

Effective immediately, I will no longer be holding Tuesday afternoon office hours. I will still have hours from 7:00-8:00 AM and 4:30-5:30 PM Monday, Thursday, and Friday, and will still have my 7:00-8:00 AM hours on Tuesdays.

Definitive information on the early voting for the March 3rd Presidential Primary was not available by the Goal Post deadline. Therefore, please keep an eye out on the website and postings at the town hall detailing when early voting will be held and what you need to do if you wish to participate.

There will be a rabies clinic on Saturday, March 28th from 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM, location to be announced in the March Goal Post (it will be in Rowe- which building still to be determined). New this year will be an opportunity to have ALL vaccinations completed on your cats and dogs. In addition to the rabies vaccine both dogs and cats will be able to get distemper vaccines, and dogs will be able to get Lyme Disease while cats are able to get Leukemia vaccines. The costs are as follows:

In order to get a rabies vaccination for three years, you will need to bring paperwork with you proving your animal has had an initial vaccine- I can help provide this if you contact me in advance. This is a great time to get your annual dog license as well. Dog licenses are still available and must be obtained by March 31st. Forms are available on the town website and at town hall. In order to issue a license, I

must have a copy of the dog's up-to-date rabies vaccination on file along with appropriate payment.

Street Listings went out at the beginning of January. As of the time of submission, I have received only around 120 of the 213 that were sent out. If you have not sent yours in, please do so. You will get a second notice in the mail shortly if I have not received yours. Keep in mind that if you do not turn in your listing it may impact your voter status. With four elections coming up this year, including a presidential election, it's important that your ability to vote is not hindered.

Nomination papers are still available for town office. I encourage anyone interested in running for a town position to see me for papers. If you wish to help candidates make it to the ballot copies of papers that have been taken out are on the table in Meeting Room 2 of town hall.

Please be sure to have your Refuse Garden Tag hanging on your mirror when you bring in your trash. If the tag is not in the window the attendant will ask to see it. If you do not have it you will be asked to come back with it. No trash will be disposed of without a tag.

The Board of Health is currently working on an emergency plan in case of weather or other extended power outages or emergencies including loss of communication. As part of this plan we will be sending out a questionnaire to each residence to help us understand where help may be needed as well as help that residents are willing to give in such an emergency. Fire Department News

The Fire Department has continued a very aggressive training program over the last couple of months. Most recently the members have completed a First Responder Course. This course was conducted in partnership with members of Charlemont Fire-Rescue, Rowe Police and Heath Police. This gave us a great opportunity to work with our partners in Town and our neighbors. The course covered all of the requirements of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, recertified everyone in Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation and trained personnel in the administration of Narcan and Epi-Pens. We recently conducted a joint training with Charlemont Fire-Rescue at Pelham Lake on Ice Rescue.


As we move forward in the New Year we will be instituting three new programs in the department. One will be the documentation of our member's ability to drive the vehicles. Each member is being asked to drive each of the vehicles which includes performing a standard Commercial Drivers circle check of the vehicle prior to taking it out on the road and demonstrating that they can operate all of the lights, heater controls, windshield wipers and emergency warning systems. Members will be expected to spend two hours each quarter performing these tasks. This program is being overseen by Deputy Chief Brandon Sprague. The second new program will be the familiarization of, checking of all vehicle systems and operating the fire portion of each of the apparatus. This will teach all members how to check the engine oil, cooling system, transmission fluid, windshield washer fluid, fire pump primer oil level, bleed the air brake systems etc. This will insure that everyone has the ability to

check the vehicles and the workload is being distributed throughout the department. This program is being over seen by Stephen Fisher.

The third program will be regular training in Emergency Medical Services response. This month's class will be in the Operation and Deployment of the Lucas CPR Device.

We have a regional Hazmat Awareness Class scheduled in March in Colrain, a Six Sunday Basic FireFighting Skills class starting in March and going through April in Charlemont, a Ropes and Knots Class taught by Rowe Police Officer Kyle Sweeney and then we will work with Charlemont again in April on Swift Water Rescue. We also have six joint classes with Charlemont from the Massachusetts Fire Academy scheduled in the next few months.

We meet every Thursday Evening starting at 6:00 PM. The First Thursday is for Administration and Didactic instruction of the Firefighter I/Firefighter II Curriculum. The second Thursday is for checking of the vehicles and equipment. The Third Thursday is for EMS Training and Specialty Training. The Fourth Thursday is the application of the skills taught at the beginning of the month. We welcome anyone interested in helping out their neighbor to come to any of our meetings.



