Others can acknowledge her many contributions over the course of many years, for today, I will simply say, I feel a profound loss.

In honor of Maggie and all of you that give up your precious time to make a difference to the present and the future of Rowe. There are many of you, like Maggie, who step in and do what needs to be done. For that and many other things, to each and every one of you that contributes in whatever way you can, thank you.

Office hours continue to be on Thursday evenings from 6:00-8:00 and by appointment. Town officials who were elected in May or will soon be appointed to various positions need to be sworn in, even if you were the incumbent. I still have two elected officials from 2021 that have not been sworn in!

At the time of writing this article, the temporary changes to the state's Open Meeting Laws will expire July 15th. The relaxations included eliminating the requirement of an inperson quorum, allowing meetings to be held entirely through remote means (like Zoom or by phone). Many committees have opted to meet via hybrid methods- having both an inperson meeting while simultaneously streaming by Zoom. While these rule changes have an expiration date in the near future, there is legislation pending before the state that would extend these rules to December 2023. More information will be provided as it is known. Recently the legislature passed, and the governor signed, a new law centered around elections in the Commonwealth. While information on this is still being provided to local clerks, some of the changes "appear" to include:

The registration deadline for town meetings and elections is now a flat 10 days rather than dependent on whether it's a regularly scheduled meeting/election.

Voters will now be able to vote by mail permanently, similar to 2020 where postcards were sent to everyone in the state. This does not seem to include local elections. In-person elections will still be held for those seeking to cast their ballot in person.

Gives greater power to the town clerk to appoint election workers if there is a shortage of local volunteers.

Makes early voting permanent for all state elections. More details for the two elections this Fall will be available in the coming months. Local elections have this option, but with our limited turnout and minimal number of contests, I do not envision this being used in Rowe.

People eligible to vote will automatically be enrolled when conducting certain transactions at the RMV. Those who are not eligible to vote (underage, non-citizens, etc.) will not be able to enroll.

Summaries and explanations were received the same day this article was due, so there has not been adequate time to fully read and comprehend the fine details. Like the open meeting law changes, more information will be provided when it is known.

On July 9, 2022, the Rowe Historical Society (RHS) will hold its 54th Annual Meeting at the Kemp-McCarthy Memorial Museum. On July 7, 1958, RHS received its Charter of Incorporation. The original incorporators included the following: Lucy J. Avery, Wendell W. Bjork, Anne G. Bond, Edward C. Henderson, Edith M. Kloetzle, Arvon G. Palmer, J. Henry Stanford, Dorothy N. Stevens, Alice V. Truesdell, John H. Williams, Jr. and Nancy N. Williams.

According to the bylaws the purposes of the Rowe Historical Society are as follows:

To collect and preserve historical records and data of persons, places and events in and associated with Rowe, Massachusetts.

To collect, preserve and maintain an historical library and a museum of historical relics and articles of historical interest.

To awaken and maintain public interest in all matters relating to the history of the Town of Rowe.

To acquire by purchase or otherwise, or lease or rent real and personal property not in excess of the amount permitted by law as may be necessary or convenient as incidental to the purposes of the corporation, and to sell and dispose of the same.

Over the years the RHS has adhered to its bylaws by purchasing property including the Fort Pelham site as well as the Village School and its additions that currently house the archives and artifacts currently in the society's collection.

Most of the collection was put together by volunteers with Helen McCarthy who researched and collected materials, especially from the old timers. At the time of her death in 1977 the museum had 13,000 artifacts of historical interest to Rowe.

Currently things still come to the museum from members and friends that are considered to have historic interest. The Board of Trustees strives to create programming of interest to members, residents, schools and visitors. After being closed for 2 years they have opened with a new enthusiasm for bringing the history of the town to those who are interested. This has included hikes to areas of historic interest that have been quite popular.



Summer is now in full swing down at Pelham Lake Park. Students now out of school are soaking up the sunshine kayaking, paddleboarding and swimming while the students who chose to work at the park all summer are helping with multiple operations to ensure the parks cleanliness and beauty all summer long.

The workers have been working on putting in new kiosks at every trail head on the edges of the park borders. The kiosks were constructed by Hilltown Demolition back in September and now it's time for the summer staff to install them. They have been busy sanding, digging the holes and putting the kiosks together and in the ground for summer use. At the beginning of July we have ones up by the Sabrina Rice trailhead off Davis Mine Rd., by the dam off Pond Rd., at the Lakeview Trail trailhead, by the Soule Barn at the Williams Trail trailhead and by the park headquarters heading out on the Beach Trail. We still have 9 more to install, so stay tuned for those later this summer.

