ZBA Hearing

On January 3rd the Zoning Board of Appeals met to hold a Hearing on an application for a cell tower installation by Vertex Towers LLC on a property on County Road in Rowe. The Board convened at Town Hall, while other members and residents tuned in via the online video conferencing. A variance is needed due the town's zoning bylaws. The Board listened to comments, letters and questions posed by audience members both in person and submitted.

After receiving both support and objections, the Zoning Board of Appeals voted unanimously to grant conditional approval pending review from Town Counsel. The Board will reconvene on February 7th at 10:00 a.m. to finalize the vote. The 175-foot tower will not require lighting and one of the approval conditions stipulated that the tower will never exceed current height and not require lighting.

Board of Health Clerk Joanne Semanie resigned from the Board of Health last month. We thank Joanne for her years as Clerk for the Board. The Board of Health appointed resident Christine Bailey to replace Joanne. Christine has been working as Board of Assessors Clerk for over a year.

Board of Selectmen Work

With the new year upon us, the Board of Selectmen are finishing up the work started last year on the Wage and Salary Charts for town employees overseen by the Board. This involves reviewing each position and assigning a pay grade column. Following the chart assignment, the Board reviews each employee and their years of service, certifications, degrees, training and other factors to finalize their pay amount. It will most likely be a big topic in the upcoming Budget Hearings to be held on the next Tuesdays for the next two months with the Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen.

As always, anyone is welcome to attend meetings via remote participation either with video, if you have internet access or by telephone as well.

In these difficult and trying times, we all need to find a level of patience and understanding with one another and to remember that no one is overlooked from experiencing great challenges and difficulties. Stay safe and well.

Office hours are on Friday evenings from 6:00-8:00, or by appointment. I try to check into the office multiple nights a week, so if you call or email me, I will try to get back to you within a day or so.

It is very important to fill out the street listing, as it provides information for our emergency services, school enrollment, and voter registration. Voters who do not return the street listing after a certain period will be inactivated as voters, and if they remain inactive long enough, can even be removed from the voter rolls. It's also annoying for you to re-activate when you go to vote, so it's easier to just return them before it gets to that point. Dog licenses are available and 2021 licenses expire March 30th. Fixed dogs are \$5 and intact dogs are \$10. A valid rabies vaccination must be provided if not already on file. A rabies clinic has still not been scheduled, but is being worked on.

Nomination papers are available. The following positions are open, and a list of people who have taken out papers as of January 21st. Unless noted, all terms are for three years.





The day seemed fairly warm compared to what we had been having at about 25 degrees, so I thought to snowshoe up the mountain. I started from the Soule Trail on to Sibley trail and then hooked up to the snowmobile trail on Percy Brown and thence up King's Highway. I always find winter a peaceful time to hike and love all the textures of tree bark from the chunky black cherry, to rippled ash, papery yellow birch and smooth beech. The maples seem to harbor the most mosses, liverworts & lichens and shelf mushrooms were prominent on some tree trunks as well.

I got to wondering about King's Highway....when was it built? How long was it in use? Built in 1743, The History of Rowe says it was the earliest 'road' in town from Charlemont to Fort Pelham and also went by the name of Norton's Trail. It was used by troops going between forts and must have been used by Cornelius Jones when he brought his family to Rowe in 1763. It was abandoned by the town in 1834 but still remains a wonderful hiking trail.

I got to the 'Big Rock' at the top of King's Hwy (all covered in snowy rock tripe) and then turned right and headed down the ridge. I wanted to see if the snowmobiles continued on the old Line Bridge Trail that continues down the ridge to the Town Line in Zoar. Alas, at the junction, the snowmobiles continued on their way to Davenport road and the line bridge trail wasn't travelled. At this point, the wind and snow had picked up, so I headed back to the stove. But a beautiful hike nonetheless.



Rowe's first recorded celebration was the town centennial in 1885 where the gathering was held at the Old Centre (the intersection of Middletown Hill & Ford Hill Rd). It was said that fifteen hundred people assembled for speeches and music!

Not much happened until the 150th anniversary of the Town's incorporation in 1935. The festivities included the opening of the new library, a pageant with Indians crossing the Mill Pond, and the portrayal of pioneer founder Cornelius Jones & family arriving with ox-drawn carts.


1952 marked the beginning of the modern Old Home Day.

Winter Tracking Program 2022

All Rowe residents, guests, and school of choice families 8 years of age and older, children accompanied by an adult, are invited to join us at Pelham Lake Park on February 19th, 2022 from 9-11 am for a free Winter Tracking Program. The program will be led by David Ellis who is a skilled wildlife tracker trained by Sue Morse, founder of the organization Keeping Track. Ellis has participated in many tracking programs over the years and is experienced in leading guided hikes.

Wildlife tracking is a fun way to observe signs of animals that you may not typically notice. We will be looking for evidence of buck rubs on trees, browsing of saplings and acorns buried under the snow, bear markings, and identifying tracks. On this hike, it is possible you could see signs of deer, porcupine, otters, fox and more! You do not need to sign up ahead of time and if you have any questions you can call the park at 339-8554.

Winter Vaccine Clinics in Franklin County



Youth ages 5-18 are eligible to get a vaccine. Everyone age 12 and over is eligible for a booster shot.

Adult community members without children are welcome at school-based clinics.

Adults without children, please select an appointment slot later in the day.

Parents/caregivers who need a vaccination or booster are welcome to get a shot at the same time as their child is vaccinated.

All three vaccine types (Pfizer, Moderna, Johnson & Johnson) are available at each mobile clinic.

Flu shots are also available at each clinic.

Safe Disposal of Wall Mounted Thermostats and Fluorescent Light Bulbs

Have you upgraded to a new programmable thermostat or LED lightbulbs for your home or business? Great! But be careful - never put old wall-mounted thermostats or fluorescent lightbulbs in the trash or recycling, as they contain mercury. Mercury is hazardous to human health, wildlife, and the environment. Handle these items carefully to avoid breakage and bring to one of many local free or low-cost collection sites.

Thermostats and other mercury items

Old wall-mounted thermostats contain a significant amount of liquid mercury. These thermostats are safe to use on the wall, but once removed, careful disposal is important. Free disposal is available at many local sites.

Handle items carefully, place in a sealed plastic bag, and hand to a staff member at one of the following sites. Keep thermostats intact; do not remove ampoules.

17 municipal transfer stations in Franklin County accept mercurybearing items such as old wall-mounted thermostats, thermometers, switches, gauges, blood pressure monitors. Hand to attendant. The 17 transfer stations that accept thermostats and other mercury items are in Bernardston, Buckland, Charlemont, Colrain, Conway, Deerfield, Heath, Leverett, Montague, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Rowe, Shelburne, Warwick, Wendell, and Whately. Resident permits may be required.



Most old wall-mounted thermostats contain mercury. Look for an ampoule inside with silver liquid, handle carefully, and bring to a special drop-off site.

District residents of towns that do not have access to a municipal transfer station may utilize the "Super Sites" in Bernardston and Colrain. Any District resident may bring mercury-containing devices (thermostats, thermometers) free of charge. District residents may also pay small fees to dispose of common household hazardous waste (fluorescent light bulbs, used motor oil, antifreeze, oil-based paint). Additional drop-off locations for mercury thermostats, such as plumbing/HVAC contractors and plumbing supply stores, are listed at: www.thermostat-recycle.org. All locations accept mercury thermostats for free.

Light bulbs

Fluorescent light bulbs contain mercury and should never be put in the recycling or trash. This includes the screw-in spiral compact fluorescent lights (CFLs), as well as straight "tube" lightbulbs and

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