Open Burning Rules

1. You may only burn BRUSH! All other materials are illegal. No leaves, grass, hay, stumps, building debris or any other materials are allowed to be burned.
2. All open burning must be a minimum of 75 feet from buildings or structures.
3. Burning will be allowed to start at 10:00am and must be extinguished by 4pm.
4. Any open fire must be attended at all times by the permit holder.
5. No person shall set, maintain or increase a fire in open air at any time except by permission.
6. You must be 18 years or older to apply for permit and/or set, maintain or increase fire once permission has been granted by the Fire Department.
7. You must have an appropriate means to extinguish an open air fire completely at the end of the day or if requested by the Fire Department.
8. The Fire Department can refuse or cancel a permit at any time. (Example: Violation of permit regulations, or change in weather conditions.)
9. Open burning season is January 15 - May 1.
10. Massachusetts Regulation 310 CMR: DEP 7.07 "Open Burning"

We have been having a great time during our Winter Enrichment ski days at Berkshire East. RHS Presents - The Gracy House

On February 25th, 2020 there will be an open meeting of the Gracy House Committee to discuss and answer any questions on how to move forward with the property considering the issues the building currently has. The house is a stately one steeped in the history of this town. With that in mind here is a little history of the property and how it evolved into what it has become today.

On June 7, 1836 Solomon Reed purchased a piece of land from Ambrose Stone consisting of “acres plus 125 rods more or less along with the privilege of bringing water for manufacturing purposes in a ditch or otherwise with the most convenient place across the other lands of said Ambrose.” The purchase price was \$159. Tradition has it that Solomon Amidon, Jr. and Joseph Burton built the Satinet Factory about 1836. There is a deed from the heirs of Dr. Pardon Haynes to Solomon Amidon, Jr. and Joseph Burton Nov. 9, 1835 granting them “the privilege of erecting a dam on land belonging to said heirs for manufacturing purposes”, but these two men never had ownership of the factory land. On April 12, 1837, the Franklin Manufacturing Co. was incorporated by Samuel H. Reed, Joseph Burton and Solomon Amidon, Jr. Almost immediately a large factory building and housing for its workers was erected. The Satinet factory was built to make a cotton/wool fabric known as satinet which was in high demand in the late 1830s. The first year of business was recorded in the Statistical Tables of the Conditions and Products of Certain Branches of Industry in MA for the year 1837. It showed that Franklin Manufacturing had a dozen people working for them, 6 men and 6 women. They consumed 7,500 pounds of wool weaving 10,000 yards of cloth valued at \$7,000. The capital invested for that year was \$17,000.

The first mention of a dwelling on this lot seems to be two houses listed on the Assessors records for 1847. The large house was said to have been built as a tenement for the factory workers with four apartments and two entrances. The second house attached by a covered walkway has always been known as the Deverall House (from a family by that name who lived there) and was a single-family dwelling.

By 1845 the factory put out 42,500 yards of cloth using 40,000 pounds of wool. They employed 8 men and 6 women. The value of the cloth was \$23,375 and according to the MHC Reconnaissance Survey in this year the Franklin Manufacturing Co. represented 21 percent of the value of the county satinet production for that year.

On December 4, 1847, after the death of Solomon Reed, Franklin Manufacturing Company was leased to Stephen Day of Pittsfield for a period of five years. The lease was then renewed for another five years. In 1855 Day produced 12,000 yards of cloth using 4,000 pounds of wool. In 1857 he purchased the entire property “ 2 acres, 125 rods more or less, dwelling house, barn, factory and store house along with stores, kettles, tools and machinery” for \$2600.00 He continued operation but records show it was never run to capacity after the 1840’s, the demand for the fabric wasn’t there. The factory ran until about 1875 after which it sat empty and decayed. Day was included in the Manufacturing Census of 1880 but production was down to almost nothing, employing a man and a woman with one of them working half time.



When Day purchased the property in 1857, he converted the house into a two-family dwelling and moved his wife and two daughters into it. An interesting little jingle was inspired by this house when owned by the Days. The man renting the other side from Days was a Mr. Knight and there was the Deveral house in the back. A family by the name of Lord owned the little house, now gone, on the village green. A lady visiting, the Days was heard to exclaim, "Why, there's a day and night in the same house with the Lord in front and the devil behind!"