As for what goes on the kiosks, this past spring we have been working with Longview Forest to create a new interactive trail map. Interactive meaning there will be a barcode on the map that you can scan using the camera feature on your phone, or by downloading the app "Avanza," and scanning it on there, and once you do so, the map will appear on your hand-held device. This will allow you to track your location on your phone while you're in the woods at the park eliminating your chances to get lost. The new maps will be going on all the new kiosks as well as being available at park headquarters.

The summer workers have also been working on the upkeep of the park by starting with weed-whacking and pruning all the trails in the park. This ensures the trails will be clear and looking pristine for hikers to pass through. The workers are also going to be weedwhacking the town common regularly around all the trees, stumps, and even the buildings to keep the town looking sharp for those driving by.

The Rec program is also starting this July. The starting date is July 18th and will be run by one of our own, Emma Poplawski. Emma is a former summer worker at Pelham Lake Park and has recently graduated Worcester State University for childhood education. This will be Emma's first year at the park Rec Program and we are very excited for her to start. Rec forms are available for pick up and drop off at park headquarters. The forms are available for pick up at the park headquarters from 7-6 on weekdays and 10-6 on weekends. Please have the forms in by July 15.

The park was also gifted two stone benches by Judy Slowinski in memory of Diane Veber, Deric Nugent, and Florence Veber. One bench is located to the right of the beach by the flagpole at the park and the other one is in the town common.

The annual senior picnics will be held again this year, one in July and one in August. This month's will be held July 14th and food will be prepared at the park and available for pick up. Please call 413-339-8554 or email roweparkdept@hotmail.com no later then July 13th to make your food reservation.

Last but not least, beach stickers. The park is continuing to have summer workers checking stickers every day. The stickers this year will be the same as last year, they say 2021 on them and those are the stickers the workers will be checking for. If you do not have a 2021 sticker and a guest pass, please come down to the park and pick one up. Workers will check your name off a list to make sure you didn't get one last year. If you have a guest pass from last year, we ask you locate it and use the same one this year. If you need a guest pass you can come down to the park to pick one up.

We're hoping for a summer full of sunshine and great memories down at the Pelham Lake Park!

The Tick Challenge

Do you happen to find yourself outside during the spring, summer, or fall months? Of course, you do because you live in the beautiful town of Rowe! What better to spoil your fun then finding a tick!!??

I distinctly remember the very first time that I found a tick on myself and how utterly disgusted I was-it literally made my skin crawl! As the years pass, what was once shock and disgust, has turned to annoyance and attention (to prevent tick-related disease). Although we can all take precautions to deter ticks, it is not possible to avoid them altogether when we are outside in the woods, gardens, fields, or any outdoor space for that matter. Over the years we have seen the tick population increase, and with that increase, we have seen an increase in tick-borne disease.


Tick activity and tick-borne diseases like Lyme disease, Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis, Borrelia miyamotoi, and Powassan virus, occur year-round in Massachusetts, but are most prominent in the Spring, Summer and Fall months. Although tick activity is weather-dependent, there are two peaks during the year; the first begins in March/April and lasts through August, and the second occurs in October-November. The vast majority of cases of tick-borne disease occur in June through August. Deer Ticks, also known as 'black legged ticks' are responsible for most of the tick-related diseases we see here in Massachusetts.

While, tick-borne diseases are most frequently diagnosed in children and older adults and although not every tick is carrying a disease, it is important to take steps to avoid ALL tick bites.

To prevent tick bites:

- Use insect repellents that contain an EPA-registered active ingredient like permethrin or DEET
- wear light-colored clothing to more easily spot ticks,
- do daily tick checks- ticks are tiny so look for new 'freckles'
- promptly and properly removing any attached ticks by using a pair of fine point tweezers to grip the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull straight out with steady pressure.
- If you do have a tick that is attached and you need to remove it, please mark the date on the calendar and lookout for symptoms of tick-related diseases, such as, a 'bullseye' mark around the tick bite, fever, fatigue, muscle or joint pain. If you experience any of these symptoms or you know the tick was attached longer than 36 hours, please call your provider immediately as you may need treatment.

Please continue to take care and stay alert during the upcoming months!


