Yankee Road Update:

At her visit, Representative Natalie Blais suggested that Rowe re-apply for the full funding of the Yankee Road rebuild which is now at \$1.35 Million estimated cost. I completed the application for MassWorks in late May for the June 2nd deadline. Rep. Blais and Sen. Paul Marks provided letters of support to submit with the application.

Rep. Blais, her Aide and Representatives from Sen. Mark's office met with Selectmen Chuck Sokol and Joanne Semanie to view the site and tour the facility. In addition, Congressman Rich Neal's office submitted a request for federal funding with the Community Block Development Grant under a special project. So now we wait and see what transpires.

Town Hall Employee Update:

Our Treasurer/Collector left her position in June and we are currently seeking a replacement and interviewing candidates and hope to fill very soon. We appreciate your patience until the position is filled.

As it was voted at Annual Town Meeting to change the title of my position, as of July 1st I have been appointed as Town Administrator. The bulk of the work will not change, and soon I will be retiring, and the position will then be a 40-hour per week position.

As a result of my retirement in September, the Board of Selectmen appointed Brooke Shulda, currently serving in the role of Administrative Assistant, as Interim Town Administrator. I look forward to working with Brooke in this transition. I truly enjoy working with her, she has been such a bright presence at Town Hall. I know her to be hard-working,

sincere, loyal and honest. She loves the town and will, undoubtedly, thrive in this role.

The Board of Selectmen have been interviewing candidates for the Facilities Manager position. There were numerous candidates and a decision will take place in early July.







Starting at the bottom of the hill we first pass by the home of Sue Williams. Followed by the house last owned by Dot and Ray Stevens (no longer there).




The next house would have belonged to Frank Brown (Maple House now home to Mike and Becky Bradley). This was open to lodgers in the summers both then and now.



Onward to Fort Pelham Farm now home to Bill and Joanne Semanie.








Before arriving at Ford Hill Road the view looking down Middletown Hill was lovely. We see Miss Mill's cottage and the house beyond is Maple House.

At the junction of Ford Hill Rd. was Rocklawn owned by the Farley Family, now the Adams home.



The last house at the top of the hill was the Wells Farm now the home of Jim Williams. This was the destination for the sunsets.





As July creeps around the corner, the lake is in full operation. A full summer staff is set to start in the ending weeks of June, and the park trails have been cleared and are ready for hikers to use. The pontoon boat is also now in the lake for the use of residents but are to be driven around by a park staff member. The first thing we want the residents of Rowe to know is.... To follow Pelham Lake Park on Instagram! The Instagram username for the park is, @ pelhamlakepark you can type that right into the search bar on the Instagram app and hit follow! Hope to see you there!

The summer of June had three bridges re-decked. Two of these were on the Williams Trail/Sabrina Rice Trail and one on the 1792 trail. Go check them out! The new trail blazes done by *Nutron OMS* are up on almost all the trails in the park. Go check those out as well! This July the park is hosting a couple of events! Two will take place on the same day, July 20th. AT 11:00 AM there will be a Turtle presentation done by the Southern Vermont Natural History Museum, and to follow that at 12:00 PM will be a senior picnic. The presentation is free and for all ages. Please bring a chair if you wish to attend.

A large spring/summer project that is set to be completed in July has been the resurfacing of the tennis courts. If you have been following along, this project began in May with *CD Davenport trucking* ripping up the old surface and then paving a new one. As of right now the surface has been paved but the courts are not open to the public yet. The pavement needs to set, and the courts will be opened by park staff when they are ready for use. Another important note is the Tennis Court Trail from both Pond Road, and the beach is closed until further notice.

Pickleball is coming to Rowe!

Join us for a pickleball demonstration and introduction to the fastest growing sport in the US! If you have been wondering what pickleball is, meet us at the beach on Saturday morning July 15th at 10 AM. The courts will not be ready to play on until the end of July, but we will set up a temporary court nearby where you can watch and/or experience this fun new sport! Equipment will be provided.