The Days lived in the house until Stephen Day's death in 1891 when the property passed to his oldest daughter Ann Cone. Ann sold forty square rods of land to the Town for a "Town House" May 8, 1895 (443/327).

On October 3, 1898 Ann Cone sold to Edward A. Tower "land, swelling, factory, barn, store-house excepting a lot of land conveyed by the grantor to the Town of Rowe for a Town House". The sale was for \$1.00. Mr. Tower was a music teacher from North Adams. During the time that Mr. Tower owned the property he tore down the factory building which had fallen into disrepair. Tower coached the Rower Choral Group, fifteen or twenty adults who enjoyed entertaining and the house was full of song for many years.



The property remained in the Tower family for sixty-nine years. Mr. Tower died in 1907, but the house continued to be occupied by his widowed daughter, Mrs. Linna Jones, and eventually just summers by her daughter, Mary Jones White. It was sold by the estate of Mrs. White in 1967 to Sarah Jane Gracy. In 1982 the town acquired the house and all the property for the new fire station and leased the house back to Gracy. Upon her death in 2004 the property reverted to the town.

Since 2004 the building has been used for various things, most recently the Council on Aging has held its monthly meetings there. Much of the building has not been used due to accessibility issues. For the most part the building has been empty. In the summer of 2018 it was discovered that there were issues with mold that required the building to be closed.

The townspeople should know that the Gracy House is one of the last pieces of manufacturing history remaining in town. It bears little resemblance to its former self but its situation in the center of town can not be discounted. Many buildings have been removed over the years as one can see in the old photographs of the town center and the removal of one more should be considered carefully. The expenses that will be incurred by the taxpayers will not be small if the decision is made to keep it, yet the center of town will be poorer if it is removed. Information on all potential costs will be mailed to residents the first week of February. Please attend the meeting on February 25th at the Town Hall to ask questions, voice an opinion or give your ideas of what should be done with the building.



John H. (Jack) Williams, Jr., 91, of Noah Brown Road in Rowe passed away Monday, January 6th at the Vermont Veterans Home in Bennington.

Jack sincerely loved his town of Rowe. Since joining the selectboard in 1952 at age 23, he devoted his energies to the long-term future of the town. From major initiatives right down to the creation of the grasshopper crew and town newspaper that he named the Rowe Goal Post, it's not a stretch to say that every aspect of the town we know today reflects in some way his long-term vision and leadership.

Jack was born in Stamford, Ct., and, after military service and studying Animal Husbandry at University of Connecticut, moved to Rowe to help his mother and siblings establish a new dairy, called Merrifield Farm, on Middletown Hill. He also worked at the Deerfield Glassine Co., the Northern Berkshire Electric Co., and founded the Massamont Insurance and Real Estate Agency and was its president for 40 years. He served as a director of Shelburne Falls National Bank and trustee of Franklin County Public Hospital and Greenfield Community College.

He was most proud of his work to develop Pelham Lake Park on land given to the townspeople by his friend, the town historian Percy Whiting Brown, in 1955. Subsequently, Jack served as the first chairman of the Pelham Lake Park Commission as well as first president of the Rowe Historical Society and arranged for the society to buy and preserve Fort Pelham. In 1975, he donated the Horace Browning bench tool factory to the town for use as a community center for the crafts. When the town needed to start sheltering its winter sand and salt, Jack gave the land for a shed in back of the town garage rather than see it built within sight of the town center, its town common and the point where he pounded the stake for the town gazebo.

In the 1960's, he played a major role in bringing together nine area hilltowns to create the Mohawk Trail Regional High School and served for a time in the 1970's as chairman of the regional school committee.

His total of 15 years of service on the Rowe select board, included 12 years as chairman, and involved looking out for the town's interest during the siting, construction and initial operation of the multi-million dollar Yankee Atomic plant. To ensure the town maintained control over its suddenly bright but uncertain future, he worked to establish local by-laws and zoning – the first such measures implemented in any Franklin County town.


Upon retirement, he purchased the former Rainbow Hill Inn on Noah Brown Road and, after reclaiming old pastures and hayland there, he created Rowe Highlands Farm and raised Scotch Highland cattle and kept close watch over his town and its continuing progress.

Besides his wife Nan, he leaves his brother Jim of Rowe and three children, Rick and Rob of Rowe and Sue of Deerfield, N.H., five grandchildren, three great grandchildren and a niece and a nephew.
