I appreciate your understanding.




The nominating period for town elections has closed. A full list of qualified candidates will appear in the May issue of the Goal Post. No one took out papers for Park Commission, Board of Health, or one three-year seat on the Finance Committee. Those positions will be determined by write-in votes. The Board of Registrars will certify nomination papers by April 11th. Vote-by-mail ballots will not go out until April 15th at the earliest.

There will be a rabies clinic at the Heath School/Town Offices (18 Jacobs Road) April 18th from 10:00-12:00. Shots are \$20 per vaccination and MUST be paid in cash- no exceptions. Dogs must be on a non-extendable leash (i.e. fixed length) and all cats need to be in carriers. The deadline for obtaining a dog license has passed- all tags obtained after this point will require a \$10 late fee.

RE: Zoar Road - Sam Rice Brook Bridge Repair

Dear Rowe Residents,

In late June 2025, the Select Board was notified by the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) that the bridge over Sam Rice Brook on Zoar Road needed to be reduced to one lane following a bridge inspection. The inspection revealed that the beam ends required repairs to meet MassDOT standards and to reopen the bridge to two lanes. Over the past nine months, we have worked diligently to address these repairs, bring the bridge up to MassDOT standards, and prepare for reopening to two-lane traffic.

To minimize costs and expedite construction, and on the engineering firm's recommendation, the Select Board has decided to close the bridge during the repair period. Consequently, the bridge over Sam Rice Brook on Zoar Road will be closed to traffic while repairs are underway.

The bridge will be **closed** to all traffic starting **Wednesday, July 1, 2026**, with an anticipated reopening on Thursday, October 1, 2026.

If you are traveling north on Zoar Road, the road will be accessible to house #234. If you are traveling south on Zoar Road, the road will be accessible to house #245.

We recognize that this closure may inconvenience your daily commute.

A detour map has been provided for your reference.




ROWE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL



Here at the school, students and staff have been working hard through one of our longest stretches of uninterrupted instructional time. Despite a few snow events, it's been full steam ahead as the teachers continue to move through our ELA and math curriculums. During that time we were able to incorporate our annual Cultural Study Program, which focused on Costa Rica. Our cultural study program is made possible through grant funding by the Mass Cultural Council/Rowe Cultural Council.

The program was kicked off by a visit from guest speaker Erick Benavides Chaves. Erick, a Fulbright Scholar from Costa Rica studying Linguistic Anthropology at the University of Massachusetts, met with students during a whole-school morning meeting, where he answered their questions. He also visited each classroom to teach engaging lessons about Costa Rica.



The following week, students participated in three days of mini-courses. These included: exploring the animals and plants of the Monteverde Forest Preserve, creating maps of Costa Rica, making “crankies” (illustrated scenes presented in a moving format set to music), crafting maracas, learning about Costa Rican myths and folktales, and cooking and tasting traditional foods.



Some of these dishes were also featured at our community lunch, where Kelly helped share the flavors of Costa Rica with the broader community. Students had the opportunity to showcase their work from the mini-courses and performed songs they had been practicing with Mr. Caproni, our music teacher.

The 5th and 6th graders also held their Spaghetti Supper to help fundraise for their spring trip to Kroka Expeditions. Thank you to everyone who came out to support them.

The School Committee is scheduled to meet on Tuesday, April 9th at 3:30 p.m. I hope you can join us. They will be reviewing the budget for next school year.

MCAS tests for students in grades 3-6 will be happening over the next six weeks, starting April 8. While it is a state requirement, and it's important that everyone participates, we see it as a snapshot of a student's learning and rely on this standardized test as well as the formal and informal assessments we do all year long with students, to gauge how they are learning.

Right now, it looks like the last day of school for students will be Thursday, June 18th, and Monday, June 22 for staff. Graduation will likely be Thursday, June 18th with more details to come, including when our end of the year Talent Show and Music Concert will take place. Each month (the 3rd Tuesday of the month) the Pantry provides nutritional food, essential items, and complimentary community services to many families and residents facing food insecurity and financial challenges.

The BEST part—ALL ARE WELCOME! No pre-registration. No proof of income. All you need to do is come and select the food and essential items you can use.

