the FRCOG office. Backups were completed daily and there was no unscheduled down time.
- Staff assisted with transition to a new accounting service.

Annual Report for the Calendar Year Ending December 31, 2014

To the reader:

The Franklin Regional Retirement System is a government agency that serves the 492 retirees, 49 beneficiaries, 921 active employees, and 557 inactive members of the towns and agencies in Franklin County. We are organized under Chapter 34b, and subject to the provisions of Chapter 32 of the Massachusetts General Laws. We receive oversight on the state level from the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission (PERAC), which audits our operations and financial records every three years. We are also audited by independent auditors in the two intervening years, as well as a complete actuarial valuation every two years.

The retirement benefit we provide replaces participation in the Social Security system and is described as a "defined benefit", which means that we pay monthly retirement benefits based on the age, salary, and number of years worked at the time a member of our system retires. To be a member, an employee in one of our government units must be working in a permanent position scheduled at 20 hours or more per week and earning \$5,000 or greater annually. Funding of these benefits begins with deductions from the member, and, combined with matching funds from the employing unit, are invested in a mix of stocks, bonds, and indexed funds. Investment earnings are a large part of the funding of retirement benefits, and the allocation of those funds are spread to a variety of sectors to take advantage of positive activity as it occurs in each sector. Please make note of our investment performance percentages in the chart on the next page.

Up until 1988, we were a "pay-as-you-go" system. In 1988 it was legislated that we begin saving to become "fully funded" over the ensuing 40 years. Fully funded means we have enough in reserves to pay for all the current and future potential benefits of our present membership. At the end of 2014, we are 79% funded at 26 years (65%) into the 40 year mandate.

Our fiscal year is the calendar year, therefore our annual report is not filed until May of the subsequent year, and as a consequence the information provided herein will be a year old by the time you read this. Current reports and information can be found on our website: www.FRRSMA.com.

Fiscal year 2016 saw the creation of the Upper Pioneer Valley Veterans Service District. By member count and by square miles this is the largest veterans' district in Massachusetts. We have strived to provide expanded services through increased satellite office hours, and a mobile office for home visits. Below are just some of the programs and services we help veterans' and their dependents with:

- ➤ M.G.L. Ch 115 benefit Needs based program of financial and medical assistance to eligible veterans and their dependents
- Assistance to veterans and dependents to help file for health care, pensions, and service-connected disabilities
- ➤ Homeless prevention assistance to veterans and their families
- Employment help with job searches, resumes, and job interview skills
- ➤ Burial assistance to include government markers, flag holders, internment, and VA burial reimbursement
- Massachusetts annuities and tax abatement assistance
- Veterans records retrieval and storage
- Referral to other public and private agencies to include housing, fuel assistance, employment, training, education

- District passed certification for VSOs as required by MA state law

District filed for and helped veterans and eligible dependents be awarded over \$440,000 in VA payments in the district for this year alone. Overall the district has over \$3,040,000 in VA awards flowing into our towns on a monthly basis.

Our office has conducted a thorough review of all MGL CH 115 cases in our district. The net result is a large reduction in monies being paid out by the member towns. This was accomplished by helping clients file for alternative sources of income, and revalidating clients' current situations to ensure eligibility.

For the coming year we will continue to assist veterans, attend more outreach events, and educate both the public and the member towns officials.