Another addition to Summer 2023 is the kiosks in full working condition after being assembled and installed last summer. These kiosks hold all new trail maps done by *Long View Forest Management* located out of Vermont, and fiberglass notice boards on each kiosk done

by Andrea Hopkins (town resident). These notice boards have the trail name and are filled with photos, maps, and descriptions that will benefit your hiking experience. There are 4 extra trail maps in addition to the ones on every kiosk that will be scattered through the park on signposts at major trail intersections. Also incorporated on these notice boards are QR codes that will lead you to an interactive georeferenced map on your hand-held device. This map on a device comes with many qualities including tracking, placing place markers, uploading photos, and it shows you exactly where you are when you open the map with no cellular service or Wi-Fi required. In order to access this map, instructions are provided on the information boards, but you will need Wi-Fi or service to initially download the app on your device. If you would like to access this interactive map from home before you begin your hike, follow these steps:

- 1.) Download Avenza Maps from the appstore on your celluar device
- 2.) Go to your camera function on your device and point the camera at the QR code at the bottom of this article
- 3.) Once the QR code is scanned, click the link that pops up on your screen
- 4.) Once the link is opned in safari or google, click the upload buttom at the bottom of your screen (this is a square with an upwards facing arrow)
- 5.) Upload this map to the app, Avenza Maps (you may have to scroll through your apps on the screen initally, and hit more at the end of the list, once you hit more scroll down until you see, Avenza Maps, and click on it)
- 6.) Once in Avenza Maps click the map just uploaded, (it should be titled, rowe_trail_recreation_map) and enjoy the features!

UV Safety: Is It Really That Important?

Now that summer is in full swing, we are spending more time outside, by the pool or lake and in the garden. The warm weather and sunshine are great for the body, mind, and soul, but we need to have a continued awareness of the effects of UV damage and its repercussions both short and long-term.

UV Radiation Rays are classified into 3 categories: UVA, UVB and UVC. Most all the rays that come from the sun are UVA, which are the strongest type of UV rays and can penetrate deeper into the skin. There are benefits of UV exposure (at controlled lengths of time), including the production of vitamin D. This essential vitamin helps with the absorption of calcium and phosphorus from food to assist in bone development. The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends 5-15 minutes of sun exposure 2-3 times a week for optimal vitamin D production.

Although sun exposure in controlled amounts can be beneficial to our health, prolonged exposure of UV rays, can also have short-term and long-term detrimental effects.

☐ Sunburn is a sign of short-term overexposure, while premature aging and skin cancer are side effects of prolonged UV exposure. UV exposure increases the risk of potentially blinding eye diseases, if eye protection is not used.

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. The two most common types of skin cancer are basal cell cancer and squamous cell cancer. Typically, they form on the head, face, neck, hands, and arms because these body parts are the most exposed to UV radiation. Most cases of melanoma, the deadliest kind of skin cancer, are caused by exposure to UV radiation.

Anyone can have harmful health effects from UV radiation, but the risks increase in people who:

	Spend a lot of time in the sun or have been sunburned.
	Have light-color skin, hair, and eyes.
	Take some types of oral and topical medicines, such as antibiotics, birth control pills, and benzoyl peroxide products, as well as some cosmetics, may increase skin and eye sensitivity to UV in all skin types.
	Have a family member with skin cancer.
	Are over age 50.

How to protect yourself from UV radiation:						
	Stay in the shade, especially in mid-day hours					
	Wear clothes that cover your arms and legs. Wear a wide-brimmed hat.					
	Wear wraparound sunglasses that block both UVA and UVB rays.					
	Use sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher and apply at regular intervals.					
	Avoid indoor tanning. Indoor tanning is particularly dangerous for younger users; people who begin indoor tanning during adolescence or early adulthood have a higher risk of developing melanoma.

As their shoes get sprayed, it would be an opportunity to chat informally about ticks and provide handouts/resources, etc.						

Permethrin is odorless and colorless, once it is dried. The treatment lasts for weeks at a time so