What is offered you ask? Selections vary from month to month, however the volunteer food bank shoppers do their best to meet the needs of families they serve at every distribution. They even offer PET FOOD for your dogs and cats! Below are some of the items that are offered on a regular basis:

PELHAM LAKE PARK NEWS



Pelham Lake Park is launching an Adopt-a-Trail program for residents who would like to play a more active role in caring for our park. This program is designed to be flexible, family-friendly, and accessible to a range of interest levels.

At a minimum, trail adopters commit to hiking their adopted trail at a regular interval and reporting any maintenance needs or concerns (such as downed branches, erosion, or signage issues) to the Park Manager. This helps us identify problems early and keep trails safe and enjoyable for everyone.

Participants who are interested in a more hands-on role may also borrow basic hand tools, such as loppers and pruners, to help maintain trail corridors by trimming back encroaching vegetation. All maintenance is limited to light work, and guidance will be provided to ensure it is done safely and appropriately.

Whether you're looking to simply keep an eye on a favorite trail or contribute more directly to its upkeep, your involvement makes a meaningful difference. Summer hiring at the park will begin this month, and we're looking forward to bringing on a great team for the upcoming season. Interested applicants can find an updated Youth Employment Application on the park website. Applications will be due by the end of April, with interviews scheduled for the first week of May.

As always, hiring preference is given to Rowe youth, with any unfilled positions then opened to children of Rowe employees who reside out of town. A reminder to families: applications should be completed by the applicants themselves. The Park Commission and Manager are interested in hearing directly from each candidate - their interests, experiences, and goals - not from a parent or guardian. Taking the time to thoughtfully complete the application is an important first step in the hiring process.

This summer's staff will play an important role in several upcoming projects throughout the park. Planned work includes construction of a new trail, improvements to existing trail systems, repair of park bridges, and continued habitat enhancement through invasive species removal. These efforts will help improve both the recreational experience for visitors and the overall health of the park's natural resources.

Happy Spring! When the sap flows and our beloved Rowe hillsides start to green up with love and hope. We'll start this month with pruning and spring care, a beloved art and a science for us tree people. As Dr. Alex Shigo, considered the father of modern arboriculture, said many times, "The best thing you can do for a tree is prune. And the worst thing you can do for a tree is prune." Remember, you can always prune more later, but you can't glue a branch back on if you make a mistake!

If you don't need to prune, don't. Funny bit of advice for a tree column about pruning, right? Last year's awful drought, especially during the Fall when roots are most active, placed extraordinary stress on all of our trees. Let them rest if you can. Our trees store carbohydrates in their roots, branches and crown, and then draw upon these energy reserves during these high-stress periods. When we prune, we are often cutting away carbohydrate stores. And when we create open pruning wounds, the tree immediately needs to exert resources to heal that new pruning wound. So you may want to sit this Spring out if you can. If you find yourself pruning, just think about keeping it to a minimum. Every leaf helps this year!

Prune in the right season. Different trees have different pruning seasons. Many fruiting and trees with heavy sap flows – like maple and birches – are best pruned late Fall. Pruning before flowering has completed causes stress and reduces the development of flower buds. And let's not forget about our winged friends who may just be up in that branch nesting with their chicks. When in doubt, wait it out unless safety prevails.

Make the right cut(s) with the right tool(s). For everything but the smallest twigs, consider using the three-cut method to protect the critical "branch bark collar" that helps the tree seal your pruning wound and reduce risk of disease and decay. Your first cut is well out on the underside of your branch to reduce the chance of ripping the bark when the branch is cut. The second cut is further out on the branch to take the main weight off. Then a final precision cut is made just outside the branch collar and away from the trunk, angled to the branch that has been removed. This provides the cleanest, smallest wound and offers the best chance for the tree to seal the cut quickly without disease setting in. Consider using sharp hand bypass pruners or pruning saws instead of a chainsaw.

Mulching is the best thing you can do. For trees in your landscape, use the "3-3-3" rule of thumb: three-foot diameter round mulch bed, 3 inches deep, and leaving a 3-inch circle away from the trunk to avoid trunk rot. Plain old school wood chips are best, as darker landscaping dyes add heat to trees. This helps the tree keep needed moisture from evaporating, and helps keep mowers away from your trees, one of the leading causes of tree death! Skip any fertilizers as nitrogen can also cause stress.
