It is a time of renewal, when everything seems fresh, and the possibilities are limitless.

This past school year was another exciting one for students and staff at the Rowe School, as we continue to look for ways to engage the students more directly in their learning in a hands-on, inquiry-based way. The 3/4 class continues to make their Outdoor Classroom an amazing space for learning and fun, and the other classes use the space outside the school, and Pelham Lake Park, to get students outside, having fun, and learning. We will be starting our second year with our new Math curriculum, Illustrative Mathematics, that we found to be a real positive for our students and their engagement with, and success in, Math.

This year, we will continue our After School Learning Activities for students. Last year, students experienced everything from art and hiking to crafting and board games. We're looking for any interested adults with a particular subject or activity they would like to bring to our students, who are interested in running a six-to-eight-week, once-a-week after-school activity for students on that subject, whatever it may be. Our information packet for families will go out mid-August, please be looking for that.

Despite the fact that things are slower here at the school during the summer, it has definitely not been quiet. Acceleration Academies were held to offer support for students in ELA and Math Our school secretary, Laurie, and our custodian, Jim, have been working hard to prepare for the first day of school. Teachers will be coming in during the month of August, preparing their classrooms for when the students return. As for me, I'm working to figure out how we can get the community more involved in the school. We'll again have monthly Community Lunches on the last Wednesday of

each month, please join us if you can The PTP is planning an Ice Cream Social for Monday, August 28 at 2:30 at the school...mark your calendar. Summers in Rowe leave an impression on people, especially young ones. Percy Brown first visited as a little boy in the 1890s. He wrote an essay considered one of his first literary efforts describing his arrival on the stage from Zoar after a day on the train from Concord.

"We lean back with a refreshing sense of rest after the warm day in the train and realize with difficulty that we are really in Rowe – Rowe, the town of hay fields, hill-side pastures with cows quietly chewing their cuds – and now and then the tinkle of a bell as a sheep scampers off up the hillside. Everything gives a sense of relief and rest.



#### **Mosquitoes**

Here is a crazy statistic to make you feel itchy all over- There are over 150 species of Mosquitoes in North America and over 3000 species in the entire world! Most adult mosquitoes spend the day in damp, shady areas where they can find protection from the sun. They need water to lay their eggs in and plants to hide in, so they are usually found around water and plants. Mosquito eggs are laid on water or damp soil where the young mosquitoes grow and develop. When they become adults, they leave the water and fly away. The life of an adult mosquito is quite short- most female mosquitoes live for less than 2 weeks and most male mosquitoes live for less than a week, but depending on conditions, they can live up to 8 weeks. Female mosquitoes are the only ones that bite because they use the blood to make their eggs. Some mosquitoes carry viruses that are transmitted with a bite, which can make people and some animals sick. In Massachusetts, the diseases linked to mosquitoes are West Nile virus (WNV) and eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) virus. Both of these viruses can be deadly and if survived can leave lasting neurologic disability due to the inflammation of the brain that they cause. Throughout the summer, mosquitoes are routinely trapped and tested for diseases across the state. The prevalence of mosquitoes carrying disease tends to increase as the summer passes. By midJuly of this year, mosquitoes in Eastern Mass have tested positive for both West Nile Virus (WNV) and Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE). Public health officials are keeping an eye out for increased EEE activity this summer because there was mild winter, above average rainfall, and there was EEE activity last year. The good news is that WNV and EEE are rare and only a small number of mosquitoes are infected at any given time, so being bitten by a mosquito does not mean you will get sick. However, the best way to avoid EEE and WNV is to <u>PREVENT</u> mosquito bites.

#### **Prevention tips:**

Use insect repellents any time you are outdoors
Wear long-sleeved clothing
Schedule outdoor activities to avoid the hours from dusk to dawn during peak mosquito season
Repair damaged window and door screens
Remove standing water from the areas around your home

# **Help Prevent Tick Bites!**

\*\*Come Get Your Shoes Or Boots Sprayed\*\*





When: Tuesday, August 20th from 3-6pm

Where: Town Hall Parking Lot

What to bring: Shoes and/or boots that are

used frequently for walking or hiking (1-3 pairs)

\*\*Community members will bring their shoes, (which are placed in a container) and sprayed with permethrin, a chemical naturally found in chrysanthemum flowers. The shoes will then be handed back to folks in a paper bag, to dry overnight. As their shoes get sprayed, it would be an opportunity to chat informally about ticks and provide handouts/resources, etc.

Permethrin is odorless and colorless, once it is dried. The treatment lasts for weeks at a time so it would be helpful for summer hiking or walking.

Although spraying shoes is not a particularly hazardous undertaking, it can seem intimidating due to the use of chemicals. Every safety precaution will be undertaken to make this a pleasant (and successful) experience for all!


